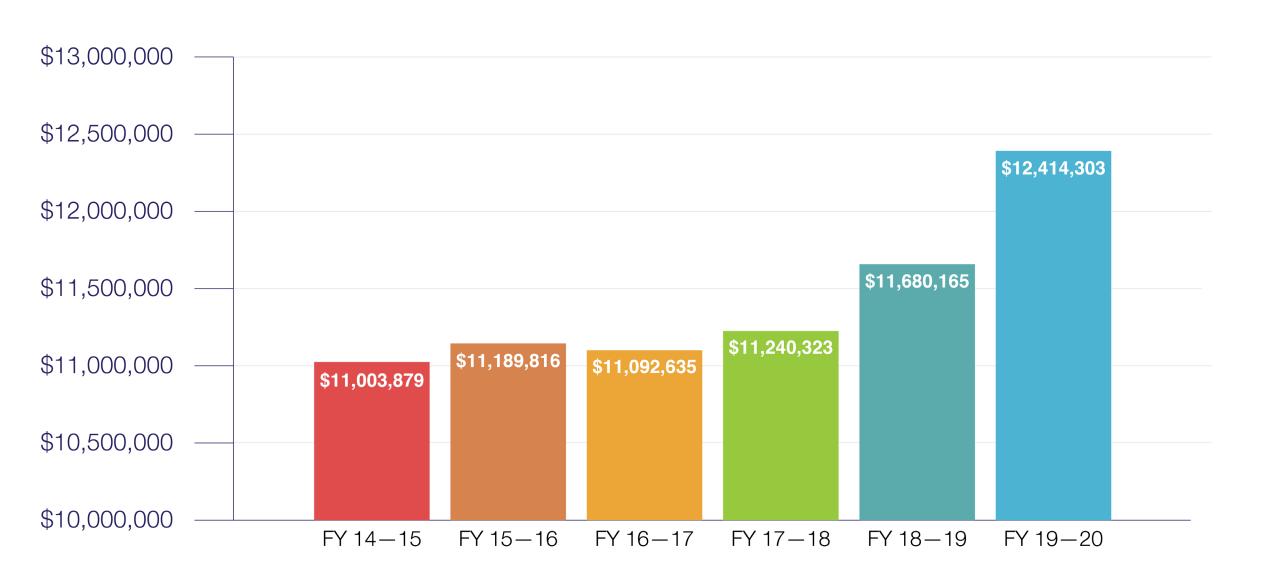

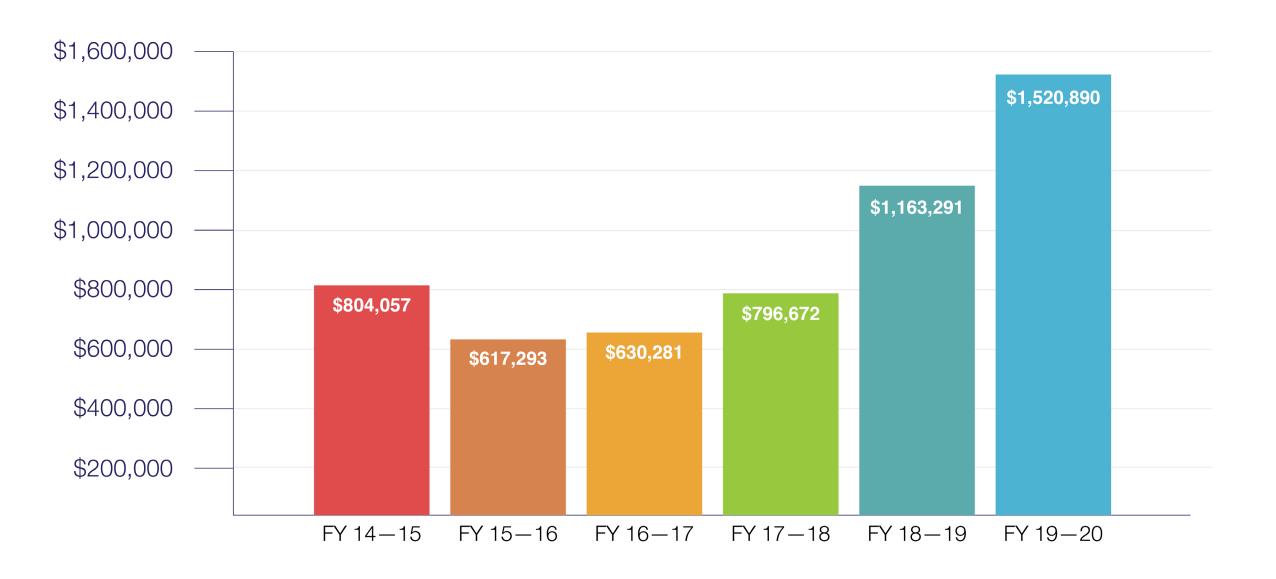

Sales Tax Growth

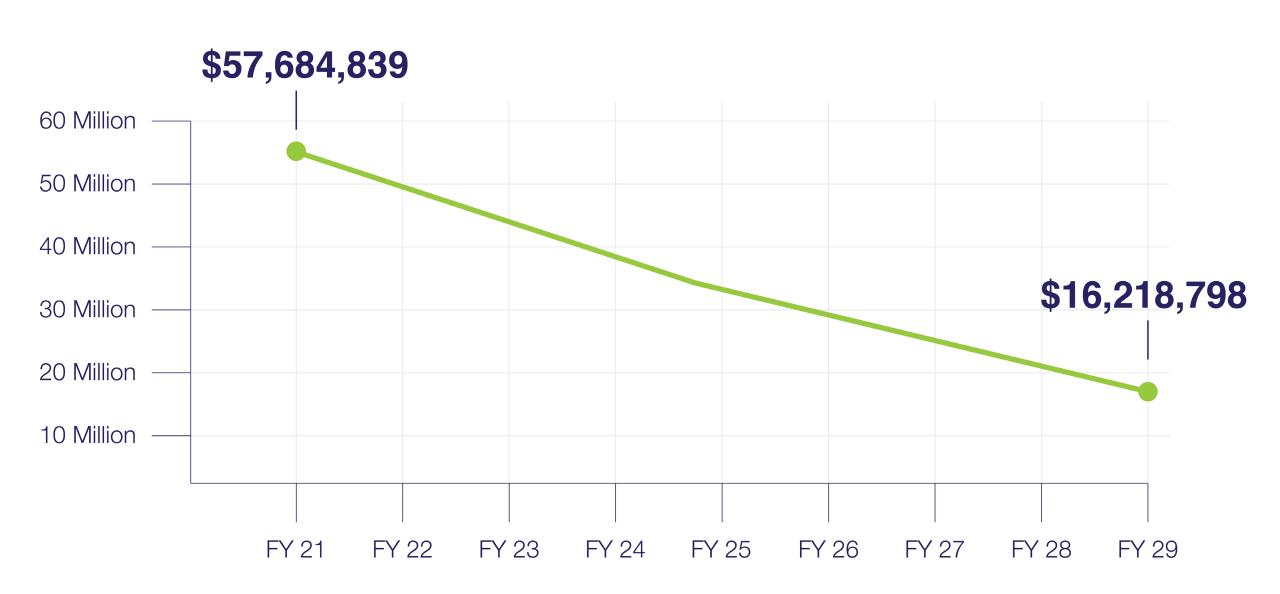


Use Tax Received

Key Infrastructure Projects

- Lake Access Road/Lake Park Drives and Park Area Rehab \$1.4 million
 - ✓ Currently under construction; April completion
- Talbert-Sioux Water Transmission Mains \$3.7 million
 - ✓11,000 + LF waterline replacement
 - ✓ Currently bidding; project will begin in March 2021
- Lowry Regional Detention Pond \$1.1 million
 - ✓ In design; work will begin in November of 2021 and take approximately 9 months to complete
 - ✓ Currently planned to be an in-house construction project, saving an estimated \$800,000



Citywide Water System Improvements

Systematically evaluating and prioritizing needed repairs

- Distribution system assessment is approximately 60% complete
- Work is being completed in-house at an estimated cost savings of \$450,000 in 2020
- Following completion of the assessment, a repair/replace/rehab project will be bid. Estimating needed repairs of \$4-5 million.
 - ✓ Project will replace cast iron mains, replace broken valves, replace broken fire hydrants, repaint/repair fire hydrants and loop dead ends
 - ✓ Work planned to start late fall/winter of 2021

- Lift Station improvements at Oakwood and Northpark

\$7 Million in 3 Years - Roads

Frederick Road - \$4.5 million

• Expanding to 3 lanes with sidewalks and storm drainage to connect to the future State Highway 20 interchange

Lake Access Road - \$1.4 million

- Construction to begin summer of 2020
- Improves security at water treatment plant, improves access to Claremore Lake and resurfaces all roads at Lake Park

Pavement Maintenance Plan - \$1 million

 Developing a plan to coordinate street maintenance for the next 3 years





\$5 Million in 3 Years - Electric

- Reconductor overhead lines
- Replace overhead lines with underground lines
- Replace aging underground lines including boring projects
- Continue to work with residents and clear rightof-way vegetation
- Assist engineering department with the State Highway 20 Overpass, 17th Street Project and Claremore Lake Project





Electric Upgrades

- Bring SCADA (Supervisory Control & Data Acquisition) to each substation
- Create more access to the Customer Portal to provide citizens more data on their usage
- Substation rehabilitation to increase loading capacity and system-wide reliability





SCADA

- Enables the Power & Light Department to be notified quickly of substation events, including outages
- Decreases outage response time
- Assists with preventative maintenance
- Ensures the health of our substations; the heart of our power supply.

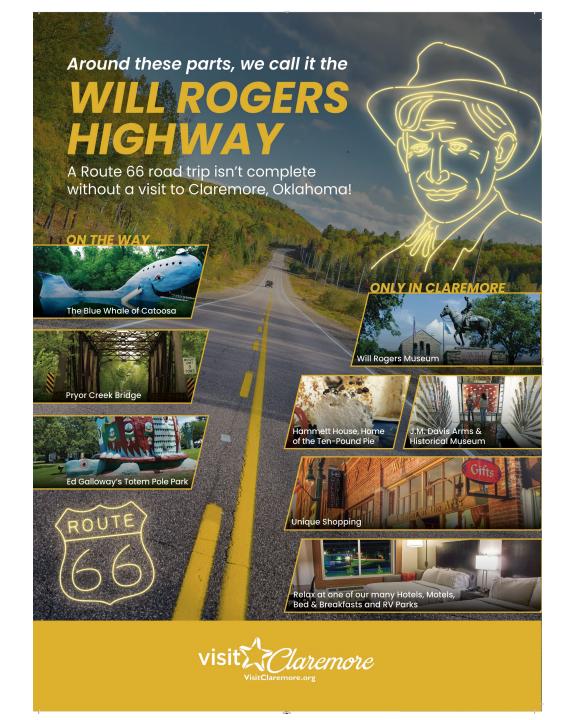
Economic Development (CIEDA)
