Great American Outdoors Act

Great American Outdoors Act (GAOA)

- Signed into law on August 4, 2020
- Legacy Restoration Fund (LRF)
 - Deferred maintenance and related deficiencies
 - Up to \$1.9 billion annually for five years
 - NPS share is 70%
- Land & Water Conservation Fund (LWCF)
 - Federal land acquisition and State conservation grants
 - \$900 million annually, permanently
 - NPS share will vary

Land and Water Conservation Fund

Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF)



GAOA provides permanent full funding up to \$900 million/year.

LWCF is the sole source of funding in the NPS for:

- Federal land acquisition within the authorized boundaries of NPS units to protect resources and provide for visitor use and enjoyment
- Matching grants to States and through State to local governments for acquisition and development of public outdoor recreation areas and facilities
- Matching grants to State and local governments for acquisition of eligible battlefield lands and for interpretation and restoration under the American Battlefield Protection Program

Land and Water Conservation Fund – Federal Acquisition



NPS has identified 1.6 million acres of privately-owned land, estimated at \$2B, within its unit boundaries for protection through acquisition. Prior to GAOA, on average < 5% of this need was appropriated each fiscal year.

The Land Acquisition Ranking System (LARS):

- Used to identify and analyze service-wide acquisition priorities for funding since 2001
- Is refined on an annual basis and currently used for the President's Budget process
- Provides the structure for review and ranking at regional and national levels to determine a national priority list
- Includes criteria: threat to the resource, preservation of the resource, visitor use facility accommodation, commitment to acquire, involvement of partners and non-profit groups, continuation of ongoing effort, recreational opportunities, hardship of the owner, existence of legislative authority, ability to obligate funds, regional priority of the request, Congressional and local support, impact to operation and maintenance of the unit, economic escalation factors, and the type of unit making the request

LWCF – State Conservation Grants



- Provides 50:50 cost-sharing grants to the States (and through them to local governments) for State selected acquisition, development and planning (state only) of needed public outdoor recreation
- States must prepare and keep current a 5-year Statewide Comprehensive Outdoor Recreation Plan (SCORP) to identify recreation needs and priorities
- Grant process starts with State LWCF Program Offices found http://www.nps.gov/lwcf/

Formula grants

- Funding derived from LWCF allocation and mandatory revenues from Gulf of Mexico Energy Security Act (GOMESA) of 2006
- Funds are apportioned to States based on formula and are available for up to three fiscal years
- States run internal competitions to select projects; NPS reviews them to ensure appropriateness and approves

Competitive grants

- Funding derived from separate LWCF allocation
- Funds are apportioned following nationwide competitive process
- Focus on past years has been on underserved urban areas

LWCF – American Battlefield Protection Program




- Provides 50:50 cost-sharing grants to States, Tribes, local governments and nonprofit organizations for preservation of eligible battlefield lands through acquisition, interpretation and restoration projects
- Eligible Civil War, American Revolutionary War, and War of 1812 sites identified in two Congressionally authorized reports

Funding derived from LWCF appropriation for three competitive grant opportunities:

- Battlefield Land Acquisition Grants: awarded on a rolling basis to State and local governments for acquisition of fee-simple or permanent, protective (easement) interest in eligible lands
- **Battlefield Interpretation Grants** (newly authorized): awarded annually to States, Tribes, local governments and nonprofit organizations for interpretation and modernization projects for eligible sites
- **Battlefield Restoration Grants** (newly authorized): awarded annually to States, Tribes, local governments and nonprofit organizations for restoration of eligible sites to "day-of-battle" conditions

Legacy Restoration Fund Summary



LRF to provide NPS with <u>up to</u> \$6.5B over 5 years (70% of total LRF funding); funds to be used for priority deferred maintenance projects



Assets defined as real property, physical structure or grouping, landscape, trail, tangible property with a specific service or function tracked and managed as distinct, identifiable entity



Transportation Projects (including roads, bridges, tunnels, and paved parking areas) can not exceed more than **35%** of the fund



Other Requirements and Allowances

- Expenditures must incorporate measures to improve accessibility
- Public Donations: Secretary can accept cash or in-kind donations that advance efforts
- GAO Study after 5 years

NPS LRF Investment Strategy



NPS's strategy seeks to achieve the most significant impact.


- Parks with large asset portfolios have the largest maintenance and repair backlog needs (e.g., 80% of the Servicewide deferred maintenance backlog is attributed to 56 park units).
- Funding of this magnitude allows NPS to invest in projects that generally exceed the capabilities of existing fund sources.
- Managing fewer larger projects (e.g., projects greater than \$10M) optimizes the efficiency of execution and limits overhead costs.
- NPS committed to making sustainable investments through LRF in order to avoid cycles of rehabilitation, deterioration, and disrepair.
 - Projects that offer NPS an opportunity to reduce long range life-cycle costs receive priority.
 - Leveraging strategies include, but are not limited to, leasing, partnerships, transfer of ownership, and disposition.





Total Project Cost by Current Project Phase




Total Project Cost by Delivery Strategy

FY21 GAOA LRF Funding by Legacy NPS Region





FY22- FY25 LRF Project List Development

- Project Selection Criteria
 - Addresses Deferred Maintenance
 - Larger Projects that Exceed Other Fund Source Capabilities
 - Use of leveraging opportunities that employ sustainable life-cycle asset management strategies
 - Readiness and capacity to execute
- Building Back Better All projects incorporate appropriate upgrades for accessibility, code compliance, resiliency and sustainability
 - DOI and NPS policies require consideration of accessibility, climate change, natural hazards and sustainability during project development.
 - Addressing Climate Change and Natural Hazard Handbook includes a checklist to be used at the earliest stages of facility planning to determine the most likely natural hazards a project may confront.
 - NPS Project Sustainability Checklist includes how requirements are met for sustainability features, including energy performance, water efficiency, and indoor air quality.
 - Rehabilitation, replacement, and new construction in the NPS routinely includes upgrading facilities to comply with the Architectural Barriers Act Accessibility Standards.


LRF Maintenance Action Team (MAT)

The NPS's Historic Preservation Training Center (HPTC) and Historic Architecture, & Engineering Center (HACE) will stand up 10 Preservation MATs to achieve cost efficiencies and strengthen capacities within the HPTC and NPS workforce.

- MATs will be established for specific regional areas and will execute projects that address historic preservation needs as well as cyclic maintenance needs.
- MATs will focus on small and medium-sized park units, which are often not well positioned to have a full staff of maintenance or trades workers with the specialized disciplines necessary to scope, develop, and complete these projects in-house.
- For FY21, eligible projects will **focus on reducing the backlog** of one or more cultural resources in a park unit.
- FY 2021 delivery will be coordinated by HPTC and HACE and will **impact** over 40 parks in at least 5 NPS regions.
