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












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Positive Steps Towards Getting Lansing on the Right Track

imilar to many cities across the country, the City of Lansing's recovery from COVID remains a work in progress. Downtown Lansing continues to redefine itself in large part due to a slower than expected return to in person work for State of MI employees. While challenges remain, there are some encouraging signs that suggest Lansing is moving towards better times.

Recent polling from Advanced Greater Lansing identified the top concerns of city residents likely to vote in this year's city elections.

Poll findings show that 22.4% of respondents cite public safety as the most important issue for city leaders to address. Though 41.5% of those surveyed said they believe the city of is on the wrong track, that is a sharp improvement from just one year ago when 55% said the city was headed in the wrong direction. The number of people who feel Lansing is headed in the right direction increased in the past year from 28% to 33.2%.

Public safety has slowly become a top issue for residents over the past several years. This underscores the importance of prioritizing and investing in strategies that enhance safety measures and strengthen community policing initiatives.

The poll also indicated that roads are the second most significant issue for residents. The condition of our infrastructure greatly impacts our daily lives and our economy. It is crucial that we continue to advocate for increased funding and sustainable solutions to improve our roads and transportation network.

These issues and others identified in the poll are critical to our ability to create more businesses and jobs in the city. Investment in addressing key issues is vital. That's why we are working with the Capitol Caucus to secure funding for critical infrastructure and economic development projects supported by more than a dozen regional organizations including the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce. The projects are part of the \$500 million dollar Capital Region Improvement Support Package (CRISP) and will provide a much-needed boost in the efforts to revitalize Lansing's central business district.

In addition to much-needed investment, it is equally critical that our elected officials understand the voter concerns and are willing to work collaboratively with stakeholders in the region to address these issues. The Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce Political Action Committee has endorsed four candidates in this year's Lansing City Council elections for whom we urge your support. We believe that Tamera Carter (At-Large), Trini Lopez-Pehlivanoglu (At-Large), Ryan Kost, 1st Ward, and Adam Hussain, 3rd Ward, are leaders who can be difference-makers in driving positive progress for Lansing.

We all have a stake in the revitalization of our region's central city. We cannot have a healthy region without a healthy city of Lansing. It is important that we all do our part to support local businesses. To that end, I encourage you to read this month's feature story on tourism and join us in supporting the Greater Lansing Convention and Visitors Bureau's Love Lansing Like a Local campaign. There is something for people of all ages. Whatever your passion, we have it all in the Lansing region!

Sparrow Health System to Become University of Michigan Health-Sparrow, Effective April 1, 2024

parrow Health System will become University of Michigan Health-Sparrow, effective April 1, 2024, as part of Sparrow joining the Michigan Medicine clinical network, according to health system officials.

Sparrow leaders say they have selected the new name to leverage the strength of the University of Michigan worldwide brand with the historical significance of the Sparrow brand.

"University of Michigan Health-Sparrow reflects a partnership going forward, building on the equity of both brands," according to James Dover, Sparrow President and CEO. "Sparrow has an unmatched reputation in Mid-Michigan while U-M Health is the preeminent health system in Michigan. The new name highlights a continued commitment to bringing patients the right care at the right time at the right place, closer to home."

Sparrow joined University of Michigan Health in April 2023, contributing significantly to what is now a \$7.8-billion organization, the second largest health system in the state.

Albert EL Fresco Brings Family Friendly Fun to Downtown East Lansing

n innovation that started as a result of the Covid pandemic has become a popular, family friendly destination in downtown East Lansing. Albert EL Fresco is a pedestrian-friendly area located along Albert Avenue, between Abbot Road and M.A.C. Avenue. The space features outdoor seating and tables, rocking chairs, hammocks, decorative lighting, shade amenities, games and more.

It all began in 2020 after Covid forced everything to shut down. City officials heard from members of the public for a desire to have outdoor gathering areas.

"It was very bare bones at first," said Matt Apostle, community and economic development specialist, City of East Lansing. "It was metal picnic tables and was setup solely for the safety component."

A combination of a crowd funding campaign, support from the Downtown Development Authority and Downtown Management Board spurred the concept to a new level in 2021.

"We decided to move forward with much brighter and more attractive space," said Apostle. "We modified barricades into planter boxes and transformed whiskey barrels into holders for sail shades. We also added various types of seating including rocking chairs and Adirondacks as well as turf grass. In 2022 and 2023, the city has invested in sturdier infrastructure that can be brought back every year. It is now a community staple."

Albert EL Fresco has brought a sizeable amount of foot traffic to downtown East Lansing between the months of May and August, when traffic from Michigan State University students is down.

This year, the city has focused on adding more weekly programming. Every Thursday is game night which includes a variety of activities and games, including giant Connect 4, cornhole, giant Jenga, ping pong, giant chess and more. In addition to live music visitors can also look for the East Lansing Public Library's Library on the Go mobile pop-up library. Other special events that take place in Albert EL Fresco each year include the Community Chalk Walk, the Greater Lansing Area Moms (GLAM) Jam Summer Kickoff event, East Lansing PRIDE, and the Moonlight ExtravaGRANDza.

"We are excited to have this space become more entrenched in the identity of East Lansing and particularly the downtown," said Apostle. "We think it is a great space and that the public should come down and enjoy it."

Holy Cross Services: Meeting the Needs of Michigan's Children

years ago, Holy Cross Services (HCS) was founded to meet the needs of Michigan children with nowhere else to turn.



supported in a big way by the community. The March 2023 HNM fundraiser raised \$311,000 to operate the New Hope Community Center and gathered approximately one hundred attendees. The committee includes Holy Cross board members, donors, and community members.

HCS has a mission to bring hope, promote change and help people live free, healthy, and productive lives. HCS specializes in the empowerment and trauma recovery of children and families engaged in the child welfare system. They also support neighbors, veterans, and community members to end their episodes of homelessness. Their success in delivering on that mission is the reason recently appointed HCS President & CEO, Susan Rosas, came on board this year.

"I am so thrilled to be a part of Holy Cross Services, not just because of our incredible history and impact across Michigan, but because this team has the heart to help people find safety and strength through connection," said Rosas.

One of the most visible and impactful services HCS provides in the Lansing region is the New Hope Community

Center, located at 430 N. Larch in Lansing. Since HCS took over the Center in 2018, New Hope has been providing free meals, emergency shelter, veterans housing and more.

New Hope Community Center is one of the region's largest homeless shelters and it is the area's only 'low-barrier' facility – which means New Hope eliminates as many barriers as possible to ensure all neighbors have access to emergency shelter. The New Hope Community Center in Lansing provides:

- **Community Kitchen** Serves over 250 meals per day including breakfast, lunch, and dinner for anyone in the community who needs help.
- **Day Center** Provides a warm, safe space to rest, recharge and access case management.
- **Emergency Shelter** Overnight shelter for individuals with nowhere to turn.
- Family Sheltering Ensures families with children remain together during an episode of homelessness.
- Veterans' Housing Shelter and support for veterans experiencing homelessness so they can transition to permanent housing.

"We envision a Michigan where family and home are certainties for everyone. That encompasses having our children with their parents and families in safe places. Our goal is to ensure that everyone has somewhere to stay, a safe home to be in," said Alexis Dye, director of communications for Holy Cross Services.



HCS provides residential treatment services for Michigan's children who are in the foster care and juvenile justice system. Residential treatment is available in Saginaw at St. Vincent youth home. Older youth aged 16 – 19 receive care in Holy Cross Services' Independent Living Program (ILP) in Saginaw and Flint. Licensing and adoption services for parents and children occur around the state.

Holy Cross Services continues to adapt and grow to meet the ever-changing needs of the community. As a result, HCS is currently fundraising to build out two additional floors at the New Hope Community Center in Lansing. This will enable HCS to provide more services to the growing unsheltered community.

Ingham Health Plan Celebrates 25 Years

ngham Health Plan (IHP) is celebrating their 25th anniversary of serving thousands of Ingham County residents who are uninsured and in need of health services.

IHP has delivered healthcare access to over 85,000 low-income, uninsured residents in Ingham County since the plan's creation in 1998. These residents don't qualify for Medicaid, Medicare, or have other health insurance.

People with annual household income up to 250% of the federal poverty level (i.e. household of 1 earning up to \$36,450, household of 2 earning up to \$49,300, etc) can get basic access to medical, dental, and pharmacy services. With IHP,


members can go to a doctor for office visits, preventive services and mental health support; receive specialty services and outpatient labs, x-rays and tests; get the medicines needed to manage health conditions; and see a dentist. IHP contracts with local providers to deliver these health services

"Ingham Health Plan is undoubtedly a valuable resource and connector for people facing barriers to care. Through IHP, underserved residents within Ingham County can access critical, timely and affordable healthcare services that meet their unique needs.

Ingham Community Health Centers appreciates its long-standing partnership with IHP. We are committed to a long-term partnership that creates access to a higher quality of life for underserved residents in Ingham County," says Kris Drake, MHA, FACHE, Executive Director of Ingham Community Health Centers.

Today, IHP continues to serve as a safety net for uninsured residents in Ingham County. As thousands of Medicaid beneficiaries are at risk of losing health

The CROWN Act Signed Into Law

he CROWN Act has achieved a significant milestone as it has successfully passed both the State Senate, with a vote of 33-5, and the State House of Representatives, with a vote of 100-7. The Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce (LRCC) has been a staunch supporter of this legislation. Governor Whitmer signed the CROWN Act into law at local small business Moneyball Sportswear.

"This passage of the CROWN Act represents a remarkable stride in the right direction," emphasized Steve Japinga, Senior Vice President of Public Affairs at LRCC. "By embracing this legislation, we send a powerful message that Michigan is dedicated to fostering an environment where diversity, inclusion, and equal opportunity flourish. Through such actions, we attract and retain talented individuals from all backgrounds, ultimately strengthening our businesses, communities, and economy as a whole."

State Senator Sarah Anthony, representing Lansing, reintroduced the legislation known as The CROWN Act, which stands for "Create a Respectful and Open World



for Natural Hair." This proposed law aims to prohibit discrimination by expanding state statutes to recognize an individual's hair as a characteristic of race. It is worth noting that Michigan is one of the 30 states that currently lack protection for traditionally black hairstyles.

The LRCC actively supports this legislation, recognizing its potential to help businesses establish more inclusive and equitable workplaces.



One industry that deserves more attention as an economic driver of the regional economy is tourism. An economic impact study conducted in 2018 by Anderson Economic Group showed the local tourism industry generates over \$682 million in spending at local businesses and employs nearly 11,000 local residents. The region welcomes 5.3 million visitors annually and contributes more

Pingston says the industry started to see some real progress in the fall of 2022 when attendance at meetings and conventions started to pick up. Michigan State University's return to the campus brought students, visitors and families to campus for various events.

than \$29 million a year in sales tax revenue to the state of Michigan.

> The foundation of the key meetings and convention business in the region is the Lansing Entertainment and Public Facilities Authority (LEPFA) which operates the Lansing Center, acts as landlord for Jackson Field and also operates Grosbeck Golf Course, Silver Bells in the City and numerous other events downtown. LEPFA drives economic impact by bringing people both in and out of the region downtown to spend dollars.

Julie Pingston, president & CEO of the Greater Lansing Convention and Visitors Bureau (GLCVB), notes the Anderson report was conducted pre-pandemic. She expects to have the numbers updated in another year after the industry has more fully recovered from the pandemic. Like

most urban areas in Michigan, Lansing's rebound has been a bit slower than other areas.

"The other way we drive economic impact is by the people we bring downtown building up other businesses around our entities," said Scott Keith. President & CEO, LEPFA. "We want the events to drive more business and activity around the region."

"A lot of our emphasis as a destination is based on meetings and conventions, amateur sporting events and business travel," said Pingston. "All of those have been slower to come back than leisure travel for people going to a beach

Covid completely shut down the meetings and events industry for several months. Keith says the initial bounce back was strong because people wanted to get back together.

"Some industries are continuing to struggle whether it is due to staffing or how the economic climate is doing," said Keith. "For the most part, we have seen everything bounce back to around 80%. It could go higher, but we don't expect it back to 100% until 2025."

Keith says plans are in the works that will spur activity including upgrades to the Lansing Center, including improved technologies. Another focus will be improving food service operations including more "grab and go" stations which have become popular for meeting attendees. LEPFA is also looking at a new master plan for Grosbeck, as the golf industry has enjoyed a resurgence coming out of Covid.

Regional Attractions Make Their Mark

Lansing has several major draws that attract visitors to the region. The State Capitol has always served as an anchor for the region's tourism industry, drawing an estimated

250,000 visitors per year. The impact of the Capitol is most noticeable by the dozens of school buses parked downtown during the school year as students and teachers from around the state come to learn about state government and visit the Capitol building. The desire to connect with state government is a major driver of the region's meeting and convention business and significantly impacts local restaurants

and hotels. In July of 2022 the state opened a new \$40 million underground welcome center on the north side of the Capitol. Heritage Hall features a 40,000-square-foot visitor center, meeting rooms and educational exhibit.

Much like the State Capitol drives tourism, so does Michigan State University, which attracts students, staff and faculty from around the world. The lure of major college athletics is evident to anyone who drives through East Lansing on a football weekend or at the sold out Breslin Center during basketball season. Culturally, since 1982, MSU's Wharton Center for Performing Arts draws crowds from the entire state. When Wharton hosts mega-hit Broadway shows like Wicked or Lion King, up to 42% of the tickets have been purchased from outside the tri-county area.

The Eli and Edythe Broad Art Museum at MSU has become a leading statewide attraction as a center for contemporary

art. The Broad Museum's latest attraction, which opened in June, is entitled Shouldn't You Be Working: 100 years of Working from Home. The exhibition considers the domestic sphere as an ever-changing site of labor. Computers, the Internet, and mobile phones have enabled a variety of new labor practices, an unprecedented amount of which are situated within the home: white-collar home offices, self-employed social media influencers, the hidden labor of coders and offshore renderers now coexist with traditional domestic work by nannies, caretakers, and homemakers.

"Michigan State University was a pioneering institution of higher learning, which, in the late 19th century, began to look at homemaking—working from and in the home—

> as a serious profession," says MSU Broad Art Museum Associate Curator Teresa Fankhänel. "This legacy endures today in the university's curriculum and in the physical layout of the campus. Who works in the home and the type of work that is performed, however, has changed tremendously, not least due to technological advances in computation and the internet. The show explores what it means to work from home, past

and present—between new-found freedom and total surveillance, and between traditional domestic labor and the high-tech gig economy."

Impression 5 in downtown Lansing is a major draw for students and families. In 2018-19 Impression 5 had 170,000 visitors, an all-time high.

"We saw visitors from all but two counties in the state of Michigan and all 50 states," said Erik Larson, executive director, Impression 5. "Those numbers went down during the pandemic, but we are starting to see a nice surge and we are creeping back up to near pre-pandemic levels."

Impression 5 just finished celebrating its 50th anniversary and has completed a successful capital campaign in which it raised \$5 million. Impression 5 has always prided itself on building its own exhibits and will continue to do so.

Some of the funds from the capital campaign will be used to bring in travelling exhibits. Impression 5 just finished hosting DC Super Heroes which was an exhibit from the Children's Museum of Indianapolis. In May, Impression 5 opened Doc McStuffins based on Disney Junior's Peabody Award-winning television series. Doc McStuffins: The Exhibit will run through Sunday, Sept. 24. The highly interactive English and Spanish bilingual experience will transport kids and families from Doc's backyard clinic to the McStuffins Toy Hospital. There, families are invited to help Doc perform check-ups and diagnose toy patients, while learning about healthy habits, compassion, and nurturing care as they explore as "doctors-in-training".

Potter Park Zoo is another family favorite, attracting an average of 180,000 visitors

per year. The Society Executive Director of Potter Park, Amy Morris, says the Zoo offers something different as an attraction.


"We offer people the opportunity to be in the middle of a city and connect with nature," said Morris. "Our goal is to encourage conservation of animals and the natural world. Our hope is that all of our guests get that experience when they walk through the gates."

This year, Potter Park has initiated conversation education stations throughout the Zoo.

"Not only do visitors get to tour the Zoo and look at the animals, they get an opportunity to engage with people and receive additional information about conservation status of the animals and steps they can take at home to improve the environment," said Morris. "We feel that has changed the experience of coming to the Zoo."

The summer is prime time for visitors at the Zoo. Among the numerous special events on tap are the annual Zoo Days on July 11 & 12. Visitors can enter the family friendly event for a reduced admission of \$2. July 20 from 5 until 8 p.m. is an adults only event, Zoo Nights, which is a casual, happy hour-style event that will feature tastes from local restaurants and beverage companies. Visitors can see the zoo after-hours, visit with the animals, and enjoy yard games with friends all while savoring tasty treats.





Old Town Lansing, on the city's north end, is a cultural and creative district that offers unique experiences through special events and eclectic shops and is a significant contributor to the regional tourism industry.

Old Town Lansing has 54 first-floor store fronts, 31 of which are unique retail boutique spaces. There are 14 restaurants, five art galleries and Urban Beat, a music venue that showcases the diverse music culture of the region. The River Walk connects Old Town to the rest of the city. The area is also known for its festivals including the Scrapfest on July 14 and Jazz Fest on Aug. 3.

Sports is Big Business

The love of sports has a significant impact on the local tourism industry. Michigan State athletics drive visitors from both

within the region and from around the country to local hotels, restaurants, and other attractions.

In recognition of the importance of sports in tourism, GLCVB created the Greater Lansing Sports Authority in 2007. The Authority hosts 80-100 amateur sporting events a year. Last year, those events brought 50,000 athletes and more than 230,000 spectators to the region.

"It's been extremely successful for us in terms of having these regional or national events take place here and then they keep coming back," said Pingston. "Our team is extremely dedicated to going the extra mile to make our community stand out."

The Michigan Trapshooting Association in Mason has hosted national events bringing in people from all over the country. The Lansing Center in downtown Lansing, which is typically fairly quiet in the summer, will be filled in the month of July with sporting events including a major youth wrestling event and the National Horseshoe Pitchers Association World Championships. In May, the region hosted the NCAA Men's Division 1 Regional Golf Championship at Eagle Eye Golf Course in Bath Township. Next year, Forest Akers Golf Course will host the NCAA D1 Regional Golf Championship. In June, the Michigan High School Athletic Association hosted state tournaments for baseball, softball and soccer all over the same weekend at MSU facilities.

The GLCVB also helps visiting athletic teams connect to regional attractions during their visit. A favorite has been High Caliber Karting and Entertainment in the Meridian Mall. High Caliber bills itself as Michigan's number one indoor action and entertainment park features high-speed go kart racing, axe throwing, rage rooms, the Battle Field, games and more. The GLCVB Sports Authority has found High Caliber as an attractive draw visiting sports teams looking to relax during their visit.

"We offer a different, more action-packed experience to individuals who want to go home with a really great memory of team bonding and lifelong memories," said Jacki Krumnow, High Caliber Karting's master of mischief.

A particular draw at High Caliber these days is combat karting which is a hybrid of virtual reality inside an actual go kart.

"You get to battle your friends on the go kart track and slow them down with sci fi weaponry," said Krumnow. "It is the next evolution of combat karting."

Love Lansing Like a Local

The GLCVB created the Love Lansing Like a Local campaign during the pandemic to encourage people locally who weren't doing much travelling at the time to visit local attractions. As the campaign has expanded, it is also intended to reach out to people travelling from outside the region.

"Many people that come to our community are here visiting friends and family," said Pingston. "By highlighting all the things to do in the region, people know what they can experience with friends and family while they are here."

The GLCVB recently launched the new digital Lansing Experience Pass. The pass allows users to get discounts and accumulate points as they check in to various Greater Lansing attractions, museums, outdoor recreation spots, arts venues, and family-friendly activities. The pass is free and available all year. The digital pass can be acquired at www.lansing.org/experience-pass.

When visiting local attractions, passholders canreceive discounts and accumulate points for decals, socks, playing cars, t-shirts and more.

Love Lansing Like a Local highlights all the attractions in the region by categories. Each week during the summer a specific theme is highlights. For example, the theme for the week of July 3 is arts and culture. Whether you're on the Lansing River Trail and encountering all the creativity of this year's Art Path or planning a visit to the MSU Broad Art Museum for some contemporary exhibits, you can find art of every genre throughout our community. Local artists display their talents at numerous festivals and events throughout the year. Meghan Martin, executive director of the Arts Council of Greater Lansing, says the arts provide a boost to local business by bringing additional people into an area. The Arts Council Lansing invests in local culture by providing grants to artists.

"Every dollar that we are putting into it, we get ten-fold in tourism and local business dollars," said Martin. "It really is an opportunity for us to work with local artists and encourage any work they are doing in a creative capacity."

One of the artistic highlights of the summer is the Annual Arts Night which the Arts Council hosts in Old Town. It is a monthly event on the first or second Friday of the month from May through October. Arts Night Out is a free

walkable event that partners local artists with business in Old Town, to show their work in non-traditional spaces.

One of the local staples on the cultural scene is the Music in the Park series sponsored by the Grand Ledge Chamber of Commerce. Music in the Park is a free concert series that takes place every Thursday evening through August 17 from 7 until 9:00 p.m. at beautiful Jaycee Park along the river in downtown Grand Ledge. Families enjoy the opportunity to picnic, music and a really nice atmosphere.

"We have music for all ages and interest and of all different genres," said Amy Hoyes, CTA, executive director of the Grand Ledge Chamber of Commerce. "It brings the community together to sit and connect with each other in an open park area. You can bring your own food or enjoy some of the vendors we have on site each week."

A National Leader in Sensory Friendly Attractions

Since 2018, GLCVB has been working to make the community more sensory friendly for visitors traveling on the autism spectrum. Working with the Mid-Michigan Autism Association, local organizations including Potter Park Zoo, Lansing Art Gallery and Impression 5 are among attractions creating sensory friendly programming. The Wharton Center for the Performing Arts continues to provide sensory friendly at local businesses and employs performances every year.

"We're extremely happy that this all came back after the pandemic because that could have easily gone away," said Pingston. "Everyone made it a priority and it remains a big part of our community focus."

The Lansing region is gaining national recognition for its work in this area. TravelAbility, a national magazine for people with accessibility needs, has designated the Lansing region as one of the top 3 destinations in the country for travel for those on the autism spectrum.

GLCVB trained over 1,000 front-line employees in the tourism and hospitality industry to serve guest with

accessibility needs. GLCVB is currently conducting an accessibility inventory of all the services available in the local hospitality inventory, so visitors to the region will be able to go online and plan ahead according to what each facility offers. This fall, GLCVB plans a tourism accessibility summit which will include additional training for those in the industry to be better equipped to meet the accessibility needs of their quests.

"The goal is for our destination to be welcoming to ALL," said Pingston.

An Eye Towards the Future

Challenges remain as the industry continues to dig out from the pandemic and like many industries is facing a workforce shortage for which there is no shortterm solution.

> Despite the challenges, industry leaders feel the region is very well-positioned for a robust future.

"Long term for the region we are primed for great success," said LEPFA's Scott Keith. "We have new hotels and new attractions happening. We are always strong because we are the seat of state government and we have a large major university. Those things attract conventions and entertainment offerings. Being in the center of the state is great for easy access."

"I think all of us understand that we need to continue to strengthen the cultural and tourism assets to keep pushing that forward," said Impression 5's Erik Larson. "I feel like we have a really great foundation to build upon. We are creating some really special, unique things that are Lansing specific and those are things that we should be proud of." •



Advance Greater Lansing Poll Identifies Public Safety as the Most Important Issue Among City of Lansing Voters

MORE THAN 40 PERCENT OF VOTERS SURVEYED SAY THE CITY IS HEADED IN THE WRONG DIRECTION

poll commissioned by Advance Greater Lansing shows that public safety is the leading concern among voters in the city of Lansing. The poll of citizens who are likely to vote in the 2023 Lansing City Council election was conducted by Greenlee Consulting. Poll findings show that 22.4% of respondents cite public safety as the most important issue for City Council members to address followed by roads (19.6%) and neighborhoods (14.2%). Other significant issues that emerged in the survey were housing, homelessness, job creation/opportunities, taxes and business corridors.



"These finding validate the trends we have seen over the past couple of years," said Tim Daman, president & CEO, Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce (LRCC). "These poll results provide valuable insights into the concerns and president of the concerns are concerns.

valuable insights into the concerns and preferences of Lansing residents ahead of the upcoming City Council elections."


Perhaps reflecting frustration over perceived inaction on leading issues in the city of Lansing, 41.5% of voters surveyed said they feel the city of Lansing is headed in the wrong direction. 33.2% say they believe the city is on the right track. The poll results come just weeks before Lansing voters head to the polls to determine the make-up of the next Lansing City Council.

"Candidates and policymakers should take note of these findings to better understand the priorities of the electorate and address the pressing issues that matter most to the community so we can get the city back on the right track," said Steve Japinga, senior vice president for public affairs, LRCC.


The issues identified all have a direct impact in growing business and jobs in the City of Lansing. •

Road Construction Updates in the Greater Lansing Region

n May, the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce (LRCC) organized a virtual construction update session with the Michigan Department of Transportation (MDOT). During this informative session, MDOT officials provided LRCC members with updates on the progress of ongoing projects in our region, along with their plans for future improvements. A significant amount of infrastructure investment, totaling \$800 million, is currently underway in the Greater Lansing region until 2028.

Notable ongoing projects include:

- I-69 from I-94 to Island Hwy.: This project has a budget of \$210 million.
- I-69 from I-96 to Airport Road: This project has a budget of \$65 million.

- Ingham/Jackson County Line to M-36: This project has a budget of \$67 million.
- M-43 (Grand River) from Park Lake Road to Oak Point Road: This project has a budget of \$15 million.
- I-496 from Lansing Road to Grand River: This project has a budget of \$82 million.
- I-96 Bridges at Billwood Hwy., M-99, and Washington Ave: This project has a budget of \$40 million.

The LRCC's virtual construction update provided valuable insights into these ongoing projects, keeping LRCC members informed about the region's infrastructure developments and the significant investments being made to enhance transportation in our area.




