ATHENA WIN's Evening of Empowerment program held in September featured 2020 ATHENA recipient Elaine Hardy and Amanda Sauer, the first female Big 10 Football referee. Longtime Community Leader Kelly Rossman-McKinney Passes Away

ne of the Lansing region's most wellknown and beloved figures, Kelly Rossman-McKinney passed away on November 9 after a courageous battle with cancer. Kelly was the founder of her own communications company and viewed as a leader in the industry. She eventually merged her company with one of her rivals, John Truscott, who continues as CEO. Truscott issued a statement on behalf of all the employees of the firm.

"The team at Truscott
Rossman and I join people
across the state of Michigan
today in mourning the
loss of our friend, Kelly
Rossman-McKinney. Kelly
left this world the way she

lived in it – bravely determined, inspiring all those around her with her courage, wit and humor. We will miss her tremendously.

Throughout her 45-year career, Kelly became one of Michigan's best-known, highly-respected and most-accomplished communications experts. There never has been and never will be another Kelly Rossman-McKinney. She shattered the glass ceiling for women in Lansing by taking risks – risks she understood and committed to because she knew what challenges were, and she faced them head-on. After years of competing for business, and even serving as adversaries on issues, Kelly and I joined forces and founded Truscott Rossman in 2011. It was the best decision of my career.

With her passing, I've lost more than a business partner, I've lost a best friend, my work wife and one of the most heroic people I've ever met.

On behalf of our entire team, I extend deep sympathy to Kelly's beloved husband, Officer Dave Thompson, and her children Alex, Teddy, Connor and Coby, her stepdaughter Brittany Thompson, daughter-in-law Jessica Zimbelman and former husband and great friend, Kevin McKinney."

Kelly left the firm a few years ago to run for the state



legislature. Though she did not win that race, she did go on to serve as communications officer for state attorney General Dana Nessel.

"There will never be another Kelly Rossman-McKinney," said Attorney General Nessel. "I am heartbroken by the loss of one of my most trusted advisors and I am honored to count myself amongst those who had the good fortune to work alongside Kelly and to witness her artistry. Kelly forged deep relationships with so many of her colleagues at the Department of Attorney General, and her loss weighs heavy on all our hearts."

Rossman-McKinney was much more than a highly successful business person. She was a mentor and friend to many, always willing to help others with career advice.

"Kelly Rossman McKinney was known, respected and admired by every community leader in the Greater Lansing region and beyond," said Tim Daman, president & CEO, Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce. "Her presence was felt every time she entered a room. Her contributions to the community were enormous, as reflected by the fact she was one of only two individuals to receive both the ATHENA Leadership and Community Service Awards from the Lansing Regional Chamber. Our deepest condolences to Kelly's family and current and former colleagues for their loss."

The Township presented five awards this year, including Citizen of the Year, Young Person of the Year, Business of the Year, and two Community Enhancement Awards. The Young Person of the Year recipient was also presented with a \$2,000 scholarship sponsored by the Delta Side Business Association.

The Citizen of the Year Award was presented to Father John Klein. Fr. John Klein served for 24 years as the pastor of St. Gerard Church. During his tenure, Fr. Klein sought to serve the members of his congregation and the Delta Township community at large. Under his leadership, St. Gerard hosted community holiday dinners on major holidays so that no person in the community was alone or hungry; he even offered transportation to the events; and during the pandemic, he instituted meal deliveries to ensure those in need would not go hungry. Fr. Klein also implemented a program to assist families in need over the Christmas holiday by providing toys, books, and clothing to children, to ensure that every child felt the love and miracle of the holiday. The families felt the support of their community.

Granger Mall is currently owned by Sam Frangie and Sam Makhoul, who bought the plaza in 2018. Originally built in the early 60s, the building desperately needed a new roof and updates. In January 2020, they replaced the roof and created a new facade, with plans to improve the parking lot.

Righter's Auto Repair opened its Delta Township location in 2020. The redevelopment of the former Tuffy garage included nearly \$1.2 million in reinvestment into the building, equipment, parking lot, and more. This business was also a recipient of a Delta Economic Development Façade Improvement grant to assist in the cost of the improvements. •



Mason Elementary Named National Blue-Ribbon School

n Mason, the air is still buzzing from a recent United States Department of Education announcement. On Sept. 21, Alaiedon Elementary, one of Mason Public Schools' exemplary elementary schools, was named a 2021 National Blue-Ribbon School (NBRS). The award is based on a school's success in maintaining high academic performance or closing achievement gaps among students. Alaiedon Elementary is one of four elementary buildings in Mason, serving grades 1-5 with a student population of approximately 374 students.

Schools cannot apply for this award and must be invited by their State Departments of Education to apply. In Alaiedon's case, the Michigan Department of Education asked principal, Shana Barnum to apply due to Alaiedon's success in making the transition from a one-time focus school to now maintaining consistently high Michigan Student Test of Educational Progress (M-STEP) scores for all grades and being a top-performing school in Michigan.

The efforts made by building and district leadership are vast. They include things like utilizing late start Wednesdays for staff to participate in Professional Learning Communities (PLC) time each week, providing individualized What I Need (WIN) time for students four times per week, utilizing Multi-Tiered Systems of Support, which allows the team to address every individual student's needs, championing collective team efficacy and embodying a growth mindset. For Alaiedon, a growth mindset is supported by "I can" statements displayed, discussed and referred to frequently during instruction and goal setting by students and staff. Alaiedon's team maintains high expectations, builds strong relationships with every student, and focuses on collective commitments, resulting in developing consistent systems to ensure student success with a focus on results.

The U.S. Department of Education says, "The National Blue Ribbon Schools award affirms the hard work of students, educators, families and communities in creating safe and welcoming schools where students master challenging content. The National Blue Ribbon Schools flag gracing a school's building is a widely recognized symbol of exemplary teaching and learning. National Blue Ribbon Schools are an inspiration and a model for schools still striving for excellence."





"I have three guiding principles. Bloom where you are planted, carry your sunshine inside of you and think twice but speak once," said Massey.

After leaving the automotive industry, Michelle became part of an IT team supporting state and local government clients. During her tenure in this industry, she was a key team member in expanding the business through developing relationships. In addition, Michelle provided mentoring support for new employees to assist them in developing their careers in IT, including countless women in all levels of the organization.

In 2006, Michelle moved to Dewpoint she was responsible for business development, marketing and charitable contributions. Michelle was instrumental in helping Dewpoint successfully transition from a company that sold products to a service company. She assisted in managing Dewpoint's overall brand and the organization's corporate image through marketing, public relations and community involvement.

Dewpoint's Joe Findlater had the privilege of working with Michelle on multiple sales at both EDS and

Dewpoint on various sales teams for 15 years. He says from his first day, it became clear that Michelle was the business development guru for the organization.

The Dewpoint office was transformed into a STEM learning center to provide the girls with a fun and educational environment to learn about STEM and empowerment. It also was used to educate the business community and potential donors on the program and the need for STEM talent.

"It gave girls an opportunity to understand math to learn math in an environment that was supportive," said Massey. "That was reaching a group of children and helping them understand what they can do with their lives and visualize where they want to go."

Lansing Built to Last— Created a competition to identify one business to have a storefront in downtown Lansing. Lansing Built to Last was a local startup competition held in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. She realized that for our community to thrive, businesses must have a strategy in place and be prepared to make it through the toughest of times.

Dewpoint has been a strong backer of downtown Lansing, and Michelle has been deeply involved in those efforts, most notably in Dewpoint's sponsorship of the construction of Rotary Park on the downtown Riverfront. Laurie Strauss Baumer, executive vice president of the Capital Region Community Foundation, says Michelle's commitment to the community is obvious.



"Michelle is passionate about improving the quality of life for others," said Baumer "She makes it a priority to learn about the community's greatest needs, determines which needs and opportunities are aligned with Dewpoint's goals and values, and advocates for supporting those with her leadership team."




Michelle's advice to up-and-coming women seeking to make their mark in the community is to do something because you believe in it not because you are trying to

LAFCU + LRCC: 12 Years of Lansing Community Impact in Education

hen LAFCU signed up to be the entertainment sponsor for the Lansing Regional Chamber's Annual Dinner in 2010, it was a way for the Michigan credit union to support the chamber. The sponsorship has become so much more over the past 12 years, impacting thousands of high school band students.

Back then, a high school instrumental group performed at the annual event, and LAFCU donated \$1,000 to the school's band program.

Over the years, the event expanded, and live music no longer fit the vision. However, the annual donation to a high school band program continued. The total donated now adds up to \$12,000, with the 2021 donation going to Eaton Rapids High School in October.

"This is a great example of how a sponsorship can evolve to make an even greater impact in the community," said Tim Daman, chamber president and CEO. "Helping band programs is almost an unintended positive consequence of the original agreement. In the first years of presenting donations to the schools, it was quickly apparent these funds could supplement tight school budgets. It was great having a partner who saw that, too, and continued the support of our region's educational systems."

School use of the funds has varied. The three Lansing high schools, as well as several other schools including Eaton Rapids, deposited the donation into their general band fund.

Donations to Mason and Perry high schools were used to kick off major fundraising campaigns. For Mason, the campaign was to replace marching band drumline equipment. For Perry High School, the fundraising was for new marching band uniforms.


St. Johns High School planned to purchase raincoats for its marching band, Charlotte High School was going to purchase small percussion instruments, and Holt High School wanted to use the money to support the orchestra: new music, new instruments and additional master classes.

"This is one of my favorite sponsorships," said Kelli Ellsworth Etchison, LAFCU chief marketing officer and chief diversity officer. "It directly benefits students, and it has a broader, long-lasting community aspect, which makes this support of arts in education an ideal partnership with the chamber.




