I would like to recognize a Vestavia Hills volunteer that has made a lasting

impression on our city. Zella Listerman, the long-time coordinator of our Monday Night Dancers, retired this past month. Zella served as the coordinator for this weekly event that was held at "The Lodge" for 11 years. I attended the "last dance" at the Lodge and was honored to present Zella with a certificate of recognition. This group, consisting mostly of senior citizens, will be meeting in the Dogwood Room until our new Community Building is completed. If you have not participated in this event, you need to come one Monday evening and enjoy the music, provided by live bands, and the opportunity to dance to all genres of music (maybe with the exception of Hip-Hop). Thank you, Zella, for all you have done to make the Monday Night Dance group so much fun. You will be missed!

I would like to bring you up-to-date on our newly created Phoenix Program. This program became operational on July 1, 2019. As you may have read in last month's submission, this substance abuse intervention program provides an opportunity for individuals that realize their addiction to seek counseling or recovery assistance through our police and fire departments. Individuals can seek assistance 24 hours per day, 7 days per week by coming to any Vestavia Hills Fire station or to the Vestavia Hills Police Department. First responders will contact participating recovery resource agencies that will provide the necessary assessment and placement depending on the individual's needs

CITY MANAGER'S REPORT

Jeff Downes, Vestavia Hills City Manager

As I contemplated the subject of my article this month, I had just exited one of my favorite

experiences of the year - the Vestavia Hills City Schools (VHCS) Institute Day. This official kick-off to the school year begins with a convocation of all VHCS staff at Mountaintop Church. In addition to expressing thanks to all who make our schools an incredible asset in our community, the VHCS leadership charts the plans and goals of the upcoming year to an audience that is inclusive of not just staff but community leadership. During this year's presentation, Dr. Todd Freeman struck a tone of serious, intentional effort to not just sustain the many positive attributes of the system, but to also focus on tactics that drill down into the "learning without limits" guiding principle. In his presentation, he spoke of "policy, practice

and partnership." From the city government perspective, the word "partnership" rung very loud to me. I have always believed that leadership without open partnership will not be successful. It takes more than one individual or entity to accomplish stretch goals associated with any plan.

Over the last two years, both the City schools and the City government have embraced plan development unprecedented for Vestavia Hills. VHCS has purchased two new schools to support continued healthy demand for its services by residents and invested in the upgrading of its existing facilities. The City government has addressed the unquestioned quality and quantity issues of its recreational facilities and is investing in high priority infrastructure projects. The next 12 to 18

FROM THE SUPERINTENDENT

Todd Freeman, Ed.D., Vestavia Hills City Schools Superintendent

Dwight Eisenhower is credited with making the statement, "Plans are useless, but planning is indispensable." There are various accounts

of what he actually said, but the idea is one that resonates in life, relationships, and work. Like many of you, I enjoy a plan and am usually uncomfortable without one. The only guarantee I've learned with plans, however, is that they will certainly change. Planning, then, becomes the way in which we can more appropriately react to change.

For the past several months, our school system has been engaged in strategic planning. Stakeholders in the process included teachers, administrators, parents, business leaders, community and government leaders, and, most importantly, students. From the outset, we wanted to focus on a few high-leverage goals while keeping our mission and beliefs intact. The goals are intentionally written to be adaptable to change and serve as platitudes for our system to aspire to.

The first goal is to "ensure that students learn and demonstrate a profound understanding of knowledge and skills consistent with expectations of teachers, parents, and the community, and ensure that students find value and meaning in the work provided to them." Our focus will be on policy that provides an environment for students to learn without limits, learning experiences that engage students, and partnerships that provide depth in those experiences.

The second goal is to "embrace our leadership role in developing common understandings and shared community support for confronting the problems and challenges that impact the system, youth,

and families." Our focus is on making strong connections with our students, working alongside our community partners to provide the optimal level of social and emotional support, and having an effective plan to communicate and garner support in this effort.

The third goal is to "strengthen leadership, management, and staffing systems committed to advancing the mission, beliefs, and goals of the strategic plan." This goal speaks to ensuring that we have the capacity to implement the first two goals. This includes supporting our employees with exceptional professional learning, health and wellness, while engaging in recruiting and retention practices to keep the very best teachers and staff.

Our next steps in this journey will be to implement action plans and measurable outcomes for each goal. We will continue to rely on the collective expertise of stakeholders in designing this work.

John Maxwell says we never fully arrive at meeting lofty goals; yet it is the pursuit of those goals where we grow and continually improve. It is this mindset that makes strategic planning a vibrant, organic process focused on our mission to provide every student the opportunity to learn without limits.

IT'S IN THE BAG!

It still feels like summer, but fall will be here before we know it! So, what should we do with all of the fallen leaves, pine straw and other small yard debris? If your answer is to blow it into the street ... guess again! (If you have a yard service, be sure to remind them to not blow yard debris into the streets, ditches, etc.)

Leaf debris poses a serious hazard when it accumulates in storm drains and gutters. Storm drains are designed to allow water to quickly drain away after a heavy rainfall, but if they become blocked or clogged, serious flooding issues can result. We need to keep storm drains and gutters clear, and proper disposal of yard debris is a step in the right direction. How do we do it? There are a few ways:

- Collect and store the leaves and grass clipping in bags to be collected on yard waste pickup day. Proper disposal will keep our rivers clear and help prevent flooding.
- Utilize the leaf litter and grass clippings as mulch for flower beds, vegetable gardens or along fence lines to prevent weed growth.



- Add the material to your compost. Grinding the leaves with the lawnmower before adding to the compost will ensure that they release their nutrients and accelerate the composting process.
- Allow grass clippings or ground leaves to dry and decompose in place. They won't smother your grass; in fact, they will add nutrients and help retain soil moisture.

and financial ability. The person seeking help can surrender any illegal substances in their possession without fear of facing criminal charges.

Within the first week of its inception, an individual came to VHPD seeking help and surrendered a quantity of illegal substances. One of our partnering recovery resource agencies responded and began the assessment and placement of this individual in the recovery process. Since then, we have had another person call City Hall requesting assistance. We shared the number of a recovery resource agency and the person received help immediately.

These two interventions have made the program successful. If we have saved one life, then we have helped curb this epidemic that is sweeping our state and our nation. There are citizen volunteer opportunities in this program. I want to personally recognize our Police and Fire departments for making this program possible. Vestavia Hills is a great place to live because our city cares about its citizens, including those that are suffering from addiction.

Our Community Spaces Plan is proceeding. The bid has been awarded and you will begin to see major work at Wald Park very soon. Our objective is to complete the park in the following sequence: the ball fields (including Miracle Field) in time for baseball season, the pool facility in time for summer swimming programs and complete the Community Building last.

Lastly, please make a note to attend our "Community Night Out" on October 1 and our "Salute to Veterans" on November 7. More details will be provided later.

months will see a full execution of these ideas. However, it would not be possible without partnerships. While these partnerships come in many different forms, I want to focus on the partnership between the City of Vestavia Hills and the Vestavia Hills City Schools.

When classroom space became the primary topic of conversation with our schools, the City and VHCS collaborated to develop a strategy to approach Hoover City Schools about the acquisition of the old Berry campus. Together, in partnership, the negotiation was successful and the City financially supported the purchase. We now eagerly await the opening of the new Pizitz Middle School. When the City needed more athletic field space, VHCS altered its original plans on the new Pizitz campus to construct a baseball and softball field that will be shared consistent with a joint use agreement. When unanticipated infrastructure costs associated with its global construction program became an issue for VHCS, the City stepped up to provide a 10-year funding commitment. When the redevelopment of Wald Park forced the temporary relocation of the City Public Service crews, the VHCS stepped up with a temporary home for these important employees, and so on and so on. These examples of daily collaboration between these two organizations are the product of true partnership.

Dr. Freeman, thank you for highlighting "partnership" as a key attribute of your incredibly successful organization. The City shares those thoughts. I hope the school year is one of success for all!



HOVERBOARD SAFETY



Over the past few years we have seen the number of hoverboards in the community increase dramatically. The Vestavia Hills Fire Department

wants you and your children to enjoy these devices in a safe manner. Hoverboards have been linked to a number of house fires causing property damage and injuries across the nation. To ensure a safe experience we encourage citizens to consider the following:

- Ensure the device carries the seal from an independent testing laboratory.
- Follow the manufacturer's directions.
- Never leave a charging hoverboard unattended.
- Never plug the hoverboard in over night.
- Should you see leaking fluid, excessive heat, smoke or sparking discontinue use and remove the hoverboard to an open area.
- Always wear a helmet!
