



Committee Reports

Alberta Construction Safety Association

On March 16, 2019 the ACSA held their AGM at the Delta hotel in Edmonton. This was the first meeting since the new bylaws were adopted in November of 2018. The Audited Financial statement was presented. The ACSA continues to remain very strong financially with revenue exceeding expenses by over \$2,000,000 last year. It was identified that part of the excess was due to some vacant staff positions that have yet to be filled. In 2018, the ACSA was awarded five creative sentencing funding from penalties



levied as a result of workplace injury and fatality prosecutions.

The ACSA has worked with other Construction Safety Associations across Canada through the Federation of Construction Safety Associations to sign a National Agreement to make the NCSO (National Construction Safety Officer) a national designation. In Alberta some 14,000 NCSOs' are required to pass a closed book exam to meet the new certification requirements. The ACSA will be posting a list of certified active NCSOs' on their web site.

The updated audit tool is now available that meets the new Partnership Standard. Overall training is down 11% from 2017, this is expected due to the economic downturn in Alberta.

The ACSA holds 39% of all the Certificate of Recognition (COR) holders in Alberta with Energy Safety Canada being the next at 13%.

The Board has adopted a new three-year strategic plan for the ACSA. With the changes to OH&S and the upcoming election, the ACSA will review the plan to ensure it still meets requirements.

The new Board Chair was appointed, the 2019 chair is Brad Bent from CLAC. The 2019 Board of Directors was introduced, currently there are 7 vacation positions not filled by some Associations.

The Regional Safety Committees provided their reports and all committees have been very active throughout the year. This included activities such as: visiting schools, Steps for Life, NIOSH Week, Skills Canada and Day of Mourning ceremonies.

It was suggested the ACSA look at holding the AGM in conjunction with the ACSA conference to assist in reducing travel costs for employers who have employees participating on the Regional Safety Committees. The ACSA Conference is April 1 and 2 at the Shaw Conference Center in Edmonton.

The next Board Meeting is April 12, 2019 in Calgary. At this meeting elections for both Governance and HR Committee Chair and Finance and Risk Committee Chair will be held as per the new Bylaws.

Thank you for continuing to support the ACSA by attending training.

Good News! Prompt Payment Legislation will be included in the upcoming Federal Government's Budget Implementation Act. Annex 3 of the budget includes a list of legislative measures that will be introduced as part of the budget plan.

Here is the relevant section on Prompt Payment:

Subject of the Measure Proposed Legislative Action Prompt Payments

The Government proposes to

introduce legislation that would ensure that payments flow down the construction supply chain promptly and to provide for an effective adjudicative mechanism when they do not, thus facilitating the orderly and timely building of federal construction projects on federal property.



There are also several other commitments for infrastructure that prompt payment will encourage. They are reflected in the attached press release and talking points.

"The National Trade Contractors Coalition of Canada enthusiastically supports the 2019 federal budget which is laying the groundwork for a prompt payment system on all federal construction contracts. The government has listened to the concerns of contractors, suppliers, and tradespeople and is focused on making construction more efficient in Canada."

Strategic Priorities

Advocacy

The Federal Government announced in the 2018 Federal Budget an investment of \$225 million over four years, and \$75 million per year thereafter, in a new Future Skills initiative to address skills gaps in the job market and support lifelong learning and training throughout Canadians working lives. Future Skills includes two components:

- 1. A Future Skills Council that will provide advice on priorities for skills development to the Minister of Employment, Workforce Development and Labour; and
- 2. A Future Skills Centre that will be informed by the priorities identified by the Council and act as a research centre to develop, test and measure innovative approaches to skills development.

The Future Skills Council is a multi-stakeholder body, which includes 15 members from the public, private, labour and not-for-profit sectors. Two of these Council members are from Canada's labour movement:

- Mike Luff is a National Representative with the Canadian Labour Congress
- · Lisa Langevin is an Assistant Business Manager with Local 213 of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers.

The Future Skills Council is conducting consultations. NETCO will provide responses on behalf of NETCO partners.

Red Seal Program

• The Canadian Council of Directors of Apprenticeship (CCDA) sent correspondence to NETCO regarding the review of the Electric Motor Systems Technician program. This program has been under review for de-designation as a Red Seal trade since 2017. NETCO shared the correspondence with funding partners and requested feedback for discussion with the CCDA.

Fire Sub-Council

My last meeting was January 24 here in Edmonton at the Alberta Municipal Affairs (AMA) office. Since this meeting there has been some important news released regarding the new Fire and Building codes. There is also an announcement in regard to the code books being free. Here are the announcements directly from the government.

New Codes Coming into Effect on April 1, 2019

The 2019 editions of the Alberta Building Code and Alberta Fire Code based on the 2015 editions of the National Building Code and National Fire Code were adopted in February 2019 by Provincial regulation. Also adopted

by Regulation is the 2017 edition of the National Energy Code for Buildings (NECB).

The new Codes come into effect on April 1, 2019 and there is a transition period to facilitate transition to the new Codes from the previous Codes.



In support of greater harmonization to the National Codes, both the Alberta Building and Fire codes have also been renamed.

The Building Code Regulation adopts two codes:

National Building Code – 2019 Alberta Edition

This Code provides the minimum safety standards for the design and construction of new buildings and energy efficiency in construction for new housing and small buildings.

· National Energy Code for Buildings - 2017 Edition -

This Code provides the minimum requirements for energy efficiency in construction for new buildings other than housing and small buildings.

The Fire Code Regulation adopts:

· National Fire Code - 2019 Alberta Edition -

This Code provides minimum fire safety requirements for buildings, structures and areas where hazardous materials are used, and addresses fire protection and fire prevention in the ongoing operation of buildings and facilities. This Code also provides for minimum safety standards for storage tank fuel systems.

Information on Purchasing the Codes and Code Highlights

The National Building and National Fire Codes – 2019 Alberta Editions are not yet available for purchase. Once they become available, they can be purchased from the National Research Council.

The National Energy Code for Buildings – 2017 Edition is available for purchase from the National Research Council, both online and in hard copy. Follow this link for purchase information

Information on Free Code Books

Starting in Spring 2019, the National Research Council (NRC) will offer free online access and free downloadable editions to the National Building Code, the National Fire Code, the National Plumbing Code, and the National Energy Code for Buildings, as well as the Provincial Codes published by NRC, including the Alberta editions of these Codes. Paper copies of the Codes, along with other supporting documents including the Guides, will be offered at a reduced cost. Due to these changes, longer term subscriptions are not currently available. The links in this email will take you to the NRC site for more information.

NRC will announce the date when the Codes are freely available, which is anticipated in Spring 2019. The Alberta fire, building and energy efficiency codes do not come into force until April 1, 2019 and will not be freely available at least until April 1st, or possibly later subject to NRC's readiness to launch the free codes online. There will be no enforcement of Alberta Codes until the Codes are actually available. Code users are encouraged to postpone Code purchases of the Alberta and National Building, Plumbing, Fire and Energy Efficiency Codes until they are freely available from the NRC site.



JOE'S CODES

This month I would like to bring your attention to Standata 14-FCI-006 / Existing Fire Alarm Systems. This Standata was a joint Standata between the fire and electrical sub councils. I would like to showcase the qualified persons portion of this Standata. Please review the chart below as it clearly speaks out who can work on fire alarm systems and what scopes that they can complete. PURPOSE

The purpose of this bulletin is to identify requirements where a building fire alarm system, regardless of age, requires inspection, testing, maintenance, and installation of devices or other equipment (e.g. maglocks) in order to provide or maintain an expected level of protection for occupants. In addition, this bulletin will define who is able to inspect, test, maintain and install fire alarm systems.

The following chart shows the work which an electrician or fire alarm technician can complete: Work Acceptable Under the Electrician Trade Regulation and the Alberta Fire Code 2014

- (1) Certified electricians and technicians must be qualified under the Alberta Fire Code to perform maintenance on fire alarm systems.
- (2) Certified electricians and technicians qualified as per the Alberta Fire Code, may perform an audit where professional engineering involvement is not required as per the Alberta Building Code.

All additions or modifications to a fire alarm system must be reviewed and accepted by the AHJ (Building). Permits are often required for modifications and additions to the fire alarm system.

The Safety Codes Act – Permit Regulation sets out the requirements for permits under both the building and electrical disciplines. The local AHJ must be contacted prior to any work being conducted on any fire alarm system.

Fire alarm's are to be verified in accordance with CAN/ULC S537 Verification of Fire Alarm Systems.

Note: Professional engineering involvement is necessary for the upgrading or modification of existing fire alarm systems where the size and occupancy of the building under the ABC 2014 determines professional involvement. Professional engineering involvement may include as little as preparing a scope of work for the building alarm system and a final verification after installation.
