#### **Congratulations to the Rangely High School Cross Country Team!**

The Rangely Cross Country team took the boys, and Mary Scoggins, to the state championship. The meet was held on Saturday, October 30 in Colorado Springs at the Norris Penrose Event Center.

The boys were able to run six boys as a team, they scored four, and the other two runners displaced other teams' runners. This was the second year in a row for the boys to make it to state. The state team consisted of senior Colton Noel, juniors-Andrew Dorris, Anthony Dorris, Fisher Winder, Kevin Wren, and freshman James Talbot. The boys were able to place 18th as a team.

Andrew was the number one runner for the team placing 54th with a time of 18:50. Colton Noel making his third appearance at the state meet ranked 77th with a time of 19:40. James was the third runner on the team with a time of 20:26, respectfully. Anthony and Kevin were right together at the end with a time of 21:07 and 21:10. Fisher rounded up the boys with a time of 22:08. "It was a great year for the boys. They should be as tough next year since we will only be losing one senior on the state team. We will miss Colton with his leadership skills and sense of humor." said Coach Scoggins. We will also be losing Joseph Adams, who served as an alternate on the state team.

Mary Scoggins was the lone female runner for the Panthers. She had a great race at the meet. She was able to come in 13th with a time of 21:06. "She ran strong and smart on the course. We couldn't have asked for more. She will be missed next year. She is a great leader for the girls and boys team and provided a sense of direction for the team." said Coach Scoggins.

Several runners will be going to the Nike Southwest Regional Cross Country meet on Saturday, November 20, in Tempe, Arizona.

Perched in the high desert of northwestern Colorado you find Rangely, a small town full of exciting events as well as great outdoor recreation. Located between Denver and Salt Lake City in Rio Blanco County, this peaceful yet accessible town is adorned with iconic, sprawling mesas, enticing trails as far as the eye can see, the picturesque Kenney Reservoir, and captivating White River meandering throughout.

Just this year the Town of Rangely celebrated its 75-year anniversary of incorporation with its residents. "Rangely is the epitome of small town USA: friendly neighbors, exciting recreation, pristine nature, endless skies, and cherished traditions that make the community one of the best kept secrets in Colorado," says Jeannie Caldwell, a resident of Rangely since January 2019.



#### Things to Do in Rangely

The town is a truly dynamic environment where people come together not only to celebrate the fascinating landscape, but to honor the passing seasons together in the most memorable ways. Here are some of the go-to things to do in Rangely all year round:

#### Adventure

While a small town, there are countless opportunities to connect with the land and the community. To begin, the landscape is phenomenal with lakes, rivers and Bureau of Land Management (BLM) property surrounding the town. Adventure lovers can hike, mountain bike, kayak, paddleboard, go tubing, and take to the trails on OHVs or ATVs. In fact, the town is also home to the only designated rock crawling park in Colorado – an exhilarating place for residents and visitors to bring their off-road vehicles.


#### Leisure

For those looking for leisurely recreation, tent camping, RV camping, fishing, hunting, boating on the reservoir, and stargazing are top pastimes. "We have big dark skies so I can literally step out on the front porch in the summer and see the Milky Way above me... it's stunning," says Caldwell. Even history lovers can get a view into the area's rich past, with Native American petroglyphs and even Jurassic-age dinosaur fossils at Dinosaur National Monument, which is only 20 minutes away.

#### The Arts

The single most iconic attraction when it comes to arts and music in Rangely is The Tank. "The Tank is an old water tank brought

here on a railway years ago, but was never filled with water," Caldwell says. "So over time it was converted into The Tank

There is a horse and buggy decorated and beautiful, carriage rides on the top of a mesa, free meals for everyone, barbecue, hot chocolate and more. This year the Chamber Director will have Christmas at the Chamber, where there will be Mr. and Mrs. Claus, pictures and gifts for the kids. There is also a parade of lights.

### Rangely District Hospital CEO Corner

I am thrilled to update the community on the progress of several projects we are working on at the hospital. We are always trying to improve in several different ways to best serve you. The endeavors I would like to update you on in this quarterly review are COVID trends/reimbursements, vaccine mandate, billing implementation, the hospital foundation progress, clinic patient registration, provider update, and pharmacy tech certifications.

On a personal note, my parents came to visit from Idaho about a month ago. The day after they left my Dad tested positive for COVID. My Mom was positive two days later. Both had their COVID vaccine shots prior to getting COVID. My Dad and Mom experienced the regular symptoms, shortness of breath, fever, cough, and no sense of taste and smell. After testing positive Dad went to the ER and was administered monoclonal antibodies. After treatment he is recovering well and required no additional oxygen support. My Mom on the other hand, spent



several days in the hospital. She has been back and forth from home to the ER with chest pain and weakness. She did receive the monoclonal antibodies thinking she could wait it out. She eventually went home with oxygen and is slowly regaining her strength.

We do offer the monoclonal antibodies at Rangely District Hospital if the patient meets certain criteria. This is a preventative measure to help minimize or decrease the symptoms helping with recovery. We are seeing an uptick of COVID in the community. I would encourage early intervention with monoclonal antibodies if possible. I also know it is a highly politicized topic, but would encourage those who can, to be vaccinated. The good news is nationally we are seeing a trend downwards in COVID hospitalizations. Our area tends to lag behind the nation by a month or two because of our rural location. Regardless, this is great news to hear circling around medical news articles.

As many of you know the government has distributed several stimulus CARES Act funds to different hospitals and businesses. There have been four CARES Act distributions so far. The fourth round is still pending. Rangely District Hospital received around 3.8 million with the first distribution and nothing from the second or third. Of the 3.8 million, we were very cautious about using any of the funds due to the lack of clarity for use. Any of the funds used had to be directly tied to COVID. We ended up using around \$350,000 last year to offset capital purchases. We are estimating another \$350,000 for COVID related labor and supplies. Those capital purchases were specifically related to COVID. Those funds needed to be used before the deadline of June 30th 2021. The rest of the monies and interest will be returned by the end of the year 2021. With regard to the fourth round of funds, we recently sent in an application for distribution. The government loosened some of the regulations for use. We do not know how much will be awarded to RDH, but hope to offset more capital equipment plus revenue loss during the timeframe allowed. If you have any questions regarding how or why we used these funds please come join our board meeting the last Thursday of the month or make an appointment with me to discuss the current regulations and or restrictions of use.

The vaccine mandate for healthcare facilities was a hot topic in the last quarter. RDH followed all the regulations in order to keep our doors open. We acted quick to implement policies to comply with federal and state requirements. Currently, a little over 70% of our employees are vaccinated with the other 30% having chosen a medical or religious exemption. This puts us in a 100% compliance rate according to their criteria which is reported twice a month.

Our billing implementation is going well. As of August, we are doing all of our coding and billing in-house. Finance has set up a revenue cycle committee to oversee the process. Nothing is perfect, but we are continuing to improve in all aspects of billing. If you have any questions about billing please reach out to our billing office for help.

I couldn't be prouder of the Rangely District Hospital Foundation and its progress this year. We held a garage sale, golf tournament and were recently awarded \$150,000-dollar Main Street grant. The cooperation with the town was instrumental in obtaining the grant. You will start seeing some progress with a fence and possibly some leveling on the Eagle Crest/North Park project. Unfortunately, with weather changing soon it might delay some of the projects lined up, but rest assured we will be ready come springtime to finish. We continue to look for grants outside of the community to help offset costs. I appreciate all the communities support thus far. Any local donations will be accepted at the front desk of the hospital.

We are striving to make our clinic registration process easier. We have partnered with a company called Phreesia to enhance our patient intake/encounter. This partnership will introduce a streamlined way for patients to schedule their appointments and check in from the privacy and safety of any mobile device. The goal of this partnership is to make the patient experience a swift and pleasant one.


Phreesia has furnished the clinic with secure tablets for patients to check-in, answer health-related questions, and pay co-pays. Implementation is scheduled to begin in mid-November. The clinic understands this style of self-scheduling and checking-in is not for everyone. If you prefer to call for scheduling an appointment or have any questions, do not hesitate to call.



## Wolf Creek Reservoir Project Permitting \$330,000 awarded, Rio Blanco and Moffat Counties

Since 2013, the Rio Blanco Water Conservancy District has conducted planning work to design a water storage project within the White River basin. A 2014 conditional water right for a 66,720 acre-foot reservoir was awarded to the project in January 2021 for the following beneficial uses: municipal, augmentation, mitigation of environmental impacts, hydroelectric power generation, recreation, piscatorial, and wildlife habitat. River District funding is intended to support an inclusive, collaborative permitting process supported by data and responsive to public feedback.




### La Mesa Waterline Project

There were approximately 1500 linear feet of new line installed with new service connections and fire hydrants. This concludes the major portion of work that needed to be completed on La Mesa.

Over the course of the past ten plus years the Town has been very diligent in working not only on the Water Plant but also the Distribution system. It has been a long journey with the end finally in sight.





### Kennedy Drive Update

The Kennedy Drive multi-use path is scheduled for paving Tuesday and Wednesday Nov. 9th and 10th. In preparation for the paving, Town crews have been working on grading and compacting the surface. We are also preparing excavations for foundations for 6 solar lights that will illuminate the portion of the path furthest from the road.

Paving should be complete the week of November 8th, and lights will be installed and programmed by Public Works this fall.

Both projects were partially paid for by grants from the Main Street Revitalization program, AARP funds through the Main Street program, in-kind labor and a small amount of matching funds from the Town of Rangely, and the Associated Governments of Northern Colorado (AGNC).

Substitute teachers make \$115 per full day. Licensed teachers' pay is based on qualifications.

Substitutes for all levels, preschool through 12th grade, are needed. No prior experience is necessary. To qualify to become a substitute, you must have a high school diploma and pass a background check. The background checks (\$52) and substitute teaching certificates (\$60) are reimbursable on your first paycheck with the completion of paperwork.

In January of 1961, construction of what was then an extension campus of Mesa College in Rangely, CO began. Dr. William A. Medesy was named Dean of Rangely College and within months, he began hiring new staff and faculty and construction continued with community support. Every weekend for months, church groups and individual members of the community headed to the hills to collect rocks that now make up CNCC's distinguishing campus features in Rangely.

On September 20, 1962, 83 students began college classes at CNCC.

A dedication ceremony attended by hundreds was held on Saturday, October 13, 1962, with U.S. Congressman Wayne N. Aspinall and Colorado Commissioner of Education, Dr. Byron A. Hansford, serving as the VIP guests of the ceremony. In his address, Dr. Hansford stated, "Rangely pioneered in oil, and now it is pioneering in education." Roe Saunders, President of the Mesa College Committee added, "It's the biggest contribution from the fewest people I've ever seen in my life."

It was because of this event that, in 2012, Governor John Hickenlooper (served 2011-2019) officially proclaimed October 13th as CNCC Day!

Over the next 12 months, we will share reflections from the past 59 years, pointing out how they have defined CNCC. Next Fall, we will host an event, open to all members of the CNCC community (family members of years past and present), to celebrate and learn about plans to take CNCC, forward, strong and strategically, into the next 60 years.



# The Town of Rangely Receives \$53,120 Main Street Open for Business Grant

TREAD, Rangely's Main Street Program, and the Town of Rangely, are excited to announce they received a Main Street Open for Business (MSOB) grant in the amount of \$53,126.00. Rangely was one of thirteen communities in the state of Colorado to receive MSOB grant funds.

MSOB supports façade improvements and energy efficiency projects for businesses in the state's traditional downtowns with funding set aside by Senate Bill 21-252 for the Colorado Main Street Program. The initiative is designed to increase sales and revenue for rehabilitated buildings, reduce energy consumption and lower utility bills, and create jobs while retaining existing ones.

Rangely became a Main Street community in August of 2020. The Main Street Board consists of an Executive Director, five Board Members and four Advisors.

Colorado Main Street is an exemplary program which offers support for community-led downtown revitalization. Main Street communities thrive by providing a customizable framework to focus efforts, energy, and resources to create a more vibrant community. Proven revitalization strategies and needed organization help communities identify and leverage opportunities and resources. By focusing on current community strengths and assets, the Colorado Main Street Program is a catalyst to move communities forward, one step at a time.



#### Rangely, CO: Home to The Only Rock Crawling Park in the State



On the border of Colorado and Utah sits Rangely, CO, home to the only off-road rock crawling park in the state. The small desert town "ranked #23 in the U.S. for "Best Work from Home Cities in 2021," and has a population of just over 2,000 people. Rangely prides itself on a high quality of life, beautiful mountain scenery, education, and is only about an hour's drive away from Grand Junction, CO, and Interstate 70. Rangely is an ideal road-tripping stop for any traveler.



In the late 2000s, The Bureau of Land Management set aside "560 acres of natural terrain" for the Rangely Rock Crawling Park. The park features an Adventure Rally Course, Endless OHV Trails, and steep sections which "achieve absurd angles, one of them being close to 90 degrees." Entrance is free, and participants can choose between using 4×4 vehicles, ATVs, dirt bikes, or other options. After a hot and sunny day in the park, crawlers can drive over to Kenney Reservoir where they can cool off, swim, boat, fish, or camp for a cheap price.



The Rangely Rock Crawling Park is located just south of the town.

The Rangely Rock Crawling Park has one main trail that separates into several, allowing for unique difficulties and speeds. The fast lane remains pretty flat and has the perfect terrain for just cruising around, while the slow lane leads to more difficult rock sections that need to be taken seriously. Shawn Morgan, a frequent rock crawler, stated in an interview that:

Below is set out between paragraphs:

"It's you against the rocks. I like getting into predicaments where you don't know how you're gonna get out of it. It gets the heart rate up all right. It scares you to death."

Thrilling recreational activities like rock crawling have a limited demand because they are dangerous and can result in life-threatening injuries. However, the off-road vehicles market is projected to grow up to 7% between now and 2027, shifting from a \$15 billion market to a \$25 billion market. This market growth will undoubtedly boost tourism in Rangely and at the Rangely Rock Crawling Park as Coloradans are always looking for new thrill-seeking adventures.

In Western Colorado, the Rangely Rock Crawling Park is sure to offer a unique and affordable experience. It is a one-of-a-kind destination that offers plenty of shopping, dining, camping, and breathtaking views and adventures.

Vault Pressure Control now has a small branch/service office located in Rangely at 510 E. Main Street. Vault is a well head pressure control service which has several sites around the country.


Currently, the Rangely office has two employees. They also rotate employees from their Colorado field office, which is located in Berthoud, Colorado.

### Why You Should Never Top a Tree

Topping is probably the most harmful and archaic tree pruning practice known. Arborists have been trying to educate homeowners about this harmful practice for at least 25 years, yet people still top trees. Why?



**What is topping?** Topping is the indiscriminate careless cutting of tree branches to stubs.

**Why do people top trees?** Some homeowners top a tree because they believe it has grown too tall. They believe that topping reduces the hazard of falling branches. It actually has the opposite effect.

**Topping stresses trees and reduces their life.** Trees rely on their leaves to photosynthesize and make food. Topping removes a large portion of the tree's leaves which depletes the tree's stored energy reserves and removes the tree's ability to make food. It essentially starves the tree which stresses it. A stressed tree is more vulnerable to disease and insect attack.


**Topping causes undesirable growth.** Topping a tree removes most of the buds that form normal, properly attached branches, which will often cause "water sprout" regrowth just below the pruning cut. Water sprouts are fast growing, dense, ugly, upright branches. (See picture below). Topped trees quickly grow back to their original height, but lack the beauty of their natural form. Water sprouts are not only ugly, but because they are improperly attached, they cause major structural problems for the tree later, and lead to it becoming a hazard tree.

**Topping leaves behind open wounds.** The wounds left behind from tree topping and improper pruning cannot be sealed off and closed correctly by the tree, making

it susceptible to decay. Once decay enters the wound or stub, it quickly moves into the trunk, causing a hazard tree, reduced lifespan, and eventually premature death.

**Topping deforms trees.** When a tree is topped, its natural beauty is replaced by ugly branch stubs and branches that grow in a broom-like shape. A topped tree is disfigured and mutilated. Tree topping also lowers property value.

Protect your trees and please don't top them! Pictures below show a topped tree.



How to prevent topping and protect your trees. Trees are an investment and should be protected as such. Homeowners should be very particular when hiring a professional to prune their trees, asking many questions, including what their qualifications are and asking for referrals. Certified Arborists through the International Society of Arboriculture are recognized as qualified, competent, and safe tree workers who have shown their knowledge through intensive study and testing. You can check a certification through their website at isa-arbor.com. I am a past certified arborist with extensive tree care knowledge.
