Hackensack Adopts Joint Powers Agreement

We may not know the huge value of a good Fire and Rescue and Medical Emergency Response team until we have our own emergency, and then we pay attention, and it is of paramount importance! We are blessed in this area to have wonderful Fire and Rescue teams. A Joint Powers Agreement between 8 local townships, the City of Hackensack, and the Hackensack Area Fire and Rescue Department was accepted and adopted in mid-July 2022. The general purpose of the agreement is to establish an organization to jointly and cooperatively contract for fire protection and emergency medical services including, but not limited to, fire prevention, fire suppression, and first response to medical emergencies. The townships and City desire to exercise their powers jointly by entering into this Joint Powers Agreement for the purpose of collectively pooling their resources to provide fire and rescue protection service

With this agreement the Hackensack Area Fire and Rescue Department (HAFRD) was established, to be managed by its officers, who will meet annually to approve the budget for the HAFRD. This is a good way for townships and the City to come together as a group, and each have a voice in the budget process. The group used a new format for budgeting items and cost sharing, using the MN Association of Townships formula, which is based on market value of property, population, and number of service calls in each area. Congratulations to the City of Hackensack on adopting this new Joint Powers Agreement!

Game Changers Getting It Done!

Area residents are welcome to join one of these teams. New ideas for a project can be introduced by any community member. They get reviewed and approved by the Hackensack City Council before the idea becomes another team under the Game Changers.

Hackensack Community Affordable Housing Project

About four years ago, a group of area residents began to respond to the increasing demand in our area for affordable housing. A team was established to discuss the subject and better understand the needs. The Comprehensive Plan for our Community Area identified housing as one of the top three areas requiring attention. Since that time, a Hackensack Game Changer Team formed and included four members; Kris Biessener, Gary Dietrich, Stephen Erickson, and Larry Refsland. Last spring, working closely with the Hackensack City Council, a memorandum of understanding was signed between the City of Hackensack and the Minnesota Housing Partnership. This past summer a resolution was signed by the City Council to explore the formation of a Local Housing Trust Fund. This organization would become a repository for funds to be used for the future evaluation and construction of housing in our area. In November, a Housing Demand Study was awarded to Maxfield Research and Consulting to more clearly identify the housing demand. This report will be completed this spring. We are now identifying families and individuals who would like to explore housing for their personal needs. We have identified two areas in particular of great demand. One is workforce housing. The other is people who live in the area, whose home may be a lake home, who would like to downsize and potentially move into Hackensack.

The objective of our team is to help develop 40-60 housing units in the next 2-3 years. This includes both owner occupied housing as well as rental units. Neighbor Helping Neighbor Community Clean-up Event

May 19 & 20, 2023, 9:00 a.m. - 3:00 p.m.

Sponsored by the Game Changers Beautification Team and Union Congregational Church, this is our second annual clean-up event with dedicated volunteers ready to assist Hackensack residents with nonprofessional projects that need to be "spruced up" for spring. Projects can include raking leaves, picking up trash, brush trimming, small painting projects, clearing debris from buildings and homes, paper shredding.

Hackensack residents can request assistance with clean-up projects by registering their project by website or mail. Volunteers will be assigned service projects based on day and time desired by city resident and work volunteer. Volunteer teams from businesses, churches, schools, social groups and service clubs and/or individuals will also register by website or mail, signing up for clean-up opportunities. Volunteers will serve our community in respectful ways as partners and neighbors assisting with projects that may be difficult for some but very manageable with many "neighborly" hands. Bricks will be available for purchase through April 2023. The profits will go into the HLACF Endowment Fund which is then awarded out to local nonprofits through an annual grant application process. Since 2019 HLACF has distributed more than \$24,000 to the Hackensack and Backus communities and surrounding townships. The bricks will be installed at the base of the flagpole by the Chamber building in Hackensack. We will have a ceremony recognizing the project during Sweetheart Days 2023. (More details to come.)
