Dear Chamber Member:

You have told us advocacy is one of the most essential services the Overland Park Chamber of Commerce provides our community. We are one of the few chambers of commerce in Kansas to publish a detailed summary of the important legislative votes cast on business issues to provide you vital information before filling out your ballot.

No voting record tells the complete story of a legislator's attitude and actions on issues of importance to business. This voting record does not capture unrecorded votes or the numerous votes that occur in committee. It's not uncommon for a bill to contain multiple issues, which can create difficult voting decisions for lawmakers and even more difficulty for us to truly assess how a lawmaker feels about the individual elements of a bill. In recent years, fewer recorded votes and increasing use of conference committee reports further complicates the process of evaluating lawmakers' views on specific issues.

For these reasons, a voting record such as this should be a starting point – not your final analysis – as you consider a lawmaker's support or lack of support for pro-business issues.

This voting record is based on the Chamber's legislative agenda issues that you, our members, have told us are important to your businesses. The agenda was carefully reviewed and discussed by our Public Policy and Advocacy Committee, our Board of Directors and its Executive Committee. Please read this Voting Record thoroughly - let it spur continued dialogue with your elected officials and guide your decision-making process at election time. Note there are instances in which we must consider the overall or net effect of proposed legislation in determining the Chamber's position on individual issues.

On behalf of the Overland Park Chamber of Commerce and its members, we thank all the members of the Johnson County Delegation for their hard work and dedication this legislative session. They often are required to make difficult decisions and sacrifices to fulfill the responsibilities of their elected offices.

SENATE

1) FINAL ACTION ON SB 339, AS AMENDED

Senate Journal, page 1334; Passed 39-0 (2/25/20); Referred to House Committee on Energy, Utilities and Telecommunications.

An ACT concerning electric utilities; relating to electric rates; state corporation commission; approval of certain contract rates for electricity; cost recovery from rate classes; report to legislature.

Strong state economic development tools are vital for local business recruitment and retention. The Chamber supports accessibility of front-loaded key incentives in competitive economic development projects as it relates to negotiating for jobs and investment to level the playing field with surrounding states.

2) FINAL ACTION ON SB 294, AS AMENDED

Senate Journal, page 1334; Passed 39-0 (2/25/20); House Committee on Taxation recommended bill be passed as amdended.

An ACT concerning property taxation; relating to tax rates; truth in taxation; establishing notice and public hearing requirements prior to approval to exceed revenue neutral rate; discontinuing the city and county tax lid; amending K.S.A 79-2925c and repealing the existing section.

The Chamber opposes tax, revenue and/or spending lids on state and local government, including any constitutional amendments, public referendums or statutes that restrict legislative authority to make decisions regarding state and local taxing or spending.

3) FINAL ACTION ON SB 271, AS AMENDED

Senate Journal, page 1375; Passed 40-0 (2/26/20); House Committee on Education recommended substitute bill be passed.

An ACT concerning education; relating to the Kansas school equity and enhancement act; extending the high-density at-risk weighting; amending K.S.A. 72-5151 and repealing the existing section.

The Chamber supports removing the sunset provision and making permanent the high-density at-risk weighting factor in the court-approved K-12 funding formula.

4) FINAL ACTION ON SB 255, AS AMENDED

Senate Journal, page 1408; Passed 40-0 (3/5/20); Referred to House Committee on Appropriations.

An ACT concerning the University of Kansas Medical Center; relating to cancer center research; making and concerning appropriations for the fiscal year ending June 30, 2021.

The Chamber supports promotion, advancement and funding of the University of Kansas Cancer Center's National Cancer Institute designation and support for efforts to achieve Comprehensive Cancer Center designation.

5) FINAL ACTION ON HB 2702, AS AMENDED

Senate Journal, page 1482; Passed 39-0 (3/17/20); Conference Committee report vetoed by Governor: 6/1/20; No motion to reconsider. Veto sustained.

An ACT concerning economic development; relating to the high-performance incentive fund; workforce training program participation requirements; workforce training tax credit; amending K.S.A. 74-50,133 and 79-32,160a and repealing the existing sections.

The Chamber strongly encourages lawmakers to support, protect and enhance proven economic development and workforce development programs that are critical tools used to stimulate employment and leverage private investment that provide stability and predictability and require accountability. The Chamber supports maintaining the PEAK and HPIP programs, Angel Investor tax credits and STAR bonds.

6) MOTION TO ADOPT THE CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT ON H SUB SB 173

Senate Journal, page 1502; Passed 37-2 (3/19/20); Signed into law: 4/2/20.

An ACT concerning transportation; providing for the Eisenhower legacy transportation program; amending K.S.A. 68-416, 68-2315, 68-2316, 75-5035, 75-5048, 75-5061, 79-3603 and 79-3703 and repealing the existing sections.

The Chamber supports passage of the next long-term, multi-year state transportation plan being developed through a combination of KDOT technical analysis and local partner consultations, focused on meeting our state's preservation, safety, economic development and quality of life priorities.

7) MOTION TO PASS S SUB HB 2585, AS AMENDED

Senate Journal, page 1769; Passed 39-1 (5/21/20); Signed into law 6/1/20.

An ACT concerning utilities; relating to the state corporation commission; approval of certain contract and reduced electric rates; approval of cost recovery from rate classes; report to the legislature; income taxation; exemption from income taxation, certain public utilities; income tax expenses, exclusion from retail electric rates; amending K.S.A. 79-32,113 and repealing the existing section.

Strong state economic development tools are vital for local business recruitment and retention. The Chamber supports accessibility of front-loaded key incentives in competitive economic development projects as it relates to negotiating for jobs and investment to level the playing field with surrounding states.

1) FINAL ACTION ON HB 2515, AS AMENDED

House Journal, page 2104; Passed 116-6 (2/20/20); Died on Senate General Orders.

An ACT concerning postsecondary education; relating to scholarship programs; creating the Kansas promise scholarship act.

The Chamber supports policies, programs, and funding ...that emphasize technical education and other career paths, all preparing students to be college and/or career-ready for the future and fosters a well-trained, productive, globally competitive workforce. Further, the Chamber encourages the state to identify, study and implement policies and programs that encourage and enhance the retention of graduates from Kansas institutions of higher learning to address the needs of a qualified workforce, especially in the areas of health care, engineering and technology.

2) FINAL ACTION ON HB 2507, AS AMENDED

House Journal, page 2156; Passed 97-27 (2/26/20); Died on Senate General Orders.

An ACT concerning high school work-based learning programs; liability for students and businesses; amending K.S.A. 72-18,101 and 72-18,102 and repealing the existing sections.

The Chamber supports policies, programs, and funding ...that emphasize technical education and other career paths, all preparing students to be college and/or career-ready for the future and fosters a well-trained, productive, globally competitive workforce.

3) FINAL ACTION ON SUBSTITUTE FOR HB 2506, AS AMENDED

House Journal, page 2171; Passed 123-2 (2/26/20); Died on Senate General Orders.

An ACT concerning occupational regulation; relating to occupational licenses for certain applicants; amending K.S.A. 2019 Supp. 48-3406 and repealing the existing section.

The Chamber strongly encourages lawmakers to support, protect and enhance proven economic development and workforce development programs that are critical tools used to stimulate employment and leverage private investment that provide stability and predictability and require accountability.

4) FINAL ACTION ON HB 2702

House Journal, page 2174; Passed 125-0 (2/26/20); Bill contents replaced and Conference Committee Report Adopted. Governor vetoed; 6/1/20; Veto sustained.

An ACT concerning economic development; relating to the high-performance incentive fund; workforce training program participation requirements; workforce training tax credit; amending K.S.A. 74-50,133 and 79-32,160a and repealing the existing sections.

The Chamber strongly encourages lawmakers to support, protect and enhance proven economic development and workforce development programs that are critical tools used to stimulate employment and leverage private investment that provide stability and predictability and require accountability. The Chamber supports maintaining the PEAK and HPIP programs, Angel Investor tax credits and STAR bonds.

5) FINAL ACTION ON HB 2490

House Journal, page 2209; Passed 118-2 (3/12/20); Died on Senate General Orders.

An ACT concerning income taxation; relating to corporations; providing for an extension of the net operating loss carryforward period; amending K.S.A. 79-32,143 and repealing the existing section.

The Chamber supports a balanced, predictable and reasonable approach to state tax policy to provide a positive and competitive business climate.

6) FINAL ACTION ON HB 2689, AS AMENDED

House Journal, page 2221; Passed 103-12 (3/13/20); Referred to Senate Committee on Commerce.

An ACT concerning income taxation; relating to angel investor tax credits; qualified securities; credit limitations and amounts; investor requirements; expenditures to make principal dwelling accessible to persons with a disability; amending K.S.A. 74-8132, 74-8136 and 79-32,176a and repealing the existing sections.

The Chamber strongly encourages lawmakers to support, protect and enhance proven economic development and workforce development programs that are critical tools used to stimulate employment and leverage private investment that provide stability and predictability and require accountability. The Chamber supports maintaining the PEAK and HPIP programs, Angel Investor tax credits and STAR bonds.

7) MOTION TO ADOPT CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT ON H SUB FOR SB 173

House Journal, page 2299; Passed 112-3 (3/19/20); Signed into law, 4/2/20.

An ACT concerning transportation; providing for the Eisenhower legacy transportation program; amending K.S.A. 68-416, 68-2315, 68-2316, 75-5035, 75-5048, 75-5061, 79-3603 and 79-3703 and repealing the existing sections.

The Chamber supports Passage of the next long-term, multi-year state transportation plan being developed through a combination of KDOT technical analysis and local partner consultations, focused on meeting our state's preservation, safety, economic development and quality of life priorities.

8) MOTION TO CONCUR WITH SENATE AMENDMENTS TO S SUB FOR HB 2585

House Journal, page 2697; Passed 75-45-1 (5/21/20); Signed into law: 6/1/20.

An ACT concerning utilities; relating to the state corporation commission; approval of certain contract and reduced electric rates; approval of cost recovery from rate classes; report to the legislature; income taxation; exemption from income taxation, certain public utilities; income tax expenses, exclusion from retail electric rates; amending K.S.A. 79-32,113 and repealing the existing section.

Strong state economic development tools are vital for local business recruitment and retention. Continue to improve accessibility of front-loaded key incentives in competitive economic development projects as it relates to negotiating for jobs and investment to level the playing field with surrounding states.
