## **QUICK FACTS**

- Enrollment on October 1, 2019: 125 students
- End-of-Year Enrollment: 128 students, the highest since the 2015-2016 school year
- We retained 94.4% of our students from June 2019 to August 2019.
- · 98% of our student body is Catholic
- By ethnicity, our student body is 53% Latino, 45% Anglo, and 2% Other Ethnicities
- 63% of teachers and administrators hold a master's degree or higher
- This year, for the first time in several years, we had an Assistant Principal, who focused primarily on areas related to Curriculum and Instruction.
- We follow the curriculum of the Archdiocese of Denver and are accredited through the AdvanceD North Central Association

# OUR DISTANCE LEARNING STORY







Learning at St. Clare suddenly changed in March with the heightened number of cases of Covid-19 leading to continuing our educational program through distance learning.

We were on spring break the week after the announcement was made that we would be going to distance learning at least until the beginning of April. During this week, the teachers were heroic going from never having used Google Classroom to launching and using their own Google Classroom.

From the beginning, we established a structure that carried us through until the end of the school year. All students had at least one video call each day. They also knew which subjects they would have to work on at home even if they did not have a video call for the class. As the weeks progressed, we made adjustments to this schedule to be responsive to student needs.

Our responsiveness included **adjusting our grading structure**. Students in grades 6-8 continued to have letter grades to hold them accountable for high standards. For students in grades K-5, we adjusted the grading scale to give parents feedback while also aiming to reduce stress. Their grading scale consisted of checks, check plusses, and check minuses.

**Everyone**—parents, students, teachers, and staff—gave their all so that learning could continue for our students. Thank you, St. Clare community!

## **QUICK FACTS**

- All teachers used the **Google Classroom** platform
- All students had a video call with a teacher at least once each day
- 100% of students had access to a computer during distance learning; students were given the option of borrowing a school computer
- 100% of students had access to Internet, thanks in part to generous donors
- Students engaged in synchronous (at the same time as the teacher) and asynchronous (at a time different than the teacher) learning
- · Teachers held regular office hours
- Members of school administration called and emailed families of students that missed video calls or turning in homework to help them overcome challenges and make these possible

# EDUCATING THE WHOLE CHILD FROM A DISTANCE

## HIGHLIGHTS OF OUR EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM DURING DISTANCE LEARNING

#### **ACADEMIC FORMATION**

- Teachers structured age-appropriate learning activities, ranging from sending home packets to online work to book work to interviewing family members
- Teachers engaged students in hands-on activities at home to practice skills, like baking cookies and conducting science experiments
- Students who struggled to access content online had the opportunity for summer school in small groups

#### **FAITH FORMATION**

- 7th grade led the school in a virtual Stations of the Cross on Holy Thursday
- 2nd Grade students received the sacrament of First Reconciliation at school at the end of May
- 3rd Grade students had their First Holy Communion and Confirmation postponed until August

#### PHYSICAL FORMATION

- PE classes continued with posted workout videos
- Teachers of core classes occasionally assigned work with a physical component, such as walking around the perimeter of your place of residence
- Virtual Field Day: This St. Clare tradition continued with students completing a BINGO card with physical fitness activities that are performed when the activity was chosen; prizes were given to the winners

#### SOCIAL-EMOTIONAL FORMATION

- Homeroom calls to give students an opportunity to interact socially with each other
- Teachers held office hours for students to ask questions
- Celebrations of milestones were modified to allow students to still experience these celebrations; most notable were Kindergarten graduation and 8th grade Continuation with a drive through clap-out

## SPOTLIGHT ON:

#### AT-HOME AFRODYNAMICS CAMP

As the end of the academic year neared, it became apparent that the last months of the school year would not be the only disruption our students would be experiencing due to Covid-19. News of the cancellation of summer camps, vacations, and other fun summer happenings spoke to the additional interruptions they would encounter in their lives. Summer camps and experiences are an important opportunity for children to develop social, emotional, and practical skills. More than ever, they seemed needed during the summer of 2020 to help address the growing concern about the mental health of our youth during the time of stay-at-home orders.

To address the need for students to have a fun summer opportunity while being aware of public health regulations, St. Clare partnered with Dr. David Lohmann to host an At-Home Aerodynamics Camp for our students in 5th-8th grade. Interested students were provided with model rocket and airplane kits to assemble. Pointers for helping their aircraft stay in the air longer were shared to aid them as they assembled their aircraft at home. Then, on Saturdays throughout May, June and July there were launch dates on the St. Clare football field to put their airplanes and rockets in action. Records were kept of the time each student's plane or rocket stayed in the air. Students had the option of trying to improve their design between launch dates to increase the length of time their aircraft stayed in the air. The winning airplane stayed in the air for 65 seconds and the winning rocket stayed

in the air for 135 seconds.

Great job, students!





# ACADEMIC HIGHLIGHTS



At St. Clare, we educate the whole person. We start from the beliefs that all people are created in God's image and likeness and that God has a plan for each person. These beliefs shape our whole approach to education. Knowing how beloved each child is, the St. Clare teaching community is dedicated to honoring each student's God-given dignity and equipping each child in our school with the skills and knowledge they need to live God's plan for their life. This approach allows our students to succeed academically and flourish as individuals.

#### **ACADEMIC SUCCESS**


St. Clare students normally take the Renaissance STAR Math and Reading assessments three times each year as a measure of their growth in these subjects. While it is important to remember STAR scores do not measure the entirety of our program, they do give us some indication of students' literacy and numeracy skills.

During the 2019-2020 academic year, students were only able to take the assessments in school for the fall and winter testing windows; the spring testing window was not able to be conducted in the standardized environment of school due to distance learning. Our Spring 2019 STAR data also shows our academic excellence. In the spring of 2019, St. Clare students were on par with Archdiocese of Denver Catholic Schools scores. In comparison to Eagle County School District, St. Clare 3rd-8th grade students scored 13% higher in reading and 8% higher in math. St. Clare students' mid-year scores continue to show our school's ability to grow students academically, as illustrated in the graph.















#### **EXPANDING OUR SERVICES FOR ALL STUDENTS**

For many years, St. Clare has had an established reading specialist program for students primarily in grades K-4 to receive additional reading instruction to ensure all of our students have the foundational literacy skills they need to be successful in school and life. We recognize that all students grow at different rates and sometimes additional support is needed to help each student reach their full potential. This year we expanded our services to support and challenge students: those in need of additional instruction and those in need of more challenge. We did this in three primary ways.

#### 1. Expanding our intervention services:

St. Clare applied for and received additional Title I-IV funds through Eagle County School District. These funds allowed us to add reading and math intervention for students in the middle school grades without any impact on our bottom line.

#### 2. Piloting students taking a higher math class:

Our middle school math department has traditionally differentiated our 8th grade math offering into prealgebra and algebra to meet the student's needs. In 6th and 7th grade we start to see a growing difference in the ability level of the students and their readiness for more advanced content. So, to challenge our advanced math students in 6th and 7th grade, we partnered with Freedom Learning Charter School and allowed our students to take more advanced math classes and move at their own pace through the content. The students participating appreciated the opportunity to move through the content at their own pace and seek greater challenges. We look forward to expanding this offering to more students and in more subjects in the future.

## 3. Establishing a Multi-Tiered Systems of Support (MTSS) record keeping system:

This allows us to track how students are growing and take a data-driven approach to intervention. It does both academic and behavioral.

# ACADEMIC FEATURE STORY: ARGUMENT DRIVEN INQUIRY LABS

Middle School Science teacher Sr. Mary Hanah Doak implemented Argument Driven Inquiry (ADI) labs into the middle school science classrooms. The Denver Museum of Nature and Science hosted a professional development on ADI labs, which she attended for her training. These labs give students the opportunity to be scientists and read, write, and speak the language of science. Students followed the scientific process from start to finish: asking a question, formulating a hypothesis, designing an experiment, performing the experiment, collecting and analyzing data, writing a lab report, presenting findings, and peer reviewing other students' work.


# IN-PERSON LEARNING HIGHLIGHTS

- In the fall, our boys also enjoyed playing football and the girls enjoyed playing volleyball
















# THERESE GROJEAN SCHOLARSHIP


