From NAFTA to USMCA

The United States Senate gave bipartisan approval to the <u>U.S.-Mexico-Canada Agreement this</u> <u>week</u>. The Agreement is poised to <u>replace</u> the North American Free Trade Agreement that originated in the 1990s. The President is expected to sign the USMCA into law. It will become active with the ratification by each of the three nations.

Supporters see this agreement as a key component in aiding American workers and building the manufacturing sector of our economy. Critics state that the USMCA does not go far enough to address climate change and that the reforms contained within the law may not actually take place.

The <u>United States International Trade Commission's report</u> on the likely impacts of the USMCA states that the Agreement would boost the United States' real gross domestic product by \$68.2 billion or .35 percent.
