



**Colorado Water Congress State Affairs**

**2023 Legislative Session at a Glance**

**Status as of May 9, 2023**

The legislative session adjourned *sine die* late in the evening on May 8. Several bills were rewritten (multiple times) in the final weeks of the session and differ from the introduced versions. Some did not clear Appropriations committees – were not killed in Appropriations, but were not scheduled because of prioritization of other measures. This is not intended to be exhaustive, but is meant to simply state the purpose of each bill tracked on the State Affairs Status sheet and provide clarifying comments when warranted.

<b>SB 005</b> <b>Support</b>	Forestry/Wildfire mitigation workforce	Provides funding to inst. <b>SB 057</b> <b>Amend</b>	County Treasurer no longer Ex Officio for districts	Increases fee for county treasurer to collect assessments for irrigation and drainage districts; directs boards to appoint district treasurer; principal and interest on bonds paid at direction of boards.	Signed	
<b>SB 059</b> <b>No position</b>	Local Access funding for State Parks	The bill CPW to charge a fee of up to \$2 on daily vehicle passes for access to state parks at the request of a local government. It also requires CPW to study local access to state parks	Passed both chambers

<b>SB 178</b> <b>Support</b>	HOA landscaping	Prohibits HOAs from restricting homeowners use of xeriscape and drought tolerant plantings on 80% of their property; allows vegetable gardens on front, side or back of property, limits hardscape requirements to 20% of a common interest property. <b>SB 186</b> <b>No position</b>	Methane Seepage Raton Basin	Directs the OGCC and Water Quality Control Division to study methane seepage in Raton Basin and associated water to identify best practices for capture of seepage, evaluate the quality of the water, and evaluate opportunity to preserve and make beneficial use of the water. <b>SB 213</b> <b>Oppose</b>	Land Use/Housing	The bill would have mandated planning, studies, and approval at multiple levels of government; pre-empted local government planning for residential housing. State Affairs opposed because of mandates to serve increased density and expanded development regardless of water and infrastructure requirements	Killed on the calendar	The bill was rewritten by amendment multiple times right up to the end of the last day. House and Senate could not agree on path forward.

<b>SB 285</b> <b>No position</b>	Energy and Carbon Management	Changes mission and name of Oil and Gas Conservation Commission to Energy and Carbon Management Commission. Establishes jurisdiction for State Engineer over shallow geothermal wells and ECMC for deeper geothermal wells.	Senate concurred House amendments	
<b>SB 286</b> <b>Amend</b>	CORA/public records	Requires that records stored in digital format be transferred to requester in digital format; requires custodian of records to accept electronic payment; requires state agencies to submit records retention policy to Leg.
