The Sustainable: the natural environment (energy, land, air quality, public health, sanitation)

Institutions and Places: public parks, hospitals/clinics, bike paths, sidewalks

These aspects are worth a few minutes of reflection. Ask yourself these questions:

How does Sioux Center rate in each aspect? What are our strengths? Where could we grow? What does it mean and take to thrive in Sioux Center? What can you contribute to Sioux Center's thriving? How could you work with real people to do real work to meet a real need?

Now my challenge to you is, as Nike says, just do it! If you see something, do something. Pick one thing you can do to contribute to our thriving community.

Let's work together for the benefit of all, for the betterment of all, for the thriving of all.



PROMISE CHC AWARDED GRANT TO STUDY POTENTIAL DENTAL EXPANSION



Promise Community Health Center has been awarded a \$25,000 grant from the Delta Dental of Iowa Foundation to study potential expansion of its dental services and ways to maximize efficiency of its current space.

Significant growth in the health center's dental program over the past two years has prompted the

need for the study. With the program exceeding capacity, patients have experienced increasing wait times for appointments for services ranging from hygiene care to significant procedures.

Thanks to the grant, Promise will use the consulting services of the Capital Link office in Cottleville, MO, to assess the current state of the dental services and facilities, develop

recommendations for increased efficiencies of operations, and draft future plans to address operational, staffing and space requirements.

The target completion date for the study is October 2019.

"The grant is a great opportunity for Promise to continue to build and expand on our current dental program," said Amy Kleinhesselink, co-chief executive officer of Promise. "The study will help Promise assess where we are with the dental program and determine a strategic plan so we can ensure we continue to meet and provide for the needs of our patients."

The grant also will fund the purchase of two dental hand tools to improve efficiency in patient care by the dentist and hygienist and will provide resources for two representatives of Promise to attend the National Network for Oral Health Access annual conference next October.

15 JAN FEEDLOT FORUM 2019 TO FEATURE **MARKETING**

ORANGE CITY, Iowa - Beef producers are in a new era of marketing with more changes rapidly coming. It is this new era that will be the focus of Feedlot Forum 2019. Feedlot Forum 2019 will be Tuesday, Jan. 15 from 8:30 a.m. to 3:15 p.m. at the Terrace View Event Center in Sioux Center.

Feedlot Forum 2019 is a collaborative effort of Iowa State University Extension and Outreach, Iowa Beef Center, Iowa Cattlemen's Association and three county cattlemen's associations - Lyon, Plymouth and Sioux.

Keynote speakers include:

- Tom Brink, CEO of the Red Angus Association of America and founder of Top Dollar Angus, Inc. Brink will visit about feeder calf verification and the importance of traceability to the beef industry.
- Restaurant and culinary trends are changing menus offered to patrons. Jessica Dunker, president and CEO of the Iowa Restaurant Association, will share how changes in patron palettes are dictating the types of foods that will be prepared and sold in fast food, family and upscale restaurants.
- · Chad Hart, associate professor of economics and extension economist, leads off the afternoon discussing the impact of trade tariffs on the price of ag commodities including beef. Dr. Hart and the Center for Agricultural and Rural Development just completed an analysis of the impact of tariffs on soybean prices. Hart is also versed in the effect of tariffs on meats and beef by-products.
- Rounding out the afternoon is Andrew Gottschalk, senior vice president for R.J. O'Brien and Associates. Currently, U.S. livestock producers have record meat supplies. Andrew will project how these supplies and export demand will affect cattle outlook and potential prices for beef.

Other short presentations include the roles of the lowa Cattlemen's Association and Iowa Beef Industry Council and an update on Beef Quality Assurance and Beef Quality Assurance Transportation.

"Previous Feedlot Forums have reached producers from 25 counties and seven states," said Beth Doran, beef program specialist with ISU Extension and Outreach.

"Participants value the information presented by national speakers."

This year's forum also features 25 agri-business sponsors displaying the latest products, technology and services available to beef producers.

Registration for Feedlot Forum 2019 is \$25 per person with a discounted price of \$10 for students. All registrations are due by or before Jan. 10 to the ISU Extension and Outreach - Sioux County Office, 400 Central Ave. NW, Suite 700, Orange City IA 51041.
