LRCC Annual Report: Championing Economic Growth & Prosperity

e are very proud to present our 2022 Annual Report and encourage you to explore it and see how our efforts over the past year have served to champion economic growth and connectivity for the business community in Greater Lansing.

2022 remained a year of economic pressures; with familiar foes like talent along with new challenges in the supply chain and inflation for businesses to navigate. But despite these tests, our business community responded with leadership and innovation.

We cut ribbons for everything from new global tech headquarters to new boutique bakeries. New restaurant concepts have opened in all corners of our community. And the LRCC provided new ways for our members to grow their business, boost connections, and get fresh ideas on issues such as leadership, management, human resources, and marketing.

Our membership engagement team excelled in 2022, welcoming 139 new members and achieving an astounding 90% member retention rate, much higher than the national average. Our communications team continues to grow our communications platforms including FOCUS magazine which had more than 50,000 impressions, our Facebook, Twitter and Linked In platforms, which achieved nearly 2 million engagements and the LRCC website, which realized more than 86,000 total views. Our mission of helping our members effectively connect with other in the business community was aided by our events & programming team which produced 55 events and 35 ribbon cuttings touching more than 6,000 participants!

Our advocacy team also had a stellar year in 2022. The LRC-PAC endorsed candidates in 31 races and realized a 96% success rate in the November elections. Our advocacy efforts also resulted in an unprecedented number of policy successes at the state and local level. LRCC continues to demonstrate regional leadership in many ways, most notably our partnership with the Enterprise Group of Jackson through which the Procurement Technical Assistance Center (PTAC) helped businesses in Ingham, Eaton and Clinton Counties secure federal contracts that created or retained more than 1,700 jobs.

For many years our member surveys have shown that talent attraction and retention is a leading concern for LRCC members. We have responded with numerous talent initiatives which we are proud to report continued to thrive in 2022. The 10 Over the Next Ten awards again selected 10 outstanding young professionals who are making their mark in the region. In May, 36 outstanding leaders completed the 2022-23 Leadership Lansing cohort, bringing to 295 the number of leaders that have completed this program in the past eight years! We are also thrilled with the continued growth of the ATHENA Leadership and ATHENA PowerLink programs and our new partnership with ATHENA WIN which we are certain will elevate that program to new levels.

We are incredibly grateful to all of our employers who continue to invest in the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce and support our many strategic initiatives. Your support and engagement provides the foundation for our success.

We thank you for allowing the Lansing Regional Chamber to support your business and provide you with the tools, resources and relationships that help your business and people connect, grow, and thrive! •

ITC Holdings: 20 Years of Shaping the Future of Reliable Energy

TC Holdings, the United States' largest independent electricity transmission company based in Novi, Michigan, recently celebrated its 20-year anniversary. Kwafo Adarkwa, Director of Public Affairs at ITC, shared the company's strategy for success.

Indian Trails Makes Big Improvements in Michigan's Transportation System

ust in the past few months, Indian Trails and its Michigan Flyer division have made several major enhancements in the bus transportation system for passengers in Michigan and beyond.

In February, Indian Trails, Inc., which operates one of the largest fleets of deluxe motorcoaches in Michigan, launched a new national bus-ticketing system developed by Transcor Data Services. This enabled Indian Trails to expand interline connections with 80 independent bus companies nationwide.

Interlining gives travelers the ability to buy a single ticket for a trip that includes two or more carriers in the national transportation network, including Amtrak.

"We're excited about growing our network of interlining carriers in order to give our customers comfortable, affordable and eco-friendly access to destinations all across North America," said Chad Cushman, president of Indian Trails.

In March, Indian Trails formed an interlining partnership with Megabus, which provides city-to-city express service to more than 300 communities throughout the U.S. and Canada.

That same month, Indian Trails expanded its own daily routes to include three roundtrips a day between Detroit and Chicago, each of which connect with its daily Michigan routes north of I-94.

And in April, Indian Trails and Trailways of New York also formed an interlining partnership that offers twice daily international service between Detroit and Toronto, with stops in Windsor, Chatham, London and Paris, Ontario.

Michigan Flyer on the Move

Michigan Flyer, LLC, whose frequent, daily motorcoach connections between East Lansing, Brighton, Ann Arbor, and Detroit Metro Airport have carried more than 2.3 million passengers since 2006, is also driving progress for passengers.

In May, it launched a new door-to-door service called "Hytch" that enables passengers to connect with their bus at the East Lansing Marriott, right from, or to, the door of their home, workplace, or anywhere else in the Hytch service area.





Hytch is already popular with residents and out-of-town visitors as an alternative to driving a car, getting a ride from family or friends, calling a taxi, etc.

"Hytch serves all business and residential addresses within a roughly 4-mile radius of our East Lansing location," says Michigan Flyer VP Ody Norkin. "So, Hytch rides are available to or from Downtown Lansing, the MSU campus, parts of Meridian Township, and more."

Hytch Details:

- Hytch tickets cost \$10 per person one way and are available only to Michigan Flyer passengers when booking their bus trips online.
- Hytch vehicles, all with experienced drivers, are newmodel, 5-passenger, ride-share vans, one of which is wheelchair accessible.
- Hytch rides are available Sunday through Friday from 3 a.m. to 11 p.m., but not on Saturday.

"We're especially happy that Hytch can help senior citizens, veterans, and people with disabilities to access Michigan Flyer, and then connect with early-morning, low-fare flights out of Detroit. It's a big bonus that Hytch helps out-of-town visitors to reach family and friends, plus a host of business, education, healthcare, and entertainment venues, in our area."

OurSpace (517) Selected as 2023 Lansing Built to Last Winner

urSpace (517) was recently selected from among six finalists as the winner of the second Lansing Built to Last competition. OurSpace (517) is the creation of Mikeyy Austin along with partners Hezekiah Trevino and Keyante Saxon. OurSpace (517) offers web planning, video production, marketing and strategic planning. The OurSpace Foundation is the non-profit arm that puts on community events.

"One of the biggest events we put on every year is the 517 Juneteenth weekend in REO Town," said Austin, who is founder and director of the company. "The first event in 2021 brought out 1,100 to 1,200 people. The second year we grew to a four-day event attended by more than 3,000."

After that success, OurSpace (517) decided to make a business engaged in activating corridors, by creating events and programs around Lansing that promote culture and wellness.

Lansing Built to Last is a local startup competition for entrepreneurs and idea-makers. The idea for the competition was developed by Michelle Massey who solicited support from several sponsor organizations that wanted to strengthen Greater Lansing by identifying businesses that bring people together and promote positive community development. The concept started during the Covid pandemic when there was an exodus of people and businesses from downtown Lansing.

"The purpose of the competition is to find the next great business for the Lansing region," said Michelle Massey of TechSmith. "If you have a business that people want to invest in that business will thrive."

Businesses that are looked at in the competition have to be sustainable after 5 p.m. They have to be a weekend attraction. They need a Greater Lansing presence and eventually must employ Lansing residents. They also need to have a business plan ready by June 2023. In addition, businesses cannot already have a bricks and mortar location and they can't have been in business for more than two years.

"We're not trying to find another location for an established business in Lansing," said Massey. "We're truly trying to find an entrepreneur that we can give a hand up to and not necessarily a handout."

As the winner of the Lansing Built to last competition, Our Space (517) will receive one year of free rent for its

business, courtesy of Eyde Development. They will also receive additional support from a variety of experts, including free energy efficiency consulting (BWL), free legal counsel (Warner Norcroo + Judd LLP), free business banking and financial services (MSUFCU), free branding, and website consultation services (Redhead Design), free IT support (Dewpoint), free video software and support (TechSmith) and free publicity support (RedHead). OurSpace will also receive a free one-year membership to the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce and the University Club of MSU, a travel voucher from Capital Region International Airport and transportation to the airport from Dean Transportation.

First runner-up in the Lansing Built to Last competition was Know Your Home remodeling, owned by Megan Dowell. Know Your Home is a spin-off from Do-Well Remodeling which Megan and her husband have operated for nearly ten years. Megan created Know Your Home to offer monthly classes to women who she said are often taken advantage of when it comes to home improvements and remodeling.

"I really wanted to give them an opportunity to fix their own home or problem areas in their home by themselves," said Dowell. "We bring all the materials and tools. We've done drywall and shown people how to change their lighting fixtures. We also teach them how to find a licensed contractor and verify a registered business so they would know who is coming into their home."

As first runner-up, Know Your Home remodeling will receive a year of retail space in Middle Village Micro Market in Downtown Lansing, which includes business coaching and support services.

The other finalists in the Lansing Built to Last competition include Black Rose Designs (Oscar Ivan Pena), Sew Sew Crafted (Yolanda Anderson), Lovely Junk Interactive (Todd C. Parkhill) and Grow the Earth (J.Moore). ●



where he has been serving for the last 13 years. He has made it his mission to make sure the company's actions reflect what they stand by.

"When I first got into my role there was definitely a lot of work to be done, we've been very intentional in promoting diversity not only our board but our employes as well so that everyone feels they have a voice here. Our employee base as of now stands at around 35-40% for diverse peoples."

CASE is also a Community Development Financial Institution (CDFI) making sure that at least 60% of their total lending/services benefit low-income communities. CASE also takes pride in helping the unbanked and underserved by providing services like Responsible Rides, which provides car loans to people with low credit scores as long as they show they are have some sort of income and a few other minor factors. They also have Ingham Country jail program that provides financial literacy for inmates who once released can open a CASE account.

"Credit unions were founded on people helping people and we really live by that. Not just affluent people but everybody deserves to have financial services. I am so humbled to receive an award like this because we live this every single day," said Benson. "It is so important that we reflect the community that we are in. When you walk into a CASE Credit Union you should feel

comfortable working with us and comfortable that we will understand you as an individual."

Benson doesn't plan to stop there either. With current ideas in the works for programs they already have in place, as well as a staff invested in seeing what they can do next, there is no end to the work that can be done to continue to serve the community.

"Our work is never going to stop," said Benson. "We're going to continue to be intentional with making sure diversity, equity and inclusivity is a part of who we are." •

Neogen Founder James Herbert Receives Community Service Award

ames (Jim) Herbert, founder and longtime CEO of Lansing-based Neogen Corporation was honored as the recipient of the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce Community Service Award. Herbert was recognized for his work leading Neogen in becoming a global leader in food and animal safety as well as his philanthropic endeavors, including substantial donations he and his wife

Judith made towards the construction of Sparrow Health Systems Herbert-Herman Cancer Center. Herbert said he feels a lot of pride for the unexpected recognition.

"When you are honored by your home folks it means more than coming from someplace else," said Herbert.

Neogen went public in 1990 and has been recognized several times by Forbes Magazine as one of the top 200 Small Businesses in the country. Today, Neogen tops \$1 billion in annual revenue with nearly 3,000 employees globally. Did Herbert ever envision Neogen would grow to what it is today?

"I never put caps on my dreams, said Herbert. "I saw what was happening in biotechnology and saw that particularly in the diagnostics area there were developments that were going to help make food and livestock safer. We could also see that there was a future for the use of genomics in all of this."

In addition to being one of the Lansing region's largest employers, Neogen has also played a large hand in rejuvenating several urban neighborhoods in the city through the acquisition and transformation of former school buildings which have become office and research labs. Herbert said the decision to purchase their first school building came at a time when the company didn't have a lot of money and was renting lab space from Michigan State University.

"The size of the classrooms lent themselves well for laboratories or partitioned off as office space," said Herbert. "They also had plenty of plumbing for the lab space. We prided ourselves on not investing too heavily in bricks and mortar but instead chose to invest in manpower."

Jim and Judi Herbert, both cancer survivors, donated \$2.5 million to the construction of the Herbert-Herman Cancer Center, which opened in 2017. Their donation helped inspire

\$8.6 million in gifts from 971 donors. In 2022, the Herbert's made the largest gift in Sparrow history, donating \$5 million to establish The Genomics Endowment for Diagnosis & Treatment of Cancer to fund advances in the diagnosis and treatment of cancer through genomics and precision medicine at Sparrow Herbert-Herman Cancer Center.

"We look at what we've done as a way to give back," said Herbert. "In the bible it says 'to him who much is given, much is expected.' We were certainly given a lot and we've been trying to give some of that back."

Among his enormous contributions in his career, Jim Herbert says he is most proud of his leadership in helping build Neogen to a great organization. Herbert is also proud of the wealth that Neogen created for many people including employees who purchased stock options and became millionaires and investors in the community who were able to send their children to college from the money they made on Neogen stock.

"We were doing things in biotechnology that nobody has ever done before," said Herbert. "As I watched those products being built that were saving people's lives, I listened to employees saying 'Mr. Herbert I felt so good when I went home last night because I knew the things I did today saved somebody's life.' I was awfully proud of that attitude of all our people."




