

Catching Up with Justin Fornal By Karen Milano

Killingworth is sometimes described as "out in the middle of nowhere", and while I'd dispute that on several levels, one thing is certain. We manage to raise some pretty interesting folk, perhaps there's something in the well water.

Ktown born and raised, Justin Fornal is a 1996 graduate of Haddam-Killingworth High School and the University of Pittsburgh. A culinary expert and international explorer, Justin adds a whole new level to that description. His exceptional talent in filmmaking and acting and his natural flare for the dramatic have earned him significant standing in the world of entertainment.



You might even consider that an understatement if you're familiar with his now famous character, Baron Ambrosia. Baron traveled around New York City, especially the Bronx, from 2006 through 2013 exploring various cultures and their unique cuisines. In 2012 Fornal picked up an Emmy for best on-camera talent in the category Performer/Narrator. During a segment of Anthony Bourdain's Parts Unknown in the Bronx in 2014, he served as a consulting producer. At the time, Bourdain described Fornal/Ambrosia as "an evangelist for introducing the manifold splendiferous delights of his mighty borough to the ignorant. He has a show on the TV, and throws parties where he serves creatures that would make Andrew Zimmern turn gray and slump unconscious to the floor. A showman, iconoclast, explorer, and gourmet". Accolades from one of the masters don't get any better than that.

Fornal has something exciting in the works -UNEXPLAINED AND UNEXPLORED, a new series that premiered on November 10th on the Science Channel and the Discovery Channel. Catch it on Sundays at 10 pm. International mysteries, vintage maps, hidden treasure..... Did the Mayan Empire relocate to America? How did Merriweather Lewis really die? Where did the Ark of the Covenant end up after being smuggled out of Jerusalem? ... Explorers Justin Fornal and Emiliano Ruprah are on it!

Justin generously gave us an interview for the Krier's December issue.

KM: So tell us, how does a kid from Killingworth, CT otherwise known as the sticks ... find his bliss in The Bronx? What lessons and experiences of growing up in a small town have you taken with you out into the wide and wild world?

JF: Growing up in a small town there is an etiquette of warmth where you say hello to everyone you encounter. I truly believe that being a friendly person has been the

secret to my success when it comes to just about anything. When I first moved to the Bronx my local friends told me to not be so friendly, that people would think I was a mark. I didn't care, I refused to put up a cold veneer and would strike up a conversation with almost anyone I met. You never know what information or access a person might hold. If there was a place I wasn't supposed to go or seemed like I wouldn't be welcome I always had to go in. So many of us paint ourselves into a corner through our fear of the unknown. If you live with fear you limit the experiences you have.

KM: Your career began with film making and acting entwined with your love for exotic cultural cuisine mostly found in your adopted hometown, The Bronx. Your new adventure as an explorer along with Emiliano takes you down a very different path. Perhaps your experience working with the beloved Tony Bourdain was a source of inspiration? What can you tell us about your new show?

JF: International Exploration has always been my endgame. Any money I made during the Food Years would go straight to purchasing an airplane ticket. At the time I did the food programming because it was local, accessible and everyone loves to eat. Behind the scenes I was always researching and writing about my true passions which are vanishing cultural traditions, rituals, and ancient textiles. Food is also a great IN for researchers looking to take a deeper dive into closed off cultures. Folks will certainly share a meal with you long before they will welcome you into witness secret rites or share their uses of ethnobotanical plants. While Bourdain focused largely on food, it usually served as the framework for the larger cultural story he was trying to tell.

KM: What advice would you give the young residents of our small town who may have big dreams of their own?

JF: In regard to exploration. Don't turn up your nose to any cultural experience. If someone offers you goat, try it. Don't make a face at something just because your parents say you won't like it. I remember seeing a sign at Burghardt's gas station on Route 80 for 'Smoked Bluefish' and begging my parents to take me there so I could buy some. I didn't know if I would like it but I needed to try it! I loved it and wish they were still there.

In regard to film making and professional creative pursuits. Create, create, create...even if no one is seeing your work. You need to truly love the act of creating. If you are only focused on conventional success you are missing the joy of the process. There will be times when money is tight

Meet Your Neighbor: Jim Lally and the Importance of the Ambulance Association

Jim Lally, owner of Schumack Engineered Construction in Clinton, has been a resident of Killingworth since 1972. As a former Killingworth Ambulance Association board member, he's passionate about the Association. As a resident who contributed so much to the community that he was named Killingworth Citizen of the Year in 2012, Jim Lally admits he's also concerned about the KAA's future. The reason: A shrinking pool of volunteers serving as first responders.

"There are good people in Killingworth who want to volunteer," said Lally

"but the ambulance association needs to get out there and let people know: Get involved!" Lally has a point. The KAA is not unlike other emergency volunteer services in the area ... or the country ... trying to interest persons in becoming EMTs or EMRs. There's a shortage of volunteers, with the KAA last year hanging a "Volunteers Needed" sign outside its Route 81 headquarters. That was when its number of EMTs shrunk to 17 from a high of 25. It is now at 22, with one EMR. That's better than many rural areas but not enough to prevent NBC News last month from detailing what it termed a national "crisis" in a story entitled, What if you call 911 and no one comes? It's a good question and one that has so much of Lally's attention that, when he made his annual donation to the KAA this summer, the contribution was so substantial it gained special attention at a board meeting.

"Why did I do it?" he said. "Because I'm very passionate about the importance of the Ambulance". In the summer of 1960 when Lally, then 20, drove his sister home from Madison to Wallingford on a rainy Tuesday evening, the roads were slick from a heavy rain.

As Lally passed through Guilford on Route 1, his car slid on the wet surface, spun out of control and skidded off the road – not stopping until it hit a tree. Lally suffered life-threatening injuries, but survived. His 18-year-old sister did not. "I put the steering wheel through my chest," he said, "and I was in the hospital for almost seven months. My life was saved by the Guilford ambulance crew. That's how good they were, and I'm very thankful. After that, I always said I'd give back to an

organization like that ... because it's a matter of saving lives. And that's critical."

Lally admitted he hadn't volunteered before. But all that changed that evening. When he recovered, he jumped at opportunities to help where and when he could. "I felt I owed it," he said. "I got to know a couple of guys (Guilford EMTs) after the fact. I kept in touch with them. And I always felt it's important – if you can afford to – to give back. It doesn't have to be money. It can be time."

Or it can be both, and Jim Lally is proof.

Not long after moving to Killingworth, he joined the KAA and served on its board for nearly a decade. Then he donated the services of his construction company toward the building of the KAA's two-story headquarters completed in 1983. "Jim was quiet," said Don McDougal, a KAA board member who made the group's third-ever ambulance run in 1971 as an EMT. "But if you needed anything done, he did it. And I know he did a lot for the ambulance (KAA) when we first started. No questions asked. He just did it."

Lally has been chairman of the Killingworth Parks and Recreation Department. He co-chaired construction of the new EOC building. He donated the services of Schumack Construction toward the creation of Eric Auer Park ... the renovations to Irene Sheldon Park ... construction of the Sugar Shack at Parmelee Farm ... and work at Rocco Reale Memorial field and the Killingworth Elementary School. He also supported youth sports leagues, the HKYFS, Pumpkin Run and Lions Club Concert Series and provided materials for the Killingworth Town Picnic. In short, his fingerprints are everywhere in town. "I love the volunteer spirit of Killingworth. It's the engine that drives this town" says Lally.


One of Lally's favorite stories involving the KAA and its volunteers dates back to the 1970s when former KAA president, founder and EMT Charlie Smith answered an emergency call on Route 81. Smith, so active locally that people who know him call him "a professional volunteer," rushed to the scene and helped pull a pig out of a burning building. Nobody was injured, but Smith was so concerned about the pig that he stayed behind to comfort it, rubbing snow that had fallen along its injured back. "It made me feel better," Smith said, smiling when retold the story, "but I don't know about the pig."

Another story Lally recites involves EMTs rescuing a grandson after he was injured in an ATV accident at Cockaponsett State Forest. It happened when the vehicle in which he was riding crashed into a tree, injuring the young man so seriously that he was rushed by ambulance to Hartford Hospital. He not only survived but works for Lally today. "The ambulance company saved him," he said. "He was in shock, but they got there when they could and they stabilized him. They saved his life. Those are the kinds of things that people don't know, and it's the kind of thing that needs to be brought out about volunteers. There are stories like that all around." Then he paused. "We cannot let ourselves fall into the trap of having someone tell us we don't have enough responders," he said. "That would break my heart."

Lally's concerns are echoed by Madison Ambulance Association director Chris Bernier, who last month said the group is "not receiving the funding that is adequate for the town's safety" and asked for more help to provide for additional paramedic support. According to a recent report in Philadelphia's City Journal, "declining volunteerism is especially pronounced in America's rural counties, many of which – with aging populations and a declining financial base – must support increased support for ambulatory and fire services."

"Everyone has the problem," Lally said. "What I don't want is to have a professional ambulance have to come to us ... where we have to pay them ... because we don't have enough responders. That would be catastrophic. But that's where we are now. We need to get more interest. With the Killingworth Ambulance Association you have an organization that lays its heart on the line. I just hope people see the need more than there is now."

Santa's Mailbox is Coming to Town!



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

Notes from the Town Hall

First Selectwoman Cathy lino



Congratulations! To the winners in the November elections, to everyone who ran in November, and to the citizens of Killingworth! Our election turnout was 60 percent, up from 48.5 in 2017. (Only the town of Kent, which has less than half our population, had a higher turnout: 60.2.) Statewide the turnout in this year's municipal elections was 33 percent.

We are democracy champs!

Many thanks to Republican Registrar of Voters Lauren Blaha and Democratic Registrar Mary Solera for their hard work organizing, monitoring, and reporting the election. Their scrupulous attention to every element of the process gives us all confidence. Thanks also to all the poll workers for their long hours of work. They are the air traffic controllers of the election, focusing on small details for long hours to avert possible disasters.

Town boards and commissions. On December 9, the Board of Selectmen will be making 2020 appointments to town committees. A full list of boards and commissions is available at townofkillingworth.com. We particularly need people on the Conservation Commission, the Energy Task Force, and the Inland Wetlands & Watercourses Commission. If you are interesting in serving on these or any other committees, please contact me as soon as possible at (860) 663-1765, ext. 501. Winter weather rules. The town's winter parking ban went into effect on November 15. Until April 15, parking on public roads is prohibited between of 12:00 midnight to 6:00 a.m. When it snows, a full-time parking ban will go into effect. These rules make it possible for our plows to efficiently and effectively clear the roads.

It is illegal to push or blow snow onto roadways. If you contract with someone to plow your driveway, please make sure that your plower complies with this ordinance.

Our policy on mailboxes is the one widely used by U.S. towns: if one of our plows damages a mailbox, we will replace it, at a cost not to exceed \$75. A mailbox or post will not be repaired or replaced if damage was caused by the force of snow thrown by plows. Mailboxes should be placed according to U.S. Postal Service guidelines: https:// www.usps.com/manage/know-mailbox-guidelines.htm

Winter road sand. Homeowners may take up to five gallons of road sand to help with icy driveways. The sand/ salt mix is in a small shed behind Town Hall; bring your own bucket.

Transfer Station holiday hours. The Transfer Station will be closed on December 24 and open December 26 and 31, 2019.

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

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
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
