I also cut, rake, and bale 170 acres of hay, with a little help from my family from time to time when needed. I hope to expand to 250 acres next year. Other than my business, I also enjoy things such as painting, listening to music, open mat wrestling, weightlifting, hanging out with friends, and making my products."

Before transitioning into a role at the local library, Madeline spent three years working at the Indianapolis Zoo as a member of the education staff. Her role there was a dream come true, and while there she discovered her love for conservation education and the importance of the next generation.
