

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WEST WAGON WHEEL TRAIL SYSTEM

DIFFICULTY LEVELS



GREEN (BEGINNER):

A graveled or surfaced road with good sight distance.



BLUE (INTERMEDIATE):

A two track road or trail with natural surface, moderate steep sections with drop-offs, ruts, dust and frequent changes in the riding surface



BLACK (EXPERT):

A trail or primitive two track road including steep, rough and narrow segments, often with switchbacks.

NOTE: The ratings for these trails are based on subjective comparison of trails **within this system only**. Newcomers are encouraged to begin their riding experience on the Wagon Wheel OHV Trail System with a "beginner" trail. This will establish a base for moving onto an "intermediate" or "expert" trail segment.



BIG RIDGE TRAIL CATHEDRAL LOOP


Ride through steep draws, enjoying tight turns and narrow trails, before popping up on Big Ridge to enjoy beautiful vistas.



LENGTH: 30 Miles

ROUTE: CR 104, BLM 1040, BLM 1042, CR 104


A long and fast paced ride that will take you over the highest mountains in the area. Follow the rim of the Cathedral Bluffs all the way to the Clyde Dillion Memorial. This wildlife filled area hosts large herds of Elk, Deer, and some breathtaking views!



LENGTH: 50 Miles

ROUTE: CR 122, CR 103, CR 70, CR 91, CR 24X, CR 122


This ride features one of the most impressive scenic overlooks of the Rangely Area, including part of the Dead Dog Fire that occurred in the spring of 2017. Enjoy slick rock riding, dry creek crossings, and riding along a creek bottom.



LENGTH: 25 Miles

ROUTE: CR 23A, CR 46, BLM 1737, BLM 1736, CR 96, CR 65, BLM 1739, CR 96, BLM 1736, BLM 1737, CR 46, CR 23A


Enjoy windy sections of trail with views from the top of West Four Mile Draw. Expect to ride high desert and mountain terrain. This ride includes two large loops.



LENGTH: 58 Miles

ROUTE: CR 2, BLM 1071, BLM 1070, CR 23, CR 113, BLM 1045, CR 23, BLM 1072, CR 2


A great opportunity to see wild horses, this ride will take you down into the valleys and back up on top of some great mountain desert. A faster paced ride that covers a large area, and hopefully, an increased chance to see some wild horses or other resident wildlife!



LENGTH: 40 Miles

ROUTE: CR 24X, CR 122, CR 88, CR 122, CR 24 X

Enjoy a mountain ride that offers views of the gorgeous, vast valley. A wildfire on Texas Mountain a few years ago left behind a regenerated landscape and great views of the valley. Dropping down into Oil Springs there is a steep section of trail.




LENGTH: 40 Miles

This ride included high desert and mountain terrain. Enjoy the spectacular views from Brushy Point and the ride along Cathedral Bluffs. Travel switchbacks and keep your eyes peeled for evidence of Fremont and Ute Cultures.

#1. R.O.A.R. RANGELY OHV ADVENTURE RALLY

Rangely OHV Adventure Rally is a three-day event on the Wagon Wheel West OHV trail system.

* Day 1 *

Start off your day either arriving in Rangely or waking up here and heading over to the EEC Building, located at 402 West Main Street to check in for ROAR. After you have checked in take a walk around the gym and visit our many vendors and sign up for trails.

After you have checked in, hit the OHV Trails and explore with a free day to ride or hit some of the shops around town and pick up a few goodies.

To finish your day, come hang out at the Rangely Automotive Museum, line your vehicles up and down South Stanolind to show off your machine. Enjoy drinks, live music, conversation, food trucks and purchase ROAR merchandise!

* Day 2 *

The day gets started early at 8 am at the EEC building with coffee, last minute trail sign ups and a rider meeting where we discuss expectations and tell you where to meet your group for trail riding.

When you get back from trail riding you will head to Elks Park located at 311 South Stanolind Ave. for a classic shrimp boil dinner!

After dinner you have the choice to stick around in town or head out for a night ride to Kenney Reservoir featuring a family friendly campfire, and conversation.

* Day 3 *

Again, the day gets started early at 8 am at the EEC building with coffee and last minute trail sign ups.

You'll return from trail riding and proceed to Columbine Park located at 2101 East Main Street for a BBQ, or you can stick around for Search and Rescue's annual poker run that will end at Columbine Park.

At Columbine Park we will feature our OHV Rodeo that you have a chance to sign up for all weekend or sit and watch others put their vehicles to the test.

* Day 3 *



FIRST TIME RIDING IN RIO BLANCO COUNTY?

Welcome! We hope you enjoy our trails as much as we do. Rio Blanco County is proud to be an "OHV friendly county" and we welcome you to ride your OHV on town streets (excluding main highways) and designated County Roads. The Wagon Wheel OHV Trail System includes over 250 miles in Meeker of interconnecting loops and trails located on the USFS White River National Forest. Rangely offers more than 350 miles of interconnecting loops plus one of the only natural rock crawling parks in Colorado. Riders can experience all levels of difficulty, terrain, and scenery. Rio Blanco County is one of the premier places for your next OHV and motorcycle adventure!

WHAT ARE THE RULES FOR RIDING ON TOWN STREETS AND COUNTY ROADS?

ARE HELMETS REQUIRED?

Riders are not required to wear helmets and other safety gear, but it is highly encouraged. We want everyone to have a fun, safe ride! Safety flags on each OHV are recommended for visibility.

CAN I RENT AN OHV?

WHAT SHOULD I TAKE ON MY RIDE?

Be sure to bring plenty of gas, rain gear, warm clothing, bug repellent, sunscreen, lunch, plenty to drink, plus other important personal items you may need. Don't forget your camera! You will encounter many beautiful sights you will want some pictures to remind you of your trip!





FAQs

WHAT OHVS ARE ALLOWED AND WHAT ARE THE RESTRICTIONS?

We welcome all OHVs! The Wagon Wheel Trail System is designed for usage with 4-wheelers, side-by-sides, motorcycles, and even some full sized vehicles. Some trails in Meeker have width restrictions. Rangely trails have no width restrictions. This information can be found on the trail descriptions in this Guide, or online at wagonwheeltrails.org. Trail maps with this information are available at the Chambers of Commerce and include the Wagon Wheel Trail Map and the USFS Summer Motor Vehicle Use Map (MVUM).

AM I REQUIRED TO HAVE A COLORADO OHV REGISTRATION STICKER?

Yes. All riders will need to have a current OHV registration sticker. Riders not from Colorado can purchase their registration at:

 The cost is \$25.25. Both Colorado residents and nonresidents can also purchase a registration at the local Colorado Parks and Wildlife Office, 73485 Hwy 64, Meeker. You can also purchase OHV stickers at cpwshop. com

Make time between trails riding to check out these additional not-to-miss attractions!

The TANK Center for Sonic Arts

The Tank is an acoustical marvel, a senses-altering experience found nowhere else on earth. A 60-foot tall, 30-foot across rusted steel water tank—never used—was discovered in Colorado by sound artist and sonic thinker Bruce Odland in 1976. The Tank is a sonic wonder of the world, with a shifting, swirling reverberation longer and richer than the Taj Majal or the Great Pyramid. Sitting unnoticed in the dirt hills outside Rangely, Colorado—surrounded by oil pumps and dirt bike trails—the profound acoustic beauty within is balanced by the austerity of its remote location and its simple industrial architecture.

Canyon Pintado National Historic District

The Canyon Pintado National Historic District includes hundreds of archaeological sites, most deriving from the Fremont Culture (c. AD 0_1300) and Ute (c. AD 1300_1881) occupations of the Douglas Creek Canyon. Look for eight interpretive exhibits along the highway. You can easily see many pictographs and petroglyphs on our trails.



Rangely Automotive Museum

In Northwest Colorado stands one of very few car museums in the state. This Museum will impress both fledgling automobile enthusiasts as well as offer plenty to excite the experts. Here you will find a breathtaking collection that is diverse in character and age. Every part of this collection marvels in the long history of the automotive revolution and includes numerous automobiles that are exceedingly rare. All of these were hand selected by the owner, Bud Striegel. A classy guy with classy taste who happens to love his community and his cars.

Kenney Reservoir and the White River

Kenney Reservoir is located five miles east of the town of Rangely along Colorado State Highway 64 and the White River meanders around Community. If you love watersports, this is your paradise...without the crowds!

Flat Tops Trail Scenic Byway

Did you know that Co Rd 8 is actually one of the 26 Colorado Scenic and Historic Byways and connects the town of Meeker and Yampa. It showcases the White River National Forest's long history of multiple-use land management and remains a "working byway" providing access to public lands as well as rangeland for local sheep and cattle ranchers.

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Year-Round Events

Events in Meeker are an opportunity to experience a variety of big celebrations with small town grace and hospitality! Check the community calendar for local events to attend while you are here from Outdoor Concerts, Farmers Markets, Rodeos and Sheepherding!

National Historic District

The Meeker Historic District was listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2019. Shop, dine and stroll the historic downtown! Stop by the White River Museum and take a self guided tour through town.

Fishing the White River White River White River

Fishing the White River and the Flat Tops Wilderness Area's remote lakes and streams offers an unforgettable backcountry experience. There are 10 informational kiosks located along County Road 8 noting areas along the White River that are accessible to the public. Pick up your public Fishing Areas map at the Visitor Center

Lake Avery

Take a break at Lake Avery! Rent a Paddleboard at Giannetti's, have a picnic lunch and cool off on the dock. Make sure to have your fishing/hunting license or SWA Pass.







TRAIL ETIQUETTE

Be Wagon Wheel Ready!

KNOW BEFORE YOU GO

All trail systems are different so make sure you know the regulations and have your maps. Know your vehicle width, the trail width restrictions and levels of difficulty so you can plan a safe and enjoyable ride.



OBEY SPEED LIMITS

The speed limit is 25 mph on Town streets, 35 mph on County Roads and 25 mph on unmarked County Roads.

BE CAREFUL WITH FIRE

During the summer check to see if there are fire restrictions. The different stages can affect the usage of not only open fire but also shooting, smoking, and using fireworks, chainsaws, and charcoal.

ACCLIMATE TO ALTITUDE

Allow your body to adjust to the new altitude to avoid altitude sickness with symptoms of headache, dizziness and nausea. Spend a day at lower levels first before continuing higher and stay hydrated in our dry climate.

STAY THE TRAIL

Always drive on designated motorized routes only. Ride over obstacles, not around them. Going around obstacles widens trails, impacts vegetation, and causes erosion. Be courteous to other trail users and "Let 'Em Pass". When passing or meeting other riders on the trail, give them a hand signal to let them know how many riders are left behind you in your group. Visit StaytheTrail. org for more details and tips.

LEAVE WILD ANIMALS AND LIVESTOCK ALONE

Please do not approach or feed wild animals. Be aware of signs that you are getting too close such as head raised high with ears pointed in your direction, skittishness, the animal moves away or lowers head with ears back, or displays aggression or nervous behavior.

BE AWARE OF LIVESTOCK PROTECTION DOGS



These are large, trained working dogs to protect herds of sheep from predators and need to be left alone. Keep your dog on a leash and controlled at all times. If a livestock protection dog approaches you do not feed it, throw things at it, or try to outrun it. Keep your distance and let the dog and/or sheep pass.

RULES & REGULATIONS



GENERAL

> Operators must obey all speed limits, exercise safe driving practices, and are subject to the Model Traffic Code regulations and applicable laws of the State of Colorado.

*** INSURANCE & LICENSES**

- > Within Rio Blanco County, OHV operators are required to maintain at least the minimum liability insurance coverage of \$25,000 per person, \$50,000 per accident, and \$15,000 property damage.
- > Within Meeker Town limits operators must be in posession of a valid Colorado driver's license or valid driver's license from another state.
- > Within Rangely town limits any person operating an OHV must be at least 11 years of age or be accompanied by an adult 18 years of age or older.
- > Within the County, riders 16 years or older must have a valid driver's license, and riders over the age of 10 must be operating under the supervision of a person with a valid driver's license.
- > Riders under the age of 10 shall not operate an OHV.

***** ROADS

> Within Meeker's Town limits, OHVs are allowed on all roads and on all alleys, except for State Highway 13 (Market Street.) Riders crossing State Highway 13 (Market Street) shall do so at an angle of approximately ninety (90) degrees to the direction of the highway, and at a place where no obstruction prevents a quick and safe crossing. Within Rangely Town limits, all Town streets, roads and alleys, except any street or road which is part of the State Highway system, are designated as off-highway routes.

SPEED

- > Within Meeker Town limits, the OHV maximum speed limit is 25 miles per hour unless a sign designates a lesser speed limit.
- > Within Rangely Town limits, the OHV maximum speed limit is 10 miles per hour.
- > On designated County roads, OHV riders must not exceed speeds of 35 miles per hour, or the posted speed limit, whichever is less.


SAFETY

- > Within Meeker Town limits, no person shall operate an OHV while carrying another person or riding in any position that may interfere with the operation or control of the OHV or the view of the operator.
- > All off-highway vehicles must be equipped with and have in use: at least one headlamp, at least one red tail lamp, functioning braking system, spark arrester, muffler, current Colorado Parks and Wildlife registration decal, which can be obtained at www.parks.state. co.us.
- > Within Rangely Town limits, OHV operators must take the most direct route as possible to a BLM area, educational activity, or employment. Education activities or work activities must be approved by the Chief of Police and any questions will be verified.
- > Within Rangely Town limits, no OHV shall be operated between the hours of sunset and sunrise.

Meeker, Rangely, and Rio Blanco County are proud to be OHV-friendly.

\$ Thursday \$

Check into our locally owned hotels, motels, tiny homes or RV parks located right in town. Our roads are OHV-friendly, so ride from town to the trailheads. In the evening, be entertained by the Meeker Summer Rodeo Series, every Thursday night June through August at the Rio Blanco County Fairgrounds.

* Friday *

Sit down for breakfast at the historic Meeker Café and then ride straight from there to #8 Hay Flats to Miller Creek Loop for an all day adventure. If you would rather trailer than ride on pavement, trailer to the Miller Creek Trailhead and enjoy the Miller Creek **Loop** #1 (62" width restriction.)

End the day back in town where you can enjoy Meekerpalooza on Friday nights from 4-8pm with live music, a beer garden, a farmers market and activities. While you're there, stroll our downtown shops like Nana Goose and Bluebell Boutique. More details: http://meekerchamber.chambermaster.com/events/calendar

Saturday 🌣

Enjoy a coffee from the Meeker Sweet Shop or a grab-and-go breakfast from Wendll's. Then trailer to Lake Avery trailhead to ride the #2 Sleepy Cat Peak Loop. This trail offers a little more adventure with some steep rocky climbs and water crossings. On your way back to town, stop for an outdoor afternoon snack and beverage at **Blanco** Cellars or Smoking River Brewing Co.

#2. FOREST GETAWAY

* Day 1 *

Before you head into the White River National Forest, check out downtown Meeker! Take a break from driving and meet the friendly locals while enjoying a snack and beverage at our locally-owned restaurants or brewery. Stock up on your supplies at Watts Ranch Market, Ol' Crows Beer & Beverage, Off the Olive Branch and Blanco Cellars and the Little Cheese Shop. Grab your outdoor gear at Backcountry Outpost.

Yellow Jacket Area: There is plenty of dispersed camping in this area. Remember to look up at night. Without many lights to block your view, the night sky is amazing! This area has direct access to Yellow Jacket Loops # 9 and #7, which have a 62" width restriction. For no width restriction take FS trail 250 and connect to #2 Sleepy Cat Peak Loop.


Flat Tops Trail Scenic Byway (Co Rd 8) Area: Drive to your campground or cabin on the scenic Flat Tops Trail Scenic Byway (Co Rd 8). Lake Avery, and North Fork Campgrounds have direct access to trails. There are many options for cabin rentals, too.

\$ Day 2 \$

Start at the Fawn Creek Trailhead for loop #3 or #4 (62" restriction). These rides are great for the more experienced rider and offer scenic overlooks. For an all-day ride near Meadow Lake try #6 Flat Tops Trail Scenic Adventure. After a long day, if you need a break from cooking, head over to the historic Trappers Lake Lodge for dinner; they have a souvenir shop too! The road to Trapper's Lake does not allow OHVs, so take your other vehicle. Check their schedule at trapperslake.comsometimes they have live music and special events.



Enjoy a 45 mile ride from the Yellow Jacket Pass Parking Lot. Travel past the iconic Sleepy Cat Peak, circle through beautiful open areas and wind through pine trees, then make your way back.



Trailhead: Yellow Jacket Pass Parking Lot

This ride has short sections of challenging, steep, very rocky, rutted, off-camber and/or narrow trails. Riders should be experienced with these trail conditions and have OHVs with good clearance.

OHVs must be 62 inches or less in overall width.





This ride offers sections of more difficult trail with exposed rock, off-camber surface, and rutted trail. Riders should be experienced and have an OHV with good ground clearance.

OHVs must be 62 inches or less in overall width.



A local favorite, riders will enjoy the switchbacks as they climb in elevation to the summer feeding grounds of area wildlife and local livestock. Enjoy the abundance of wildflowers and cross Miller Creek before returning to Meeker.

Trailhead: Meeker

This ride includes several rocky sections, offcamber, rutted areas and small stream crossings. Approximately half of this ride will be on wellmaintained gravel and paved roads with the remainder on Forest Service 4x4 dirt roads. Riders should have some experience with rocky, uneven surfaces.


Note: This loop can be ridden either way, as both start and endpoint are in Meeker



LENGTH: 60 Miles

ROUTE: CR 13, CR38, FS211, FS214, FS215, CR57, CR8, Connector Trail

Feel like you're on top of the world with this 20 mile loop. Trailer to the parking lot at the FS230 turnoff to begin your ride while enjoying the beauty of Ripple Creek Pass along the Flat Tops Scenic Byway.



LENGTH: 16 Miles

ROUTE: Parking Lot East of FS230, FS230, FS1804, CR8, Parking Lot East of FS230

Trailhead: Lost Lakes Pagoda Trailhead and Parking Area at FS 1804 off Co Rd 8 (near MM 45), or East FS230

This loop has a 50" width restriction, great for ATV's! Note that trail #1804 is open June 21 - Aug. 31.

This ride includes areas of steep, very rocky, off-camber and narrow trail, with small stream crossings. Stay on the trail in wet meadow areas so as not to damage terrain. This is a great route for experienced riders, with the majority of the ride on Forest Service 4x4 roads and 50 inch trail before returning to the parking lot.

OHVs must be 50 inches or less in overall width.


With some of the most amazing scenic overlooks and extreme technical challenges, this long day ride is not for the faint of heart. Travel to Blair Mountain and beyond from the Meadow Lake turnoff. Get an early start for this ride and you won't be disappointed.

Trailhead: FS601 Parking Lot

To trailhead: Traveling from Meeker, the trailhead is 35 miles from Meeker, requiring around 1.5 hours trailering time.

Turn south off Co Rd 8 onto Co Rd 10 and go 1.5 miles. Turn right onto County Road 17/ FS 245 for 13 miles, then turn left onto County Road 125/FS601 for 0.5 mile to the parking area.



YJ - Yellow Jacket Pass - Take Hwy 13 north out of Meeker and turn east on Co Rd 15. The trail head is located at the junction of Co Rd 15 and Co Rd 48, where parking is available but no amenities.

MC - Miller Creek - Travel 12 miles on Co Rd 8 east out of Meeker and turn south on Co Rd 57 for one mile to the trailhead and parking area.

LA - Lake Avery - Lake Avery is located 18 miles from Meeker along Co Rd 8. This trailhead, located within the Óak Ridge State Wildlife Area, offers access to camping, restroom facilities, fishing access, picnic areas and plenty of parking.

FC - Fawn Creek - Travel 26.5 miles along Co Rd 8 to Co Rd 115 to Fawn Creek trail head and parking area.

NF - North Fork - Travel 31 miles on Co Rd 8 to FS Road 230. North Fork Camp-

ground offers restroom facilities, picnic areas and camping

for a fee.

RC - Ripple Creek / Pagoda - Travel 45 miles on Co Rd 8 to FS Road 1804 and the Ripple Creek Trailhead. Trail #1804 is open to vehicles 50" or less and is open from June 21 - August 31. Ripple Creek Overlook offers restroom facilities, picnic areas and limited parking.

DIFFICULTY LEVELS



GREEN (BEGINNER):

A graveled or surfaced road with good sight distance.



BLUE (INTERMEDIATE):

A two track road or trail with natural surface, moderate steep sections with drop-offs, ruts, dust and frequent changes in the riding surface.



BLACK (EXPERT):

A trail or primitive two track road including steep, rough and narrow segments, often with switchbacks.

NOTE: The ratings for these trails are based on subjective comparison of trails within this system only. Newcomers are encouraged to begin their riding experience on the Wagon Wheel OHV Trail System with a "beginner" trail. This will establish a base for moving onto an "intermediate" or "expert" trail segment.
