MAYOR'S MESSAGE

There are many exciting things going on in the City!

In January, 854 citizens responded to the "What are Your Priorities for 2019?" survey in the Vestavia Hills Listens portal. Citizens answered various questions and ranked the quality of the City services (public safety, parks and recreation, library, city streets, etc.). The information obtained from this survey was used by the Council in establishing priorities for the 2019 strategic plan.

On February 4, Congressman Gary Palmer hosted the annual U.S. Service Academy Nominee Reception at Vestavia Hills City Hall. I am always amazed at the number of our high school seniors that are nominees for the different service academies. Some of our students receive offers from multiple academies. This is a tremendous honor for our students and a credit to the Vestavia Hills

school system. Thank you, Congressman Palmer, for recognizing our students and promoting the service academies.

The Infrastructure and Community Spaces Plan will proceed to the design development phase. In fact, this topic was discussed during the Council's strategic planning session held on February 4 and 5. By the time this article is published, you should see progress with the Crosshaven Road improvements as well as definitive design renderings for Wald Park, Cahaba Heights ballfields, the Community Building and improvements to the Sicard Hollow Athletic Complex (SHAC).

Vestavia Hills will host its second Freedom from Addiction Coalition (FFAC) awareness breakfast to address the epidemic of opioid addiction that is sweeping the nation, our state and our cities. The awareness breakfast will be

The Courage to be Creative

The primary goal in education should be to ignite and motivate the natural curiosity to learn. For children, playing invariably brings out the creative aspects of their personality. When they are having fun or enjoying doing something, they are also engaged in learning at the deepest, most impactful level. As an adult, I can attest that this never really changes. At any age, gaining and applying knowledge works best when we enjoy the task before us and find meaning in it.

The World Economic Forum recently published an article about the role of technology in the global economy. Part of their study included results of a survey on what students most enjoyed doing in school. The top responses were participating in performing arts and computer science classes. This comes as no surprise given that both of these opportunities encourage creativity.

Vestavia Hills City Schools is committed to providing opportunities for our students to learn without limits. A strategic way to accomplish this is to embolden our students' creativity and curiosity. Accordingly, we are constantly envisioning how to support a school environment where students enjoy what they do, find relevance in their work, and learn.



One area that continues to experience growing interest is robotics. Students in elementary, middle, and high school are increasingly participating in robotics classes and competitions. They are immersed in computer programming that sharpens critical thinking skills and the ability to solve complex problems. They are sharpening their communication

VHHS CHORAL GROUP TO PERFORM AT NATIONAL CONFERENCE

Just Singin', the Vestavia Hills High School famed acapella singing group, has been invited to sing at the American Choral Directors Association (ACDA) National Conference on March 1 in Kansas City. The group is one of only 25 choirs selected from a pool of 225 choirs from around the globe.

This is the first time in the 60-year history of this major national music conference that an Alabama public school choir has been invited to perform, according to VHHS choral department director Megan Wicks-Rudolph. held at Vestavia Hills United Methodist Church on Thursday, April 4 at 7:00 a.m.

The latest statistics show that in the United States, drug overdose deaths involving opioids rose from 8,048 in 1999 to 47,600 in 2017 (according to the National Center for Health Statistics at the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention). According to Governor Kay Ivey's State of Alabama Opioid Action Plan, the rate of overdose deaths increased by 82% from 2006 through 2014. During these years, 5,128 overdose deaths were reported in Alabama. In 2016, 741 overdose deaths were reported, representing a rate of 15.3 persons per 100,000.

This is an opportunity to learn about the opioid/heroin crisis and get information for your loved ones or someone you know. Our FFAC is committed to getting the information out and connecting citizens in need with the agencies that can assist them. If you would like a private meeting with any of the agencies, this can be done after the presentation. Please share this information with your friends and through your churches. Together we can make a difference in this ongoing battle of drug addiction. I want to personally thank all of the agencies that partner with us.

SMOKE DETECTORS SAVE LIVES




Each day in America, lives are saved by functioning smoke detectors, but statistics show that 60% of fire fatality victims do not have a working smoke detector. Standard smoke detectors rely heavily on the ability to hear, but the Hearing Loss Association of America estimates

that approximately 48 million Americans suffer

from some degree of hearing loss. In these cases, the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) and the Vestavia Hills Fire Department recommend that smoke detectors for the hearing impaired be installed so that loved ones are alerted wherever they may be in the home. Smoke detectors with strobe lights may be used to notify the hearing impaired in the living spaces of homes where they would normally be awake. In order to alert residents when they are sleeping, the NFPA recommends a bed-shaker device which vibrates the resident's pillow or bed to alert them to evacuate the structure. Another option for a resident with partial hearing is to use a loud, mixed or low-pitched device designed for the hearing impaired.
