

## Celebrating Regional Growth is a Big Deal

ne of the most rewarding programs that I have had the privilege to be associated with during my tenure at the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce is the annual Celebration of Regional Growth Awards (CORG). When we first started the program in 2006, some people wondered if the region would have enough exciting projects for CORG to continue as an annual event. Now in its 18th year, the program and our region are stronger than ever. In fact, the 85 CORG recipients have combined to invest more than \$3 billion into Greater Lansing. That is definitely worth celebrating!

This year's honorees reflect the diverse nature of our growing regional economy. Our region is widely recognized as a leader in advance manufacturing as reflected by the decision by **ATESTEO**, a German company that is a leader in the production of EV drivetrains, to locate its North American headquarters in East Lansing. **The Shyft Group**, located in Charlotte, has launched a \$16 million expansion and upgrade of its local facilities to accommodate for production of their Blue Arc Commercial EVs. The investments by ATESTEO and Shyft Group in conjunction with General Motors/Ultium's \$3 billion investment in an EV Battery Plant in Delta Township are helping forge Lansing's identity as a global leader in emerging EV technologies.

It was back in 1982 when **Neogen** was formed here in Lansing. Neogen has grown into a global powerhouse in the food safety, animal safety and genomics arenas. Despite its success, Neogen has never forgotten its roots in Lansing. We are proud to recognize Neogen with a CORG award for its latest investment in our region, a \$70 million expansion of their food safety operation near downtown Lansing.

Lansing's Old Town neighborhood has long hoped for the redevelopment of the Temple Building which has finally been accomplished thanks to the leadership of another CORG honoree, **Michigan Community Capital (MCC),** which worked with multiple stakeholders to coordinate a \$10 million investment which dramatically transformed the building into Temple Lofts, a beautiful five story mixed use building.

Much as MCC has dramatically upgraded a neighborhood, so too has our other CORG honoree **MSUFCU** which has helped changed the face of downtown East Lansing with a \$43 million investment. The amazing building that is home to a branch office and seven floors of multi-use space that will become a community asset.

A big part of the mission of a Chamber of Commerce is to celebrate growth in its region, which is why we have an important showcase like the Celebration of Regional Growth. We should all take pride in the growth that is occurring in our region in advanced manufacturing, financial services and insurance, technology, higher education, transportation, healthcare and more. This growth has created a thriving and vibrant region of which we should all be proud. It's important that we take time every year to recognize and celebrate the investments so many leading businesses continue to make in our region.

Finally, a special thank you to our longtime CORG sponsors PNC Bank and Loomis Law Firm. I applaud their commitment to our region and thank them for making the CORG Awards a great community celebration. ●

## Empowering Tomorrow's Workforce: Manufacturing Day Offers Students a Glimpse into Exciting Career Paths

n October 6, members of the Capital Area Manufacturing Council extended their hospitality to hundreds of students from Ingham, Eaton, Clinton, Livingston, Shiawassee and Ionia counties. These presentations were a vital component of a nationwide initiative aimed at reshaping the public perception of manufacturing. Activities included tours, interactive workshops, employee Q&A sessions, technology showcases, and mentorship sessions focusing on career pathways.

This year, however, the climate of manufacturing is different. We gathered during a time when the automotive industry is experiencing strikes, and tiered suppliers are making difficult decisions about layoffs. This undoubtedly creates unprecedented challenges to the ecosystem that we cherish. Many of our students were scheduled to visit these facilities.

## New Ingham County Health Director, Dr. Adenike Shoyinka, Unveils Departmental Goals and Achievements

r. Adenike Shoyinka is the newest health director and public health officer of the Ingham County Health Department. She took over after the retirement of Linda Vail in February of 2023.



Dr. Shoyinka brings years of experience to this position, having joined the Ingham County Health

Shoyinka

Department in 2019 as medical director after spending time in clinical practice. She is board-certified in internal medicine, preventive medicine and infectious diseases.

"I am truly honored to serve in this position and work alongside my colleagues, community partners and local government members," said Dr. Shoyinka. "I could not have a better set of leaders, at every level of the organization, by my side to protect, preserve, improve and advocate for the community we serve."

Dr. Shoyinka faces daily battles against public health threats both known and unknown. Some of the threats include future pandemics, mental health issues, community violence, communicable diseases and substance use disorders.

Since the height of the pandemic, the Ingham County Health Department has been reviewing its processes and resources for responding to public health crises/ emergencies.

"I am proud of the progress we have made towards reviewing our processes, but there is still a lot of work to do," said Dr. Shoyinka. "We are making strides alongside our community partners, who supported us through the pandemic, to go back to the drawing board and ensure preparedness for the benefit of all those in Ingham County and throughout Michigan. Our goal is to try to continue to improve access to public health services, particularly in populations that data show are more impacted by public health emergencies. We are also working rebuild and increase trust amongst our community members, which was eroded by the Covid-19 pandemic."

The Ingham County Health Department has recently made a great advancement in addressing the battle against substance use disorders. The installation of Narcan vending machines throughout Lansing has been a huge win for the Ingham County Health Department.

"These vending machines work to combat the Opioid Crisis through harm reduction," said Dr. Shoyinka. "They include Narcan, alcohol wipes, condoms, fentanyl test strips, first aid kits, CPR mouth shields and many more items for free. We want to reduce the harm of substance use disorder and meet each individual where they are at. Providing resources to try to keep an individual alive, maybe the next day they will be in a space for recovery."

Dr. Shoyinka suggests that community members who have friends and family members with Opioid Use Disorder or who may potentially encounter someone having an Opioid overdose, carry Narcan and use the resources provided by the Ingham County Health Department.

## Learning the Tools of the Trade: Lansing's First Construction Science Expo

The Michigan Aggregates Association and the Impression 5 Science Center recently held Lansing's very first Construction Science Expo that gave young students the opportunity to use spider canes, excavators, jackhammers and more to explore future career opportunities in fields such as engineering, surveying, carpentry, and wielding.

"We thought it went really well, we tried to identify hands on projects with the folks that participated to garner some interest for the careers associated with that," said Price Dobernick, business manager, Plumbers and Pipefitters Union Local 333. "The feedback we got was positive and we would absolutely come back if the opportunity was there."



Plumbers and Pipefitters has an apprenticeship program called the United Association Apprenticeship that is always looking for new recruits. Organizers of the expo hoped the event would serve as a catalyst to spark some new interest in the program. The apprenticeship program provides occupational training in the Plumbing, Pipefitting, and HVAC service field that combines on-the-job experience with supplemental classroom instruction. Similar to a full-ride scholarship, the program provides over 9,000 on-the-job hours and 1,000 classroom hours over 5 years and provides the applicants with paid work as well as a Journeymen to receive multiple weld certifications and specialized skills.

"We always believe in earning while you learn. When you start with us you go into no student debt and the cost of the classes are covered," said Dobernick, who chairs the apprenticeship program. "This very first Construction Science Expo that Lansing held gave those students options besides the traditional college space."

The event was a success with over 300 students from the Lansing School District attending. Students were brought into the Impression 5 Science Center and through demonstrations students experienced various aspects of the skilled trades and many other parts of the industry.



"One of our goals has always been to provide youth a safe space to engage in STEM education but also push youth to think about pathways forward," said Erik Larson, executive director, Impression 5. "If they are interested in a certain content area and are thinking about what they want to do with that in the future giving them the tools and exposure to see those pathways is invaluable. Each road has different steps, and we want to be a guiding hand in how to help them accomplish those goals."

The expo not only gave students the opportunity to meet with people who work in these fields, but also provided a glimpse into what it's like to be in those industries in a meaningful way.

The CORG Awards is an annual event presented by the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce (LRCC).

The CORG program serves to recognize and celebrate the significant investments made by organizations that have contributed to the growth and vibrancy of the Greater Lansing region. Since 2006, more than 85 companies have been recognized and have combined to contribute more than \$3 billion to the regional economy.

"The investments made by this year's CORG honorees are not only significant in how they are helping transform the region today, but also in how they position our region for the future," said Tim Daman, president & CEO, LRCC. "The commitments to our region of these organizations are also certain to help leverage additional investments and continued growth in Greater Lansing for which we should all be thankful."



#### ATESTEO NORTH AMERICA: STRENGTHENING MICHIGAN'S LEADERSHIP IN E-MOBILITY AND ELECTRIFICATION

ATESTEO, a global provider of testing services for EV drivetrains and components, is establishing its North American headquarters in East Lansing. ATESTEO North America is a member of ATESTEO Group, a Germany-based testing services provider for automotive drivetrains. The company began serving the e-mobility industry in 2008 and provides testing services for hybrid and fully electrified auto drivetrains and components.

ATESTEO's North American headquarters in East Lansing, will install test benches to test drivetrain systems and components. The North American Headquarters in East Lansing allows the company to penetrate a major hub for automotive manufacturing and innovation. The expansion into the U.S complements ATESTEO's existing facilities across Germany and China and will allow them to offer over 200 test benches on three continents.

The investments made by this year's CORG honorees are not only significant in how they are helping transform the region today, but also in how they position our region for the future.

located close to technical universities and vocational schools," said Roy M. Schulde, president, ATESTEO North America. "This talent pool allows us to find students to help run our test benches since our tests are run on a 24/7 operation. Many of these students then join ATESTEO after graduation. In fact, I can give 2 excellent examples of how well this has worked for ATESTEO. Both

our current and former CEO started working at ATESTEO as students running test benches!"

> The project is expected to generate a total capital investment of \$27.8 million and create up to 46 well-paying jobs with the support of a \$400,000 Michigan Business Development Program performance-based grant from the Michigan Strategic Fund. Michigan was chosen for the project over competing sites in Ohio and South Carolina.

ATESTEO's new drivetrain testing and accredited calibration facility is dedicated to supporting eMobility applications, which will increase the availability of resources needed to test and validate the latest electrification technologies. The ATESTEO move to East Lansing is also expected boost Michigan's efforts to position

"The decision to enter the U.S. actually follows a business model that ATESTEO has used successfully for over 35 years in Germany and China, where our testing sites are



itself as the global leader in the future of mobility and vehicle electrification. In addition, the project will bring immediate high-wage jobs, primarily engineering and technical positions, to the region and could lead to future investment in the state.

"Michigan is known as the "Automotive Capital of the World" and has the highest concentration of automotive OEMs and Tier 1 suppliers in USA," said Schulde. "It has been and will remain the center of future mobility development."

#### MICHIGAN COMMUNITY CAPITAL: TEMPLE LOFTS BOLSTERS OLD TOWN

After nearly a decade of sitting vacant and blighted, the Temple building in Lansing's Old Town has new life, now known as Temple Lofts.

This project redeveloped a key block in Lansing's vibrant Old Town District. The property was purchased by Michigan Community Capital (MCC), a 501 (c) 3 nonprofit, in February 2019. This rehabilitation was true to the rich history of the building while bringing new life to the space. The stunning arched window openings were highlighted, and the original stained-glass windows were repurposed into art throughout the building. The project represents a nearly \$10M investment in a historic church which may be the site of the first church to be built in Lansing.

"The project converted the two-story church into a fivestory mixed use building featuring offices, retail space and 31 apartments offering a range of rents," said Eric Hanna, president & CEO, Michigan Community Capital. "It has nine offices, four of which are for-rent individually, and all residential units are full continuously. We are currently searching for the right retail tenant."



Hanna said a combination of factors that attracted MCC to the Old

Town Project including a strong and well-organized commercial association and some of Lansing's best local dining and shopping. Three other development teams unsuccessfully attempted to develop the Temple building in the past.

"Our mission is to tackle some of the toughest projects in the state in downtowns, nodes, and corridors in order to remove obstacles for private development," said Hanna. "With this building being vacant and fading into disrepair and with it being an iconic and historic asset, it was a great candidate for our 'at scale' lean-in type projects. We also wanted to support Old Town by locating our offices here and to make deeper commitments to the neighborhood. We now have modest additional land holdings in the area and have future additional investments planned."

Hanna said the project could not have been accomplished without both public and private capital and expertise. Partners include the City of Lansing, MEDC, IFF, and many enterprise level bank investors. Execution partners include Kincaid Building Group, Integrated Architecture, Triterra Environmental, and a host of talented local trade contractors.

"Our intention is to continue this work beyond temple with a goal of adding an additional 100 units of housing within a 2-block distance from the Temple for a total of 130 new households added to the neighborhood in 10 years," said Hanna. Already two additional nearby corners have been listed for sale in a sign that private

#### MSU FEDERAL CREDIT UNION: EAST LANSING BRANCH ACTIVATING CAMPUS AND COMMUNITY

MSU Federal Credit Union (MSUFCU) is receiving the CORG recognition for the recently completed building, 311 Abbot, which was a \$43 million investment in the East Lansing community. The seven-story building is 87,000 square feet and houses the East Lansing Branch. It will have dedicated space for MSUFCU's small business, wealth management and home loan solutions.

"Our goal is for the building to be a center for activity by welcoming tenants and working with community groups to host a wide variety of events," said April Clobes, president & CEO, MSUFCU. "We will use the building to enhance the community feel and build upon the already vibrant and dynamic energy of downtown East Lansing."

311 Abbot was designed with a focus on sustainability, collaboration, and technology.

Clobes says the building will foster an environment where innovation thrives and ideas flourish. Its modern architecture, efficient energy systems, and thoughtful amenities reflect our commitment to creating a positive work environment. The full-service branch features an integrated design that offers sit-down from campus, all current and future Spartans will see MSUFCU as synonymous with their alma mater."

Each floor was thoughtfully designed as a multiuse space. The second-floor community room can accommodate up to 499 guests and has been used for a variety of community events. The third floor will be home to the Conquer Finance and Insurance Accelerator, a collaboration between MSUFCU, the MSU Research Foundation and the Eli Broad College of Business. Conquer Finance and Insurance Accelerator will attract a national audience of fintechs and insurtechs to the East Lansing region. Also on the third floor, Coworkerie, a co-working and co-study space, has been set up to promote the entrepreneurial ecosystem in the community of East Lansing and the greater Lansing region.

"311 Abbot will be a hub of activity, welcoming our employees, community members, students, and alumni," said Clobes. "Our hope is the building will add to the hard work the East Lansing City Council and surrounding community has done to make the downtown area a vibrant and diverse urban setting."

#### NEOGEN CORPORATION: \$70 MILLION EXPANSION MARKS CONTINUED COMMITMENT TO GREATER LANSING

Neogen is expanding its food safety business on E. Shiawassee Street in Downtown Lansing, with the construction of a three-story, dedicated manufacturing building. In addition to the new building, Neogen will invest in new manufacturing equipment and laboratory equipment for the test and release of products.



This 175,000-square-foot facility will be the future manufacturing space of Neogen's Petrifilm indicator testing product, which the company acquired during its merger with the former 3M Food Safety business. This investment, which will be north of \$100 million in total, will create between 60-100 new jobs, raising the number of Neogen employees in Lansing to 750 at maximum. These highly skilled positions will range from automation technicians and operators to process engineers, chemists, quality engineers, quality technicians, as well as supervisors and managers.

Neogen broke ground on the project in July of 2022, and construction remains ongoing. They expect the completion of the exterior building

construction in December 2023, with validation and other progress continuing throughout the 2024 calendar year.

"I would be remiss to discuss the scope of this project without thanking all of our collaborators," said John Adent, Neogen's President and Chief Executive Officer. "This project will only be made possible through the collaboration of the Lansing Economic Area Partnership (LEAP), Lansing Economic Development Corporation (LEDC), Michigan Economic Development Corporation (MEDC), Lansing Mayor's Office, Lansing City Council, Michigan Strategic Funds, Mayotte, Christman, HED, and Triterra. On behalf of the entire Neogen team, thank you."

Neogen has a long history of growth within their attractive end markets, and, prior to the announcement and successful completion of their plans to combine existing operations with the former 3M Food Safety business, the company is looking at ways to continue upon these growth trends.

In addition, the new jobs created through the expansion will also help Neogen to grow as an organization, through internal talent development.

"We are very focused on cultivating and developing talent within our organization," said Julie Mann, Neogen's Chief Human Resources Officer. "These new roles include highly skilled positions and leadership roles, which offer opportunities for career development and advancement within Neogen. We are excited to welcome new talent and fresh minds to the company and learn and grow together."

he ATHENA *PowerLink* program, run through the Lansing Regional Chamber of Commerce, is changing the game, providing invaluable support and mentorship to local female entrepreneurs looking to take their businesses to the next level.



Before entering the ATHENA *PowerLink* program, Kathy Valentine,

owner of The Plant Professionals, like so many others, grappled with missed opportunities and a lack of understanding of how to gain exposure and make professional connections. In this case, the program was a game-changer, creating a powerful shift in Valentine's perspective.

She had the privilege of working with an illustrious panel of experts, including the late Kelly Rossman-McKinney, Toni Talbot, Cindy Whittum, Rachelle Neal, Susan Schuster, Paul Jacob, Shawn Grady, and Terry Warren. This diverse panel brought a wealth of knowledge and experience to the table.

This transformative experience, facilitated by the ATHENA *PowerLink* program, also led to a greater focus on finding and nurturing talent. Valentine's knowledge and confidence in running the business improved and the award exposure expanded their client base and made them more visible in the business community.

As a result, the business began to grow more intentionally, maintain a balance between projects, build a more robust management and support team and found stability, which was essential to tackle the challenges posed by the pandemic.

As Valentine's journey unfolded, she realized the impact of the ATHENA *PowerLink* program extended beyond her own




business. She encouraged other women in business to consider applying for the program, emphasizing that having a program alumna on the governing body can be a valuable asset for future recipients.


