- Encourage social distancing and enhance spacing at establishments including by encouraging drive-through, delivery, curb-side pick up, spacing of tables/stools, limiting party sizes and occupancy, avoiding self-serve stations, restricting employee shared spaces, rotating or staggering shifts, if feasible
- ✓ Train all employees on health and safety protocols



- ✓ Develop and implement procedures to check for <u>signs</u> and <u>symptoms</u> of employees daily upon arrival, as feasible
- √ Encourage anyone who is sick to <u>stay home</u>





- √ Monitor employee absences and have flexible leave policies and practices
- ✓ Be ready to consult with the local health authorities if there are cases in the facility or an increase in cases in the local area

Are recommended health and safety actions in place?

- ✓ Promote <u>healthy hygiene practices</u> such as <u>hand washing</u> and <u>employees wearing a cloth face</u> <u>covering</u>, as feasible
- ✓ Intensify <u>cleaning</u>, <u>disinfection</u>, and ventilation
- ✓ Encourage social distancing and enhance spacing between employees, including through physical barriers, changing layout of workspaces, encouraging telework, closing or limiting access to communal spaces, staggering shifts and breaks, and limiting large events, when and where feasible
- ✓ Consider modifying travel and commuting practices. Promote telework for employees who do not live in the local area, if feasible.
- ✓ Train all employees on health and safety protocols



- ✓ Develop and implement procedures to check for <u>signs</u> <u>and symptoms</u> of employees daily upon arrival, as feasible
- Encourage anyone who is sick to <u>stay home</u>
- ✓ Plan for if an employee gets sick
 - Regularly communicate and monitor developments with local authorities and employees
 - √ Monitor employee absences and have flexible leave policies and practices
- √ Be ready to consult with the local health authorities if there are cases in the facility or an increase in cases in the local area

It is important to check with state and local health officials and other partners to determine the most appropriate actions while adjusting to meet the unique needs and circumstances of the local community.

- ✓ Are you ready to protect children and employees at <u>higher</u> risk for severe illness?

Are recommended health and safety actions in place?

- ✓ Promote <u>healthy hygiene</u> <u>practices</u> such as <u>hand</u> <u>washing</u> and <u>employees</u> <u>wearing a cloth face covering</u>, as feasible
- ✓ Intensify <u>cleaning</u>, <u>sanitization</u>, <u>disinfection</u>, and ventilation
 - Encourage social distancing through increased spacing, small groups and limited mixing between groups, if feasible. For family child care, monitor distance between children not playing together and maintain distance between children during nap time
- √ Adjust activities and procedures to limit sharing of items such as toys, belongings, supplies, and equipment
- √ Train all employees on health and safety protocols



- ✓ Develop and implement procedures to check for signs and symptoms of children and employees daily upon arrival, as feasible
- ✓ If feasible, implement enhanced screening for children and employees who have recently been present in areas of high transmission, including temperature checks and symptom monitoring
- ✓ Encourage anyone who is sick to <u>stay home</u>
- ✓ Plan for if children or employees get sick
- Regularly communicate and monitor developments with local authorities, employees, and families regarding cases, exposures, and updates to policies and procedures.
- ✓ Monitor child and employee absences and have a pool of trained substitutes and flexible leave policies and practices. For family child care, if feasible, have a plan for a substitute caregiver if provider or a family member in the home gets sick
- ✓ Be ready to consult with the local health authorities if there are cases in the facility or an increase in cases in the local area

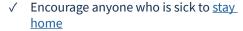


Are recommended health and safety actions in place?

- ✓ Encourage <u>social distancing</u>
 through increased spacing,
 small groups, and limited mixing
 between groups, and staggered
 scheduling, arrival, and drop off, if
 feasible
- ✓ Where feasible, adjust activities and procedures to limit sharing of items such as toys, belongings, supplies, and equipment
- √ Train all employees on health and safety protocols



- ✓ Develop and implement procedures to check for <u>signs and symptoms</u> in children and employees daily upon arrival, as feasible
- ✓ If feasible, implement enhanced screening for children and employees who have recently been present in areas of high transmission, including temperature checks and symptom monitoring





- Regularly communicate and monitor developments with local authorities, employees, and families regarding cases, exposures, and updates to policies and procedures
- √ Monitor child and employee absences and have a pool of trained substitutes, and flexible leave policies and practices

PUBLIC SPACES, WORKPLACES, BUSINESSES, SCHOOLS, AND HOMES

DETERMINE WHAT NEEDS TO BE CLEANED.

Areas unoccupied for 7 or more days need only routine cleaning. Maintain existing cleaning practices for outdoor areas.

DETERMINE HOW AREAS WILL BE DISINFECTED. Consider the type of surface and how often the surface is touched. Prioritize disinfecting frequently touched surfaces.

CONSIDER THE RESOURCES AND EQUIPMENT NEEDED. Keep in mind the availability of cleaning products and personal protective equipment (PPE) appropriate for cleaners and disinfectants.

Follow guidance from state, tribal, local, and territorial authorities.

2 IMPLEMENT

CLEAN VISIBLY DIRTY SURFACES WITH SOAP AND WATER prior to disinfection.

USE THE APPROPRIATE CLEANING OR DISINFECTANT PRODUCT. Use an EPA-approved disinfectant against COVID-19, and read the label to make sure it meets your needs.

ALWAYS FOLLOW THE DIRECTIONS ON THE LABEL. The label will include safety information and application instructions. Keep disinfectants out of the reach of children.

3 MAINTAIN AND REVISE

CONTINUE ROUTINE CLEANING AND DISINFECTION.

Continue or revise your plan based upon appropriate disinfectant and PPE availability. Dirty surfaces should be cleaned with soap and water prior to disinfection. Routinely disinfect frequently touched surfaces at least daily.

MAINTAIN SAFE PRACTICES such as frequent handwashing, using cloth face coverings, and staying home if you are sick.

CONTINUE PRACTICES THAT REDUCE THE POTENTIAL FOR EXPOSURE. Maintain social distancing, staying six feet away from others. Reduce sharing of common spaces and frequently touched objects.





MAKING YOUR PLAN TO CLEAN AND DISINFECT

Cleaning with soap and water removes germs, dirt, and impurities from surfaces. It lowers the risk of spreading infection.

Disinfecting kills germs on surfaces. By killing germs on a surface after cleaning, it can further lower the risk of spreading infection.



Is the area indoors?





Maintain existing cleaning practices.

Coronaviruses naturally die in hours to days in typical indoor and outdoor environments. Viruses are killed more quickly by warmer temperatures and sunlight.

Has the area been occupied within the last 7 days?



Yes, the area has been occupied within the last 7 days.



The area has been unoccupied within the last 7 days.

The area will need only routine cleaning.





Is it a frequently touched surface or object?



Yes, it is a frequently touched surface or object.



Thoroughly clean these materials.

Consider setting a schedule for routine cleaning and disinfection, as appropriate.



What type of material is the surface or object?

Hard and non-porous materials like glass, metal, or plastic.

Visibly dirty surfaces should be cleaned prior to disinfection.

Consult EPA's list of disinfectants for use against COVID-19, specifically for use on hard, non-porous surfaces and for your specific application need. More frequent cleaning and disinfection is necessary to reduce exposure.

Soft and porous materials like carpet, rugs, or material in seating areas.

Thoroughly clean or launder materials.

Consider removing soft and porous materials in high traffic areas. Disinfect materials if appropriate products are available.
