Reopening Your Business and Hiring Employees

The Employment Development Department (EDD) offers valuable no-cost programs, resources, and services to help you reopen your business.

Enroll in the Work Sharing Program

The <u>Work Sharing program</u> is available to any employer who has a reduction in production, services, or other conditions that may lead you to seek an alternative to layoff. It can provide partial unemployment benefits to supplement reduced work hours – helping you avoid the expense of hiring and training later as business conditions improve.

If you furloughed or laid off workers during the pandemic, the Work Sharing program can help you bring back employees at reduced hours. These employees can continue collecting the additional \$300 a week in federal unemployment benefits, as well as have a portion of their wages subsidized by their regular unemployment benefits. The federal government is covering 100% of the costs of Work Sharing benefits.

EDD recently automated the Work Sharing application and weekly certification process, making it faster and easier for employers and workers to take advantage of this valuable program.

TAX CREDITS	<u>Tax credits</u> are available for employers who hire individ- uals from certain target groups that experience barriers to employment.
FIDELITY BONDING	The <u>Fidelity Bonding Program</u> provides bonding services to help alleviate employers' concerns in hiring ex-offenders and at-risk job applicants. Our bonding program is provid- ed at no cost to employers, employees, and job seekers at AJCCs throughout the state.
ASK EDD	<u>Ask EDD</u> provides a convenient online option for employ- ers to report employees who may refuse a suitable offer of work.
