Lions Center for the Visually Impaired (LCVI) has been serving the community as a non-profit organization since 1954. Previously named the "Diablo Valley Blind Center" and then "Lions Blind Center of Diablo Valley," LCVI is here to help seniors who are blind or visually impaired with free supportive services.

"We offer free supportive services for seniors 55+ who are blind or visually impaired in Contra Costa, Solano, and Alameda Counties," said Richard Grange, activities and marketing coordinator for LCVI. Free services include in-home visits and needs assessments, adjustment counseling, daily living skills/home safety, assistive devices and low vision aids, mobility training, activities, events and outings, and free eye screenings for seniors.

LCVI is a growing non-profit proud of their long history serving the blind and visually impaired in the East Bay. LCVI was started by a group of dedicated volunteers from local Lions Clubs who wanted to make life better for the blind citizens in the community. Over the years, countless hours of volunteer work, financial contributions, and commitment to the mission have allowed services expand and evolve to better address the changing needs of the blind and visually impaired community.

Grange joined the organization in December of 2019 in order to revitalize the activities and marketing of the organization and create new programs, activities, events, and outings to engage, educate and empower the clients.
