MAYOR'S MESSAGE

Do you remember where you were on September 11, 2001 at 7:41am? I was attending the Vestavia Hills Kiwanis Club breakfast meeting at the old Morrison's Cafeteria in Vestavia Hills. On that fateful day, the United States was attacked by international terrorists. It was initially thought that an airplane had accidentally flown into the North Tower of the World Trade Center in New York City. As an FBI Agent at the time, I hurriedly rushed to the Birmingham FBI office, arriving in time to see the second plane strike the South Tower. It became painfully obvious that this was no accident.

Before the day was over there were four hijacked aircraft, two of them striking the World Trade Center towers, one striking the Pentagon and one that crashed in a field in Pennsylvania after passengers attempted to take control of the aircraft.

The impact of September 11, 2001 is still being felt today. Hundreds of thousands of people remain at risk due to the trauma and exposure to toxic air following each attack. Carcinogens from building materials, gases and jet fuel laced the air around each crash site, with the most severe toxicity among the ruins of the World Trade Center towers. Although 2,974 people lost their lives that day, 4,343 survivors and first responders have died in the years since, according to the World Trade Center Health Program. To date, more people have now died from this toxic exposure than in the 9/11 attacks.

May we never forget the sacrifice of our first responders. In their honor and to honor those who died in the terrorist attacks, the City of Vestavia Hills is grateful to have hosted the annual 9/11 Remembrance Ceremony and Patriot Day Celebration on the lawn at City Hall. The cities of Vestavia Hills, Homewood and Mountain Brook jointly participate in this annual event and Homewood is slated to host the 2023 event.

Also during the month of September, the Watercolor Society of Alabama held an art workshop at City Hall featuring renowned artist, Larry Lombardo. I hope you were able to participate in these workshops. They also held their reception in Vestavia Hills and are hosting the Alabama Members Showcase Exhibition, which is limited to Alabama artists only. This art exhibition opened on September 25 and will run through October 22. If you missed the workshops, you should take in the art exhibition which will feature 50 watercolor paintings by 38 Alabama artists. The Watercolor Society of Alabama is an 82-year-old nonprofit organization and one of the oldest art groups in the country.

On October 18, 2022 at 6:00 p.m., the Over the Mountain Mayors will host a Domestic Violence Awareness Forum, "Protecting our Teens and Young Adults from Dating Violence." The event will be held at the Vestavia Hills Civic Center (1090 Montgomery Highway, Vestavia Hills, 35216). The public is invited to attend this free event hosted by myself, along with Mountain Brook Mayor Stewart Welch, Hoover Mayor Frank Brocato and Homewood Mayor Patrick McClusky. I am honored that Vestavia Hills is participating in this forum to spread awareness and provide necessary tools to reduce the occurrence and long-term effects of domestic violence. Everyone has the right to be in a safe, violence-free relationship. Please make plans to attend this informative meeting.



CITY MANAGER'S REPORT


The month of October represents the beginning of a new fiscal year for many public entities, including the City of Vestavia Hills. This 12-month spending period with its accompanying plan is vital to accomplishing strategic goals and operating in an economically sustainable manner. Vestavia Hills continues to operate in remarkable fashion as evidenced by third-party, Moody's Investor Services, issuing the City a AAA rating – the highest possible credit rating. Instead of duplicating the FY 2023 budget message, as has been the case for previous October editions of the Community News, I am providing a dashboard of metrics that reinforce the financial strength of the City as it adopts its next fiscal year's financial roadmap. The dashboard highlights some important financial facts and principles that are key to our city's future.


General Fund Revenue Per Capita. Vestavia Hills city government is run efficiently when compared to other Jefferson County municipalities. Our government provides a comprehensive array of services utilizing the least amount of revenue per




General Fund Balance. The City of Vestavia Hills' adheres to a set of financial policies that provide guidance for establishing and growing emergency reserves that are greater than 25% of annual operating expenses. This effort is best illustrated by an examination of the City's general fund balance over the last five years. As the cost of providing governmental services has grown, so have our reserves.

2021-2022 Actual. The largest expense type in the City budget relates to employee compensation and benefit costs. The City cannot provide services without a capable work force. While an expensive endeavor, the financial planning to keep pace in a robust labor market is crucial to the City's success. The FY 2023 budget includes a strong series of compensation improvements to ensure the City is successful in recruiting and retaining the best possible talent.

The City of Vestavia Hills' primary source of revenue is the sales tax. As a percentage of total revenues, it continues to grow in a healthy manner and outpace inflation. This metric reflects the strong economic health of our city.

SUPERINTENDENT'S MESSAGE

Throughout this school year, I plan to provide our community with background information about Vestavia Hills City Schools' 1Rebel 1Future vision. This month and next, the focus is on our campuses and facilities. If you enjoy numbers, this newsletter is just for you!

Over the past decade, because of the unparalleled support of the community,

our school system invested \$110 million in capital improvements to address growth in enrollment from 6,119 in 2010 to 7,192 in 2017 – a 17.5% increase. Our schools now have the necessary space for the number of students we currently serve. The focus moving forward is to make sure facility conditions meet the same high expectations we have for our academic programs.

The 7,000 children who attend Vestavia Hills City Schools will spend roughly 16,000 hours of their lives in our buildings this year alone. For 177 school days, about one-third of a student's day is spent under our roof. And that doesn't include time spent attending concerts, sports competitions, fall festivals and many other events. Given the amount of time we have children on our campuses, I'm confident we can all agree that maintaining top-notch facilities must be a priority.

Vestavia Hills City Schools is made up of 9 schools totaling more than 180 acres of property which includes 1.3 million square feet of

building space, 11 ball fields and 2,226 parking spaces. The age of buildings on our campuses range from 18 to 65 years with the average being 49 years. We have 9 kitchens/cafeterias, 13 gymnasiums, 9 libraries, almost 400 exterior doors and 600 classrooms. We also have additional spaces for school resource officers, nurses, counselors, speech language pathologists, interventionists, reading coaches and administrators.

Our school system employs 54 custodians and 6 maintenance technicians who take care of our facilities. That amounts to each custodian for every 24,000 square feet of building space, and one maintenance technician for every 216,000 square feet. The combined utilities cost for our campuses is more than \$3.2 million per year (more about this in next month's newsletter). With an operations budget of just over \$10 million, we spend about \$1,400 annually per student to maintain buildings and grounds.

The 1Rebel 1Future vision was developed, in part, after VHCS completed assessments of our facilities to determine needs. These identified needs include safety and security; roofs, heating, air conditioning and ventilation systems; accessibility; parking lots and driveways, interior and exterior building conditions; electrical systems; and plumbing. This level of detail has provided the blueprint for developing a comprehensive plan to update and more effectively maintain our facilities. I encourage you to watch the September and October Board of Education meetings to learn more about these plans.





Jay Turner is a Principal Engineering
Inspector in the Public Works –
Engineering department. His primary
responsibility is to inspect construction
sites to assure compliance with our

stormwater management requirements and City ordinances. There are approximately 200 active sites within our City limits and they are required to be visited a minimum of one time per month. As he inspects the various sites, he enters all inspection reports into the Storm Water Management Authority, Inc (SWMA) data base. (SWMA is a cooperative agency formed to assist the municipalities of Jefferson County comply with their National Pollution Discharge Elimination System Stormwater permit issued by Alabama Department of Environmental Management, and the United States Environmental Protection Agency's Title 40 Code of Federal Regulations Part 122.)

Jay and his wife, Keisha, live in Moody and have three sons – Trace (19), James-Grant (15) and Grayson (3). In his spare time, he enjoys spending time with family, watching college football (WDE!), taking part in any activities or sports his sons may be involved in and playing tennis and pickleball.
