Community Health Needs Assessment

- Background

- The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act of 2010, which was enacted March 23, 2010, includes requirements for nonprofit hospitals that wish to maintain their tax-exempt status. All nonprofit hospitals are mandated to conduct a Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) every three years.

- Criteria for Health Needs Prioritization

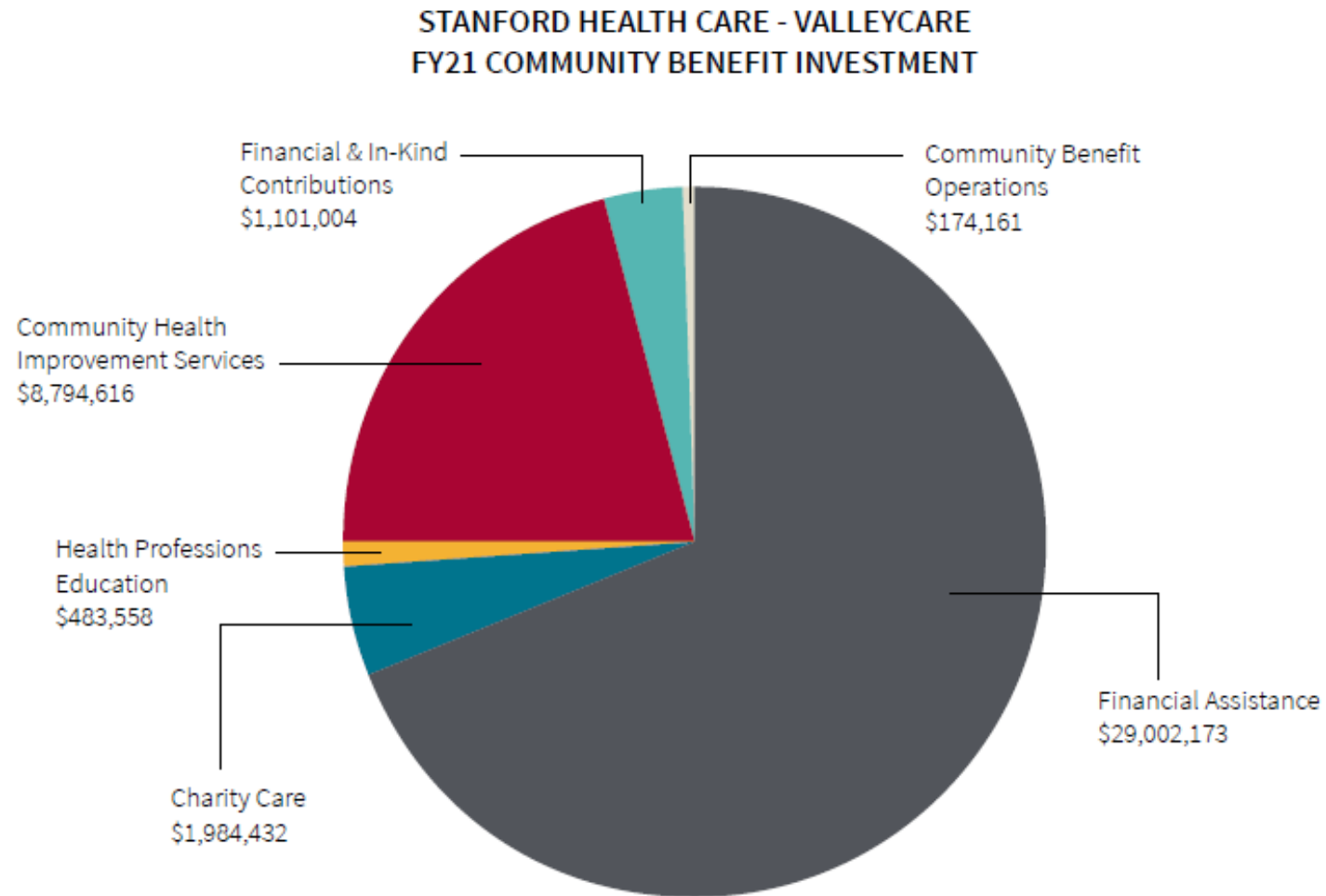
- **Community priority.** The community prioritizes the issue over other issues about which it has expressed concern during the CHNA primary data collection process.
- **Clear disparities or inequities.** This refers to differences in health outcomes by subgroups. Subgroups may be based on geography, languages, ethnicity, culture, citizenship status, economic status, sexual orientation, age, gender, or others.
- **Lacking sufficient community assets and/or resources.** The IRS requires that hospitals take into consideration whether existing assets/ resources are available to address the issue.
- **Multiplier effect.** A successful solution to the health need has the potential to solve multiple problems. For example, if rates of obesity go down, diabetes rates could also go down.

 - Expanded access to care and community-based testing
 - Participation in COVID-19 clinical trials
 - Provided in-kind community-level emergency management expertise
- Supportive Care Programs – Cancer
 - Support groups health education classes, seminars, and symposia, exercise and yoga classes, and healing touch supportive care
- Med Data – Patient Financial Assistance
 - Assistance for low income, uninsured, underinsured and homeless patients in researching their healthcare options: Free assistance to help individuals research eligibility requirements, identify appropriate health insurance programs, complete applications, compile required documentation, and follow up with county case managers as needed

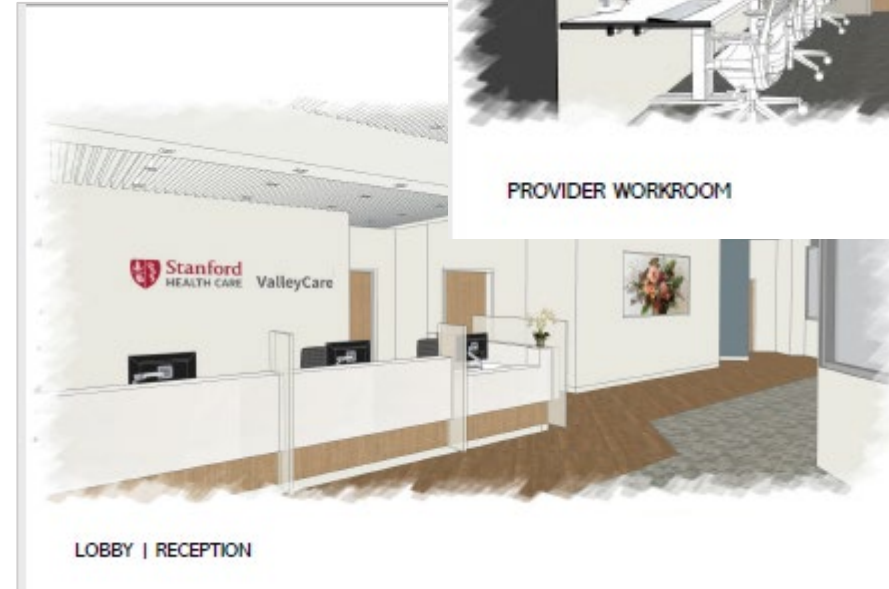

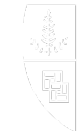

- **Gastroenterology:** *Expanding complex Hepatology and Endoscopy services*
- **Neurology:** *Advancing OP Neurodiagnostic Lab Services (EEG,EMG, EMU), 2 new Stanford Neurologists*
- **Urology:** *Expanding Men's health services*
- **Pulmonology:** *Expanding Integrated Chest Clinic and Lung cancer screening program (including advanced robotics)*

| Program Expansion in the Region

Stanford Primary Care

- New Stanford Primary Care Clinic at 5568 Gibraltar Drive, Pleasanton
 - A 22,000-square-foot state-of-the-art facility
 - 38 exam rooms and 1 treatment room
 - 13+ Primary Care Physicians and Specialists
 - Tied directly into the Stanford network
- Specialties
 - Internal Medicine
 - Family Medicine
 - Endocrinology
 - Laboratory Services
 - On-site X-ray Services
 - Ultrasound
- Opened March 2022



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Stanford OBGYN & Women's Health Center

- New OB/GYN Center at 4725 First Street, Pleasanton
 - 5 physicians and 1 nurse practitioner
 - Exploring complex fertility and maternal child medicine programs
- Specialties
 - Obstetrics
 - Gynecology
 - Labor & Delivery Consultations
 - Ultrasound
 - Additional Women's Health Services being evaluated
- Opened June 2022



Stanford Cancer and Orthopedics Centers – 5725 W. Las Positas Blvd.

- Cancer Clinic Expansion
 - Oncology Clinic – 6 to 19 rooms
 - Infusion Center – 12 to 24 chairs *(November 2023)*
 - Pharmacy – onsite
 - Full and integrated portfolio of Stanford Cancer services
- Orthopedics Center Expansion – Summer 2022
 - Largest complement of Stanford Orthopedic Surgeons outside of Palo Alto
 - Increased capacity and imaging capabilities and expansion of foot/ankle services



Stanford Ophthalmology Services

- Ophthalmology – 2023
 - *Coming Soon! - 2023 in Livermore*
 - *Extension of Stanford's Byers Eye Institute*
 - *Advanced subspecialty glaucoma, cornea and eye surgical treatments*
