For this full-house remodel project, our goal was to add modern functionality while maintaining the integrity and architectural language of this 1980s tudor-style brick home. 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

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The clients wished for a modern, open kitchen with an island. However, the formal, compartmentalized floor plan of their 1980s home lacked the flow and function. Our vision of one large L-shaped connected kitchen and family was achieved by combining four rooms, adding headers, rerouting soffit ducting and plumbing through a central wall. Rather than cramming a rectangular island within limited width, a custom circular island with storage featuring an extra wide marble slab created the perfect gathering spot with seating for ten. Our aesthetic vision was a clean, timeless look achieved with a monochromatic scheme with textures, natural marble, gold accents and custom ash flooring..













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
