

ABOUT

Our client's home was a dated and "challenged" 1950's home with the original cabinetry and laminate countertops. Two walls partitioned the kitchen off from the dining room and the living room of the home. The steep staircase was unfortunately seated in the middle of the living space and separated the kitchen from the dining room. The challenge: Take down those walls and create an open floor plan to allow this family to stay connected while working in the kitchen. Create a safe yet beautiful railing for the staircase without compromising the open concept layout. Put in a new support beam to replace the existing load bearing walls. And rework the floor plan to be more functional and aesthetically appealing. A two-tiered countertop protected the open staircase from the range and countertop "roll aways" and was the perfect place to highlight the custom backsplash tiles. The wrap around countertop fit the client's request for a place to have their morning coffee. The previous countertop was 9 square feet which was drastically increased to 52 square feet! While the windows remained, the back door was replaced with a full-lite design and the space became flooded with morning sunshine. Removing the two bearing walls let the large dining room windows brighten the once dark kitchen and prep areas. This client's aesthetic was modern farmhouse and the new design included new custom maple cabinets, quartz countertops, entire appliance package, lighting and plumbing fixtures, and a tile backsplash. The 1950's hickory flooring was throughout the entire house, but the small kitchen was vinyl tiles. We worked with a wood flooring installer to match the hickory plank size and stain. Having the entire space use one flooring material made the space seem larger and more cohesive. The beam and post were custom stained to match the staircase railing and cap board that was placed behind the countertop. The post the accent trim pieces were the perfect place to hang a farmhouse lantern. The look was pulled together with a stainless farmhouse apron sink, a beautifully stained support beam, and a neutral color palette. Our clients now have a new space that they absolutely adore and is now both functional and fulfilling!

High end appliances


Quartz countertops

PROJECT CHALLENGES


Removed 2 load bearing walls; replaced with support beam. Support beam finished in a rustic stain to further enhance farmhouse aesthetic

The client's main level already had newer hardwood flooring. For a seamless look for the new open floor plan kitchen, matching hardwood flooring had to be integrated.


The centrally located staircase broke the dining room away from the kitchen and it was important to see between the two rooms. The staircase faded away with a minimal railing and clean balusters.





BEFORE FLOOR PLAN




AFTER FLOOR PLAN
