WHO IS ON THE BALLOT?

While the specific names of individuals – especially in state and local elections – vary by district, the following offices are up for election in 2024:

- ✓ U.S. President
- U.S. Senate
- U.S. Representative in Congress (all 13 districts)
- State Representative (all 110 districts)
- Michigan Supreme Court (2 seats)
- University of Michigan Board of Regents (2 seats), Michigan State University Trustees (2 seats), and Wayne State University Governors (2 seats)
- State Board of Education (2 seats)
- County, township, city, and village offices
- Specified school district positions

Ways to apply for an absent voter ballot application

- Online Registered voters can request an absentee ballot online through the absentee voter request form
- Call your clerk's office and ask that an application be mailed to you
- Download an application to return by mail or in person to your local clerk's office
- ✓ In person at your local city or township clerk's office

WAYS TO COMPLETE YOUR ABSENT VOTER BALLOT

Your completed absentee ballot should be received by your city or township clerk by 8 p.m. on Election Day. You can submit by mail, or by hand-delivering the ballot to your clerk's office or their drop box. If you are returning your ballot within two weeks of election day, we recommend hand-delivering your ballot to avoid possible postal delays.

Begin the process early by mailing in your application for an absentee ballot as soon as possible. Applications can be submitted up to 75 days before an election.

All registered voters can track their ballot by looking up their information in the **voter information section of this website.**

EARLY VOTING IN MICHIGAN

Michigan voters have the right to cast a ballot early and in person at an early voting site before Election Day.

Early voting will be available beginning with the presidential primary in 2024 and every statewide and federal election thereafter. For November 2023, early voting will be offered in the following jurisdictions: *Early voting schedule for Nov. 2023 election.*

FIND YOUR POLLING LOCATION

Not sure where your polling location is or who your city or county clerk are? *Michigan.gov/Vote* can help you find that answer. Some jurisdictions provide a sample ballot so you can know who – and what – you're voting on before you head to the polls or complete your absentee ballot.

The objective of LRC-PAC is to endorse candidates that support a favorable business climate throughout the region.

The LRC-PAC's endorsement process includes a review of a candidate's past performance, a written questionnaire, and, in some cases, an in-person interview. Only after this process is completed and a vote of the LRC-PAC Board is taken can a candidate be endorsed and be considered for financial support.

The Lansing City Charter Commission is tasked with reviewing and potentially revising the city's charter, a foundational document outlining its by-laws and operational guidelines.

WHY:

Following a November 2023 vote by residents to revise the charter for the first time since its 1978 inception, 36 candidates have stepped forward to participate in this crucial process. However, only nine will be elected during the upcoming May 7, 2024 special election.

WHY IT MATTERS FOR THE BUSINESS COMMUNITY:

It is essential for the business community to be actively involved in this process. As one of the only business political action committee (PAC) focused on elections in the Greater Lansing region, the LRC-PAC's support is vital. Ensuring the election of candidates who align advocate for a government that works for everyone and ensures continued economic growth.

HOW WE MAKE IT HAPPEN:

Currently, the LRC-PAC is mobilizing efforts to raise funds aimed at supporting candidates endorsed by the PAC in the May 7, 2024 election.
