

FREA Legislative Days in Tallahassee

The FREA Legislative Team of 20 FREA members representing the 47 FREA Units around the state will be in Tallahassee for the Legislative Session March 27-30. We will be meeting with legislators and personnel from their offices to advocate for our Legislative Priorities.

This year we are focusing on offering strategies to help


Attract and Retain Teachers in Florida schools. (See the graphic on this page.) [Click here](#) to download and share with legislators) Florida is short nearly 5,000 full time teachers, and nationally it is closer to 50,000. Developing meaningful suggestions that will lead to careers in education will help ensure continuity in student learning and promote the importance of those in the teaching profession.

Florida Legislature - Key Bills to follow:

- ⇒ SB 1 and HB 202 Expanding School Vouchers
- ⇒ SB1354 & HB 181 Reinstating COLA after 2011
- ⇒ SB 150 Ending AP High School Courses
- ⇒ HJR 31 Proposed Constitutional amendment for partisan School Board elections; 8 yr. terms

Every FREA member should be registered to vote and then vote when primaries and general elections are held. Contacting your local district representative/s to stay informed and advocating for our priorities is very important. Legislators keep track of what their constituents support.

Florida Faces An Education Crisis



Florida is experiencing an unprecedented shortage of teachers and few students entering the profession.

The Florida Retired Educators Association (FREA) appreciates that Governor Ron DeSantis has proposed incentives and bonuses for retired military personnel and first responders to be trained as teachers, as well as new pathways to become an educator.

As an association of career educators, FREA offers additional ideas for recruiting future educators to help solve Florida's short- and long-term teacher shortage.

1 Enact legislation to pay teachers more so they stay in the profession.

2 Strengthen benefits for working educators: healthcare, pensions, and cost-of-living adjustments.

3 Provide college graduates with the same benefits and incentives as working teachers so they are attracted to the profession.

4 Provide retired teachers with the same benefits and incentives as working teachers so they return to the classroom.

5 Elevate respect for teachers.

6 Increase funding to universities and schools of education to boost student enrollment.

7 Provide high schools with funds for future teacher academies, and fast track dual enrollment opportunities.

8 Develop a marketing campaign such as "Be A Teacher That Makes the Difference."

Volunteer Services

This is the time of year that keeps your Unit and District Volunteer Services Chairs very busy! Volunteer Hours recorded, 5th Grade Essay winners chosen, and Volunteers of the Year selected.

Unit Volunteer Services Chairs: Fifth-grade Essays: Read and rated at the Unit level by the committee. **Unit Volunteer of the Year:** Your Unit's Volunteer Services Chair records the information of the dedicated VOY to represent your Unit as Volunteer of the Year. **Unit Volunteer Services Chairs** submit both the Fifth-Grade Essay and Volunteer of the Year choices to the District Volunteer Services Chair, by March 15th.

District Volunteer Services Chairs then become equally busy, receiving each Unit's Volunteer of the Year nominees and Fifth-grade Essay Contest winners.

5th Grade Essay Contest District Level: Each District Volunteer Services Chair, along with their committee, selects the submission to represent your District. This is often a difficult task due to the quality of submissions. District Chairs then submit their Fifth-grade Essay Contest winner to me (State Chair), by April 1st. The Fifth-grade Essay Contest Committee then selects 1st, 2nd, 3rd place winners at the State level, inviting them to attend our annual convention.

District Volunteer of the Year: The District Chairs send their Districts' chosen representative for the Volunteer of the Year to the State.

Cecelia's first note: The following information was presented by Josh Dunning, the AARP VP for the Driver Safety program, at the NRTA's 75th Anniversary Celebration in Washington, D.C., last September. Josh began his career in the banking industry, with an interest in consumer financial education. When he joined AARP, he transitioned to traffic safety education and is passionate about keeping drivers and riders safe, independent, and confident as they age. The AARP driver safety programs he directs are well-respected throughout the nation.

Do you remember the National Safety Council's "55 Alive" ads? If you do, you are probably retired! When Josh Dunning spoke to the group, his first bit of information was a tad shocking - the "55 Alive" slogan was created 50 years ago! Josh gave us a moment to recover, then shared information on four of AARP's Driver Safety programs: the *Smart Driver* course, *Smart Driver TEK*, *CarFit*, and the new *SafeTrip* app.

Smart Driver is the first refresher course designed specifically for drivers age 50 and over. This on-line course will help you

- ★ Refresh your driving skills and knowledge of the rules and hazards of the road.
- ★ Reduce your chances of receiving a traffic violation or getting into an accident.
- ★ Learn at your own pace, as you have 60 days to complete the course.
- ★ Possibly receive a multi-year discount on your auto insurance*

*The AARP Smart Driver™ online course is recognized as an approved accident prevention course for drivers age 55 and older by the Florida Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles. Insured drivers age 55 and older may be eligible for an appropriate reduction in automobile insurance premium charges good for three years after completing this course. Please check with your insurance company or agent for any additional requirements for eligibility.

Smart Driver Course You could change one bad driving habit. 97% of participants say they did!


Smart Drive TEK Technology is changing how we drive. *Smart Driver TEK Workshop* is a 90-minute program about the latest high-tech safety features in our cars. The program is offered as an in-person scheduled workshop, on-line any time, and virtually with a trainer in a scheduled Zoom workshop. For more information, visit [Smart Drive TEK](#)

CarFit *CarFit* is an AARP program in collaboration with AAA and the American Occupational Therapists Association that promotes safe driving and mobility for older drivers. you can assist to help take the load off our already stressed out teachers.

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
