Dear Chamber Member:

You have told us advocacy is one of the most essential services the Overland Park Chamber of Commerce provides our community. We are one of the few chambers of commerce in Kansas to publish a detailed summary of important legislative votes cast on business issues to provide you vital information before filling out your ballot.

No voting record tells the complete story of a legislator's attitude and actions on issues of importance to business. This voting record does not capture unrecorded votes or the numerous votes that occur in committee. It's not uncommon for a bill to contain multiple issues, which can create difficult voting decisions for lawmakers and even more difficulty for us to truly assess how a lawmaker feels about the individual elements of a bill. In recent years, fewer recorded votes and increased use of conference committee reports further complicates the process of evaluating lawmakers' views on specific issues.

For these reasons, a voting record such as this should be a starting point – not your final analysis – as you consider a lawmaker's support or lack of support for pro-business issues.

This voting record is based on the Chamber's legislative agenda issues that you, our members, have told us are important to your businesses. The agenda was carefully reviewed and discussed by our Public Policy and Advocacy Committee, our Board of Directors and its Executive Committee. Please read this Voting Record thoroughly - let it spur continued dialogue with your elected officials and guide your decision-making process at election time. Note there are instances in which we must consider the overall or net effect of proposed legislation in determining the Chamber's position on individual issues.

On behalf of the Overland Park Chamber of Commerce and its members, we thank all the members of the Johnson County Delegation for their hard work and dedication this legislative session. They often are required to make difficult decisions and sacrifices to fulfill the responsibilities of their elected offices.

SENATE – 2021 Legislation

MOTION TO ADOPT THE CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT ON HB 2064

Senate Journal Page 1064; Passed 35-0 (4/9/21); Signed into law: 4/23/21

Creating the Kansas promise scholarship act to provide postsecondary educational scholarships for certain two-year associate degree programs, career and technical education certificates and other stand-alone programs.

The Chamber believes that career and technical education programs are important components of a well-rounded post-secondary educational system. Within our state's public higher education institutions, the Chamber supports measures to improve workforce development including enhanced career and technical education throughout the state.

MOTION TO ADOPT THE CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT ON SUBSTITUTE FOR HB 2066

Senate Journal Page 621; Passed 35-4 (4/8/21); Signed into law: 4/21/21

Expanding the military spouse and service members expedited licensure law to all applicants who have established or intend to establish residency in Kansas.

The Chamber strongly encourages lawmakers to support, protect and enhance proven economic development and workforce development programs that are critical tools used to stimulate employment and leverage private investment that provide stability and predictability and require accountability.

FINAL ACTION ON MOTION TO ADOPT HB 2101

Senate Journal Page 553; Passed 37-2 (3/31/21); Signed into law: 4/16/21

Extending transfers from the expanded lottery act revenues fund to the university engineering initiative.

The Chamber strongly encourages the Legislature to identify, study and implement policies and programs that encourage and enhance the retention of graduates from Kansas institutions of higher learning to address the needs of a qualified workforce, especially in the areas of health care, engineering, and technology.

MOTION TO ADOPT CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT ON SENATE SUBSTITUTE FOR SUBSTITUTE FOR HB 2196

Senate Journal Page 1081; Passed 38-0 (4/9/21); Signed into law: 4/26/21

Changing provisions of the employment security law including creation of the unemployment compensation modernization and improvement council, development of a new unemployment insurance information technology system, provision of tax information to claimants, publication of trust fund data, the maximum benefit period, the charging of employer accounts for benefits paid, employer contribution rate determination and schedules, crediting of employer accounts for fraudulent or erroneous payments, transfer of federal COVID-19 moneys to the unemployment insurance trust fund, emergency expansion of the employment security board of review, providing for the My Reemployment Plan program and workforce training program availability to claimants, changes to the shared work compensation program and other unemployment trust fund provisions.

The Chamber recognizes the technological infrastructure of the Kansas Department of Labor is outdated and produced challenges for businesses and workers as they interfaced with the Department during the recent pandemic. The State of Kansas should prioritize updating technological systems to minimize inefficiencies and provide taxpayers with greater return on their investment. The Chamber supports reasonable and equitable modifications to the Unemployment Trust Fund to ensure balances that protect unemployed workers while balancing the costs placed on businesses. Modifications should respect the established experience ratings and not negatively impact businesses that have earned strong experience ratings.

MOTION TO CONCUR WITH HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO SB 65

Senate Journal Page 437; Passed 38-1 (3/29/21); Signed into law 4/15/21

Enhancing the high-performance incentive program by decoupling the KIT and KIR workforce training programs and by providing for the transferability of the tax credit.

The Chamber strongly encourages lawmakers to support, protect and enhance proven economic development and workforce development programs that are critical tools used to stimulate employment and leverage private investment that provide stability and predictability and require accountability. The Chamber supports effective economic development incentives that help Kansas retain and recruit high-quality jobs and high-quality employers.

MOTION TO CONCUR WITH HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO SB 66

Senate Journal Page 438; Passed 29-9 (3/29/21); Signed into law 4/15/21

Amending the angel investor tax credit with respect to the definition of qualified securities, tax credit limitations and amounts, investor requirements and extending the date that credits may be allowed, and also amending the tax credit for expenses incurred to make a residence accessible to persons with a disability by increasing the credit.

The Chamber strongly encourages lawmakers to support, protect and enhance proven economic development and workforce development programs that are critical tools used to stimulate employment and leverage private investment that provide stability and predictability and require accountability. The Chamber supports effective economic development incentives that help Kansas retain and recruit high-quality jobs and high-quality employers.

FINAL ACTION ON SB 14

Senate Journal Page 50; Passed 34-1 (1/14/21); Signed into law 1/25/21

Extending certain provisions of the governmental response to the COVID-19 pandemic in Kansas and providing certain relief related to health, welfare, property and economic security during this public health emergency.

The Chamber supports the enactment of policies and procedures that equip affected parties with the resources and flexibility needed to address public safety as well as economic, regulatory, and statutory barriers to recovery with minimal delay. The Chamber supports the adoption of timely, targeted, and temporary liability protection for businesses providing equipment and supplies or otherwise engaging in commercial activity during declared emergencies.

MOTION TO CONCUR WITH HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO SB 50

Senate Journal Page 487; Passed 30-10 (3/30/21); Vetoed by Governor 4/16/21; Veto Overridden 5/3/21

Requiring marketplace facilitators to collect and remit sales, compensating use and transient guest taxes and prepaid wireless 911 fees, removing clickthrough nexus provisions, providing for addition and subtraction modifications for the treatment of global intangible low-taxed income, business interest, capital contributions, FDIC premiums and business meals, expanding the expense deduction for income taxpayers and calculating the deduction amount, providing the ability to elect to itemize for individuals, providing an exemption of unemployment compensation income attributable as a result of identity fraud, removing the line for reporting compensating use tax from individual tax returns, extending the dates when corporate tax returns are required to be filed, increasing the Kansas standard deduction and providing for an extension of the corporate net operating loss carryforward period.

The Chamber supports tax fairness and believes that local businesses should be treated equitably with out-of-state and virtual entities in regard to the collection of sales tax, compensating use tax and transient guest taxes. The Chamber supports legislation to require remote sellers to collect and remit sales and compensating use taxes on sales to Kansas residents, such legislation and implementing regulations to include reasonable threshold exemptions and otherwise be consistent with the guidelines set forth in the U.S. Supreme Court's ruling in South Dakota v. Wayfair.

The Chamber supports reinstating the income tax expensing deduction for non-corporate businesses for the costs of placing certain tangible property and computer software into service in Kansas. Repeal of this deduction was included in the 2012 state tax changes as part of what is commonly referred to as the "LLC exemption." However, when the LLC exemption was subsequently repealed in 2017, reinstating income tax liability for those non-corporate businesses, this deduction was inadvertently not reinstated, allowing individual taxpayers to elect to itemize deductions on their state tax income tax returns even if they elect to take standard deduction on their federal income tax returns.

MOTION TO CONCUR WITH HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO SB 124

Senate Journal Page 571; Passed 30-9 (3/31/21); Signed into law 4/15/21

Expanding STAR bonds by adding rural redevelopment projects and major business facilities, prohibiting public officials from employment with a developer, providing for public notice of hearings on city or county websites, posting of certain documents and links on websites, disclosure of names of developer, disclosure of state, federal and local tax incentives within a STAR bond district, changing certain project financing, investment and sales provisions, adding visitor tracking plan requirements and additional feasibility study requirements with oversight by the secretary, requiring approval by the secretary for real estate transfers, requiring district contiguity and extending the sunset date.

The Chamber strongly encourages lawmakers to support, protect and enhance proven economic development and workforce development programs that are critical tools used to stimulate employment and leverage private investment that provide stability and predictability and require accountability. The Chamber supports effective economic development incentives that help Kansas retain and recruit high-quality jobs and high-quality employers.

SENATE – 2022 Legislation

MOTION TO ADOPT THE CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT ON HOUSE SUBSTITUTE FOR SB 91

Senate Journal Page 1914; Passed 37-2 (4/1/22); Signed into law 4/13/22

Providing liability protection for businesses, municipalities and educational institutions that participate in high school work-based learning programs and providing that schools are responsible for injuries to students participating in such programs.

The Chamber believes that career and technical education programs are important components of a well-rounded post-secondary educational system.

MOTION TO ADOPT THE CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT ON HOUSE SUBSTITUTE FOR SUBSTITUTE FOR SB 286

Senate Journal Page 1991; Passed 24-16 (4/1/22); Vetoed by Governor 4/15/22

Continuing the governmental response to the COVID-19 pandemic in Kansas by extending the expanded use of telemedicine, the suspension of certain requirements related to medical care facilities and immunity from civil liability for certain healthcare providers, certain persons conducting business in this state and covered facilities for COVID-19 claims until January 20, 2023, creating the crime of interference with the conduct of a hospital and increasing the criminal penalties for battery of a healthcare provider.

The Chamber supports the enhancement of a reliable technological infrastructure to support the expanded use of telemedicine and other advanced technologies, coupled with reimbursement policies, and those policies that allow greater access to care and create more efficiencies in the delivery of healthcare services that can lead to reduced healthcare costs.

The Chamber recognizes the vital role public health and environment plays in the ongoing health and wellbeing of our communities year-round, especially during health crises and supports ensuring adequate resources are allocated to public health and environment agencies in Kansas. Lessons learned from the recent pandemic underscore the need to provide for large-scale rapid detection and treatment in order to minimize disruptions to commerce and public services during future public health events.

MOTION TO CONCUR WITH HOUSE AMENDMENTS TO HOUSE SUBSTITUTE FOR SB 347

Senate Journal Page 1516; Passed 31-9 (2/9/22); Signed into law 2/10/22

Enacting the attracting powerful economic expansion act to provide for tax and other incentives to attract projects in specified industries, or for national corporate headquarters, that involve a capital investment of at least \$1,000,000,000, providing for a reduction in the Kansas corporate income rate triggered by the first agreement under the act, limiting the number of agreements and requiring state finance council approval of agreements.

The Chamber supports effective economic development incentives that help Kansas retain and recruit high-quality jobs and high-quality employers.

MOTION TO ADOPT THE CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT ON HB 2237

Senate Journal Page 2361; Passed 34-3 (4/25/22); Signed into law 5/5/22

Enacting the Kansas affordable housing tax credit act, the Kansas housing investor tax credit act, the historic Kansas act, the Kansas rural home loan guarantee act, authorizing certain residential real property appraisals in rural counties to be performed without completing the sales comparison approach to value, allowing the use of bond proceeds under the Kansas rural housing incentive district act for residential vertical development and renovation of certain buildings within economically distressed urban areas and expanding eligibility for the child day care services assistance tax credit and providing a credit for employer payments to an organization providing access to employees for child day care services.

The Chamber supports policies that expand and promote worksite childcare programs to benefit working parents.

The Chamber supports policies that maintain a healthy housing industry allowing residents to access high quality and affordable homes.

The Chamber supports and encourages cooperation between state and local government in exploring policies and implementing programs, including public/private partnerships, that would improve the availability of an appropriate mix, supply and varied pricing of housing to attract, retain and better meet the needs and demands of our current and future workforce.

MOTION TO ADOPT THE CONFERENCE COMMITTEE REPORT ON HB 2703

Senate Journal Page 1905; Passed 39-0 (3/31/22); Signed into law 4/18/22

Changing law relating to employment including employment security law provisions regarding the employment security fund status and employer contribution rates and the definition of employment to conform with federal law, making revisions to the Department of Labor's My Reemployment Plan program and enacting the Kansas targeted employment act to facilitate employment of persons with developmental disabilities through a tax credit incentive for employers.

The Chamber supports reasonable and equitable modifications to the Unemployment Trust Fund to ensure balances that protect unemployed workers while balancing the costs placed on businesses. Modifications should respect the established experience ratings and not negatively impact businesses that have earned strong experience ratings.

FINAL ACTION ON SCR 1620

Senate Journal Page 1798; Failed 25-14 (3/23/22)

Proposing a constitutional amendment to require a supermajority for passage of certain bills containing new or increased state taxes.

The Chamber opposes requiring a supermajority vote by state or local governing bodies to approve tax increases.
